Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: Some parts of the region received rain but most of the region was hot, windy and dry. Most crops will need rain soon to continue growing. Irrigators were running sprinklers to prevent fields from drying down. Wheat was quickly maturing and still looked good. There was some hail damage reported as well as disease but not as bad as in previous years. Corn made excellent progress with warmer weather. Some cotton had to be replanted after recent rains, and some fields had not yet emerged due to lack of topsoil moisture. Livestock were doing well on spring pastures. Grasshopper numbers were increasing but were not yet an issue.

Texas AgriLife Extension Serv. Graduates **Lifetime Leaders**

Lawyers, farmers, bankers, government officials, ranchers and agriculturerelated industry representatives banded together for two years with one aim: learn to be leaders.

Their intensive study of agriculture worldwide culminated this month when the Texas Agriculture Lifetime Leadership class of 2010 graduated at a ceremony in College Station.

"The experience gained in all vast aspects of the agriculture industry shapes each class member to be a more wellrounded agriculture advocate," said class member-Alicia Howard Burton of Chapman Ranch. "We are each involved in different entities, but must have a unified voice to speak to and educate our country and the world about agriculture. That is our responsibility."

The Texas AgriLife Extension Service leads the program, known as TALL, which focuses on international communications, ecology, government, policy, economics, social problems and education opportunities, according to Dr. Jim Mazurkiewicz, coordinator of the leadership program.

This class, the 11th since the program started, traveled to Russia, Poland and Mexico to learn about the impact of agriculture worldwide.

"The TALL Program has opened channels of information exchange that reach well beyond the Texas borders," said class member Koby Reed of Wichita Falls. "I am forever grateful to have had the opportunity to be involved in this program, which has intuitively enhanced my knowledge of American agriculture."

For most of the graduates, the handson experiences in Texas and abroad are what led to the greatest learning.

"On-location visits with the owners and operators provided operational appreciation and understanding that is not possible in a classroom environment," said Grady Martin of Lubbock.

Sarah Riggins of San Marcos agreed. "I have always had strong ties to agriculture," she said. "During the course work of TALL, I gained a better perspective of the need and importance of agriculture not only in the Lone Star State, but around the nation and world."



One of the favorite stories written about John in the first edition of the Lipscomb County history book was submitted by Dove Prater Bell. In the column "Memories of the Old Home Town" by Harry Zollars, was John's purchase of a motor car.

John ordered a brand new Model T Ford touring car of the latest model and had it delivered to Higgins by railroad. He invited three of his best friends from Lipscomb area to accompany him to Higgins to accept the delivery and ride home with him in the new car. The car was a black beauty, having all four doors in contrast to the earlier models which did not have front doors. The head lights were polished brass with gas in small burners, the center of the windshield, which folded, was supported by two heavy brass rods which ran down to each

side of the radiator. Upon its arrival, the agent who had shipped the car was on hand to give John some quick lessons on driving and controlling the new car. In a short time John was driving the car on the rough and sandy streets of Higgins, slowing down and stopping when frightened horses and cussing drivers trying to control their animals got in and came to Lipscomb in his way. As soon as the agent cleared him and declared him proficient, John and his friends took off for the 20 mile trip home to Lipscomb.



The 82nd Texas Legislature, scheduled to convene Jan. 11, must write a balanced budget in the face of a shortfall estimated between \$10 billion and \$18

billion. "While we face challenges to our budget, Texans can rest assured we will preserve essential services as we identify further savings for taxpayers," Dewhurst said.

Tax intake lower than

expected Comptroller Texas Susan Combs on June 2 said business tax collections as of the May 16 reporting deadline were about \$3.6 billion.

The amount is about \$500 million short of Combs' biennial revenue estimate for fiscal years 2010-2011, which projects \$4.3 billion in business tax revenue by the end of fiscal 2010, Aug. 31. Those billions of dollars in business taxes make up a small portion of state revenue overall: the lion's share (about 60 percent) comes from sales and use taxes paid by all consumers.

Speaking of which, the upcoming state sales tax holiday will give Texas shoppers a break from state and local sales taxes on Aug. 20, 21 and 22. The law exempts most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 from sales and use

Redistricting committee meets

Congressional redistricting, a job for the state Legislature next session, will be based on information gathered in the U.S. cen-

On June 2, the House Committee on Redistricting met for invited testimony on recent legal, technological, and demographic developments relating to the upcoming redistricting process.

Dr. Jeffrey Jordan of the Texas State Data Center testified the state's population increased 3.93 million (18.8 percent) from 2000 to 2008, of which 54 percent was natural increase and 45 percent was net migration.

Texas stands to pick up at least two congressional seats, based on its population increase.

Early vaccinations encouraged

The Texas Department of State Health Services on June 3 called for parents to get their children vaccinated now to avoid the back-to-school rush later

this summer.

"We want parents to plan ahead," said health commissioner Dr. David Lakey. "School children should get vaccinated as soon as possible to avoid long wait times at clinics and ensure they are protected before the first day of school."

Child booster seat law takes effect

On June 1, failure to secure a child in a booster seat became a misdemeanor offense, with violations resulting in a \$25 fine for a first offense and up to \$250 for subsequent violations.

A child younger than 8 must be secured in a child passenger safety seat, unless the child is taller than 4 feet, 9 inches, according to the law, authored in 2009 by Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo.

Words from Faith & Grace



by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister In the third week of Pentecost, we study forgiveness as we read 2 Samuel 11:26-12:15, Psalm 32, Galatians 2:15-21, and Luke 7:36-8:3.

David, the warrior-king, has given up the battle-field and is dallying in Jerusalem. He becomes enamored of Bath-Sheba and takes her. She becomes pregnant. David in order to cover-up his sin recalls Bath-Sheba's husband, Uriah the Hittite, from the battle-front and tries to get him to enjoy being home. Uriah refuses, because his men are still at the battle-front and they cannot enjoy their homes. Seeing no other path, David gets Joab, his 'hit-man' general, to order Uriah into the thickest battle. Uriah is killed; David, after an appropriate time, marries Bath-Sheba. God sends Nathan the prophet who tells David a story of a rich man who has stolen a poor man's pet sheep. David in his role as Administrator of Justice, becomes irate and declares that the rich man should be killed and compelled to restore the lamb four fold. Nathan then tells David, "You are the man." David's reaction is to immediately confess his sin. David is spared death. Dear Christian, when we sin and become repentant, God forgives us; however, the consequences of our sin, remain. In this story, there are consequences to David's sin.

The Psalmist sings a 'maskil' (a wisdom song), "Happy are those whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered." He sings that when we try to cover-up our sin we waste away and suffer. If we confess our sin to God, God forgives us and we are restored.

Paul tells the Galatians not to abandon the gospel they accepted. They and we are justified by faith in Jesus the Christ by God's grace. Works of the law do not justify. Paul's agreement with Peter and the apostles in Jerusalem was that the Jewish Christians would continue to live as Jews, observing their feast days and religious purity laws, but the Gentiles would be free of any obligation to the law. Paul takes Peter to task for acting one way with the Gentile Christians and another with the Jewish Christians. Paul points out that if we could be justified by works of the law, then Jesus died in vain! If we have been crucified with Christ, then it is Christ who lives in us by faith. Consider from this, dear Christian, we do good works because we are justified by God, not

to be justified to God.


Luke tells the story of the dinner-party at Simon the Phariesse's. Jesus is invited to dinner by Simon the Pharisee. When invited to a home for dinner and discussion, a host in the first century, would greet his guest with a kiss of peace, would have a servant pour water over the guest's feet to refresh him, and would burn sweet incense, or place a drop of attar of roses on the head of the guest to further refresh him. Simon the Pharisee did none of these for Jesus. At such a dinner, the guests ate reclining on a couch. They lay on their left sides supported by the left elbow. Their feet faced away from the table, and their sandals were off. Non-guests were free to enter the home to listen to the teaching of the guests. That is how the woman who is a sinner gets into proximity of Jesus' feet. The woman washes Jesus' feet with her tears. anoints his feet with ointment, and dries Jesus' feet with her hair. (This is not the same story as that of Matthew, Mark and John which involved Mary the sister of Lazarus). Jesus then tells Simon a parable about a creditor who has two debtors. Neither debtor can pay, so the Creditor cancels each of the debts. Jesus asks who would love the creditor more? Simon replies, "I suppose the one for whom he canceled the greater debt." Jesus says to Simon, "You have judged rightly". Jesus says to the woman, "Your sins are forgiven...your faith has saved you; go in peace.

May the Holy Spirit enable you through God's grace to have faith in Jesus the Christ so that you may have

I want you all to know that you taught me, and I am guessing, an entire generation of young people in Gruver, a VERY valuable lesson about what to do when tragedy or destruction occurs. You mourn. You come together. You pool your resources. You plan. You build. You get it done. You celebrate. Then you get back to your life and business as it was before. I have discovered that this does not happen everywhere.


Thank you for this life lesson that only now, at 40 years old, I am able to FULLY appreciate and understand. The lessons I learned watching all of you rebuild that church almost 30 years ago showed me how to respond to ALL of life's unexpected disappointments and tragedies small and large - so that it has become a natural, instinctual, unconscious response to almost everything.

It is one of my greatest regrets that I waited until now after people like J.C. Lake Palo Duro continues to recede, faster than we would like. The dry ground soaks a lot of water in, after a significant rise. The lake still covers two and a half times more surface area, than it did before the rise.

I have been on the lookout for fawns, but have not seen one yet, this year. I hope to get a picture of one before this edition of the paper is printed.

This morning, while driving near the lake, I was surprised by a bald eagle that flew out of tall grass, twenty yards in front of me. It had something in its talons, when it flew away. A close encounter like this, reminds me of how big these birds are. Eagles are seen here daily, but most sightings are from a distance that makes them seem smaller. I have been here almost seventeen years, but these rare sightings make me feel like I couldn't be in a better




