Farmers Reminded Of USDA Programs Deadlines

Hansford County Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Director, Executive Laney, reminds area farmers and ranchers of pending application deadlines for emergency assistance programs and announces recently developed new emergency programs.

Application deadlines for programs previously announced

this year are:

• 2000 Oilseed Program: \$500 million in payments is available to the more than 600,000 producers of the 2000 crops of certain oilseeds oilseeds canola, crambe, flaxseed, mustard, rapeseed, safflower sesame, soybeans and sunflowers. Application deadline is

January 12, 2001. Local USDA Farm Service Agency offices will also begin accepting applications soon for

the following programs:

• 2000 Crop I 2000 Crop Disaster Program (CDP): Funds will be made available to producers who have been affected by crop disaster. The sign-up period will begin January 18, 2001

 2000 Livestock Assistance Program (LAP): An estimated \$438 million is available to producers for grazing losses due to weather related disasters. The sign-up period will begin January 18, 2001.

Producers should watch for new program announcements released from their local Farm Service Agency office. County offices will receive national guidance regarding new program delivery prior to program sign-up dates. Please contact the FSA office at 659-3036 for additional information about current program eligibility. New program eligibility and application information will be available in January.

their families The College Information Hotline is available to anyone in the state who has questions about any aspect of college admission, financial aid, degree programs, housing, stu-dent life and activities, or special programs. Callers may also request information from specific colleges and universities or information about any college in the United States. Spanish-speaking counselors and admission representatives from more than 25 public and

private colleges and universities in Texas will be on duty.
In previous years, callers have predominant their narschool students and their parents, but an increasing number of information requests are beginning to come from middle school students, current colege students, adults who did not complete college or have never attended, and veterans with questions about their ben-efits. In 2000, volunteers handled approximately 600 college admission and financial aid related calls

Spearman's Pearson Grabs Honor in 2000 **NCHA World Championship Futurity**

This year's National Cutting Horse Association (NCHA) World Championship Futurity in Fort Worth, Texas, proved that with three-year-old cutting horses, anything can happen. Weatherford resident Kathy Daughn and her three-year-old stallion by Jae Bar Fletch Royal Fletch, rode into the herd during the Open Division Finals, cut three cows and walked out with a record setting score of 229.

But Spearman was represeted well when Mark Pearson piloted his horse, Flo Little Lena, to score 220 points to win the Championship honor in the Amateur Division.

This year's NCHA Futurity was the largest and richest ever held. A total of 1,509 entries in Open, Non-Professional and Amateur competition met at Will Rogers Coliseum to begin competition on Thanksgiving Day, November 23, with the event running through Sunday, December 10. This year's total purse of more than \$2.8 million, including \$300,000 in added money from the City of Fort Worth, the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce and the Fort Worth Convention and Visitors Bureau, eclipsed all previous records.

The annual NCHA World Championship Futurity is one of the equine world's premier events, and marks the competitive debut for the nations' top three-year-old cutting prospects. In addition to top cutting competition, the annual Futurity event includes horse sales, highlighted by the annual NCHA Select Futurity Sale as well as the Cowboy Christmas Extravaganza Trade Show.

Chisum To Hold Town Hall Meetings

State Representative Warren Chisum will make two stops in Hansford County on Thursday, January 4, 2001. First, he will be at the O'Loughlin Center in Spearman from 4:30 to 5:15 p.m. From there, Chisum will travel to Gruver and be at the Gruver Community Center from 5:30 to 6:15 p.m.

The state legislator has planned 24 town hall meetings in early January to hear from the voters and to provide an overview of what to expect from the Texas Legislature.

"State government works best when the public participates," Chisum said. "I intend to spend more time listening than talking."
Chisum typically files several bills

based on concerns brought to his attention at town hall meetings.

The Texas Legislature, which is required by the Texas Constitution to meet for 140 days every oddnumbered year, will begin the 77th Legislative Session on Tuesday,

Chisum was first elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1988 and will report to Austin for his 7th term in 2001. He represents the 88th House District, which includes Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Roberts, Sherman and Wheeler counties

The Secret Of Having More Fun And Getting More Work Done

Your dream was to own your own business, and now you do. Your dream was to be your own boss, and now you are. Your dream was to work fewer hours and have more leisure time, but now reality is set-

You've already worked more than 50 hours this week. You wanted to spend Saturday with your family, but you really need to tackle all those things you've been putting off. Just this once, family time will have to wait while you go in and get

caught up. If this sounds familiar, maybe it's time to make a few changes. Changes that can help you enjoy your work more, lower your stress level and get more accomplished. Here are some ways to have more fun and get more done.

Working Smarter, Not Harder Realize that you can't do it all. This is a key to reducing the stress that kills productivity. If you find yourself staying awake nights feel-

ing guilty about all of the things you didn't get done, you aren't being selective enough in choosing what you do. No one has ever gotten it all done,

so don't feel guilty about letting some things fall by the wayside. Stay focused on your priorities. Do only those most important tasks.

· Plan and prioritize. From time to time we all get distracted from the important by the urgent. To avoid this trap, plan and prioritize your work. Divide your work into "must do", "need to do", and "want to do."

These questions may help you establish your priorities: 1) What work will produce the most results in the shortest time? 2) What work will help me achieve my long-term goals the quickest? 3) If I don't do this task today, what are the consequences?

Work at a steady pace. The old fable describing the race between the tortoise and the hare is really very true. You'll get more done if you find a comfortable pace of work and stay at it.

I divide my work into bite-size chunks. I promise myself a little break when I finish a portion. That often helps me stay with a project a little longer.

 Know when you do your best work. I recently visited with a young college student who told me she was taking a 7:30 a.m. summer class because that was when she was most alert.

The early part of the day is also when I perform at the highest level. I take on the most challenging tasks when I'm at my peak. Your day may really get started at noon. It doesn't matter as long as you don't waste your peak time on routine phone calls, paper work or follow-up.

· Save some time for yourself. I don't care how full of energy you may be, you still need some time to recharge your batteries. How you recharge will vary from person to person. For example, I work with people all day long. When I recharge, I prefer to be alone. I may go for a motorcycle ride, work in my


shop or read a book







Blowin' In The Wind

The annual meeting of the Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association will be a noon luncheon on January 23 at the First Christian Church Fellowship Hall. Among other things it is time to renew your SPWA membership, or join, if you are not presently a member. Membership is \$10 a year.

The SPWA is also selling commemorative brick and tiles to be included in the landscaping scheme at the windmill park. Bricks are \$50 and tile \$100. Contact Gina at the chamber office if interested in these.

Also, if you are interested in adopting a windmill, there are several available for adoption. Contact Roger Buchanan to adopt a windmill. At least one mill in the park has been adopted--the Dempster by Erlis and Ethel Pittman, the Star 5' Zephyr at the SPWA barn by Danny Ray Robertson, and the mills at the two banks and the mill at Prairie Motors. Other mills are in the talking stage and will be adopted, restored and erected in the windmill park, at local businesses or the municipal park to be located east of the high school.

LEADER

The mill to be described this week is the Leader, designated Number 13, and located in the J. B. Buchanan Windmill Park. The mill is from the J. B. Buchanan collection. Mr. Buchanan had not put it up, and the decision was to restore it and then put it in the windmill park. The mill was placed on a new tower and erected in the park on

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December 7, 2000. The restoration involved a new wheel, and pouring of a new Babbitt bearing, and making a new shaft. The metal work was done by J. D. Wilbanks with assistance from Don Reed. The woodwork on the wheel was done by Orville Latham, letter-ing on the tail by Wanda Reed with others assisting on various details such as painting and raising the mill--Burl Buchanan, Don Maize, Ron Willis, Dwayne Mitchell, and Roger Buchanan. Spearman High School Student Council members Sally Pittman, Mindee Gillaspie and Garrett Griffin painted the blades on the mill.

How many blades in the 10' foot Leader wheel? Seventy-two.

Mr. Buchanan bought the mill from a Mr. Clarence Smith of Dalhart. The mill was located near Sedan, New Mexico. The Leader is manufactured by Flint and Walling of Kendallville, Indiana, and very closely copies the Eclispe mills to the extent that many parts are inter-changeable. The mills are directstroke side-vane governed mills. Each revolution of the slowly turning wooden wheel produces one stroke of the pump. The small wooden side-vane governs the wheel by pushing it away from the wind as wind velocity increases.

The Leader employs a very strik-ing color scheme of white blades with red tips, a blue pumping mech-anism and black lettering. The mill brings to fifteen the number of mills "blowin' in the wind" in Spearman.

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



Panhandle Food Stamp Campaign To Kick Off

Panhandle Community Services will conduct a ten-month campaign to educate low income Texans about their eligibility for the Food Stamp Program (FSP). A nutrition program that serves as the nation's front line defense against hunger. In Texas, the number of low income people not participating in the FSP has risen from 25% to 56%, a 31% increase consistent with national statistics. The federal, state and nonprofit agencies are concerned that people who are eligible for the FSP are not getting the benefits they need to put food on the table.

Many former welfare recipients who are now working low wage jobs, may believe that they are ineligible for benefit programs, including FSP. However, food stamps are available to families with gross income up to 130% of the moral poverty level, which includes a large number of working people. The purpose of the education campaign is to disseminate information to people who experience hunger or

food insecurity (Texas ranks second and third, respectively in these categories) but have not applied for or received food stamps. The FSP is an integral part of the welfare-to-work movement, creating a safety net for families to rely on as they move towards self-sufficiency. As the FSP participation rates have declined, the demand on emergency food providers has increased, according to the nations largest chain of food banks. This trend indicates that Texans are indeed hungry, but tend to seek food assistance from private sources rather than from the government. The Food Stamp Education Campaign will target working low income people families, legal immi-

grants and the elderly in order to increase enrollment in the FSP, Panhandle Community Services is a non-profit, service organization dedicated to helping those less fortunate. PCS mission is to be a significant influence in meeting changing needs of Panhandle residents, whether it be through direct services or resource education, Panhandle Community Services encourages peoples dreams for the future, turn poverty into opportunity and to attain a higher quality of life.

Those who chose to be office volunteers can participate in the full training program or a basic hospice orientation.
