Shopping Slows at End of Holiday Weekend The first holiday shopping week-end of the year may have started with a bang, but it ended with a whimper, evidence from two groups that track sales showed on Tuesday. The International Council of Shopping Centers, the leading shopping center organiza-tion, trimmed its sales forecast for November and released figures that confirmed a strong shopping surge on Friday fizzled over the Thanksgiving weekend.

> U.S. May Plan Offensive in Afghanistan

Thousands of U.S. soldiers are preparing an operation against Taliban insurgents to preempt an expected spring offensive which could upset plans for Afghan parliamentary elections, a senior American general said in an interview Tuesday. The operation will begin within days of the Dec. 7 auguration of Hamid Karzai a Afghanistan's first directly elected president — an event that itself is potential target, Maj. Gen. Eric Olson told The Associated Press.

> Prosecutor: Immigrants Treated Like Cattle

Three people involved in the nation's deadliest smuggling attempt were part of a scheme that treated immigrants "worse than cattle on the way to the slaughterhouse," a prosecutor said Tuesday in opening statements. The trial of Victor Jesus Rodriguez, Claudia arrizales de Villa and Fredy Giovanni Garcia-Tobar is the first elated to the May 2003 deaths of 19 illegal immigrants inside a tractor-trailer. Prosecutor Daniel Rodriguez said the three were part of a smuggling ring that tried to transport a group of more than 70 immigrants from south Texas to Houston. But defense attorneys said the three had minimal involvement.

**Dollar Mixed After Touching** New Lows

The dollar was narrowly mixed on Wednesday after chalking up yet another record low versus the euro and sliding to a 12-year trough against a surging British pound. The dollar briefly ticked higher on news both U.S. personal income and consumption rose more than expected in October. Income rose 6 percent while spending was up .7 percent. Economists had forecast a 0.5 percent rise in income and a 0.4 percent increase in consumption.

> Red Cross Finds Detainee Abuse in Guantánamo

The International Committee of he Red Cross has charged in confidential reports to the United States government that the American military has intentionaly used psychological and sometimes physical coercion "tantamount to torture" on prisoners at Guantánamo Bay, Cuba. The finding that the handling of prisoners detained and interrogated at Guantánamo amounted to torture came after a visit by a Red Cross inspection team that spent most of ast June in Guantánamo.

# Family turns farming outside, in

As farmers, Brad and Gyene Spivey of Gruver, have battled dust storms, hail, early freezes, flooding, and drought. Maybe that's why the idea of farming in a controlled climate appealed to them when daughter Lexy and her husband Tim Glass wanted to return to the farm.

"We wanted to find something we could do together," Brad said. "Since I have always been interested in hydroponic farming, I thought we could use our farming experiences and expand it into hydroponic tomato farming."

That idea was the beginning of 4-S Farms. With the family buying used equipment and doing most of the work themselves, the steel framework of the greenhouse was erected last March, east of Brad and Gyene's rural home, eight miles north of Gruver.

The family suffered a setback on the next step of their project when high winds destroyed the poly liner they were attempting to stretch over the metal skeleton. But the Spiveys learned that just like skinning a cat, there is more than one way to put plastic over a pipe frame.

"The next time we planned to put the poly liner up, I fixed breakfast for about 20 or more of our neighbors and friends. They, in turn, all helped to roll the covering over the frame," Gyene said. "It was like an old-fashioned barn not used on the plants, Mother

With the two poly liners of the greenhouse in place, the Spiveys began to incorporate the latest scientific technology to make a perfect biosphere in which their planned 900 tomato plants would flourish.

Since hydroponic farming is a means of growing plants in a sodless medium using water to deliver nutrients, the amount and frequency of watering is critical.

"The amount of water the plants need is determined by a probe which measure heat and sunlight in the greenhouse. Right now, we use about 250 gallons of water a day. We also adjust the different nutrients delivered to the plants through the water based on a monthly chemical analysis of the plants' leaves."

It is also vital that the greenhouse maintains a temperature of about 64 degrees at night and 75 degrees in the day, and it is especially important for the roots to be kept warm.

"We use natural gas heating, but I will be adding a means that will deliver warm water to the roots and save energy, "Brad said.

Since electricity ia a crucial component of the greenhouse, the Spiveys have a generator in place for emergency use during a power outage. The back-up system would prevent the loss of air between the two layers of poly that both insu-

late the greenhouse from heat and cold and provide a protective cushion from hail for the second poly layer and the growing plants.

"We have a sensiphone which calls our home phone if the power should fail. If the computer cannot get us there, it calls our cell phones, or can even call our childrens' home phones," Gyene said.

Although the hydroponic farm may seem high tech, much of the work must still be done by hand.

"It's a labor intense project," Gyene said. "We first planted seeds in horticubes (small compressed foam germination cubes), transferred them to net pots, and then to poly bags of ground coconut fiber." The daily work is also a hands-

on mission.

"It would probably be a full day's work for one person, but Gyene, I and our son-in-law each put in about 3-4 hours a day," Brad said. Most of those hours are spent pinching off tiny sucker leaves that grow in between the plant stems or tying up the vines, which can grow as long as 70-80 feet. As the tomatoes ripen, more hours will be needed for picking

High tech also needs Mother Nature's help in the form of bees.

"We use bees to pollinate the plants. They fly freely through the greenhouse, but are non-aggressive and rarely sting unless they are swatted," Brad said.

Since chemical insecticides are Nature also plays a role in the control of harmful insects. Rectangles of cardboard, about the size of a playing card, are flecked with larvae of beneficial insects and hung in the greenhouse to hatch and begin their life's work.

This month the combination of scientific technology, hard work, and nature are culminating in the Spivey's first harvest of vineripened tomatoes.

stores in Gruver, Spearman, and Perryton, "Brad said, "We are not seeking other markets yet until we know how many tomatoes to expect each week. We wouldn't want to promise tomatoes we can't deliver.'

Since the tomato plants put on a cluster of new fruit each week, the Spiveys expect to harvest a new layer of tomatoes weekly.

With the harvest of their tomatoes beginning, the Spiveys are already considering the possibility of building additional greenhouses, planting different varieties of tomatoes, and expanding to more market places.

"Our first responsibility is to supply the markets we have now before adding more," Gyene said. "But regardless of how many markets we eventually have, 4-S Farms will always have tomatoes for our local community, family, and friends."

## Preventing the Spread of Influenza in Child Care Settings:

Guidance for Administrators, Care Providers, and Other Staff

Symptoms of flu include fever (usually high), headache, extreme tiredness, dry cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, and muscle aches. Nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea also can occur, and are much more common among children than adults.

The main way that flu is spread is from person to person through coughs and sneezes. This can happen when droplets from the cough or sneeze of an infected person travel through the air and reach the mouth or nose of people nearby. Sometimes flu can be spread when a person touches droplets, nose drainage or saliva from an infected person, or a soiled object, and then touches one's own (or someone else's) nose or mouth before washing hands.

Vaccination against the flu each fall remains the primary way to prevent this disease. Vaccination, along with other measures, also may help to decrease the spread of influenza among children in the child care setting and among care providers.

Remind children and care providers to wash their hands or use alcohol-based hand rubs, and make sure that supplies are available.

• Encourage care providers and children to use soap and water to wash hands when hands are visibly soiled, or an alcohol-based hand rub when soap and water are not available, and hands are not visibly soiled.

• Encourage care providers to wash their hands to the extent possible between contacts with infants and children, such as before meals or feedings, after wiping the child's nose or mouth, after touching objects such as tissues or surfaces soiled with saliva or nose drainage, after diaper changes, and after assisting a child with toileting.

 Encourage care providers to wash the hands of infants and toddlers when the hands become soiled.

• Encourage children to wash hands when their hands have become soiled. Teach children to wash hands for 15-20 seconds (long enough for children to sing the "Happy Birthday" song twice).

Oversee the use of alcohol-based hand rubs by children and avoid using these on the sensitive skin of infants and toddlers.
Rub hands thoroughly until the alcohol has dried, when using alco-

hol-based hand rub.

• Keep alcohol-based hand rubs out of the reach of children to prevent

unsupervised use.

• Ensure that sink locations and restrooms are stocked with soap, pape

• Ensure that sink locations and restrooms are stocked with soap, paper towels or working hand dryers.

 Ensure that each child care room and diaper changing area is supplied with alcohol-based hand rub when sinks for washing hands are not readily accessible. Alcohol-based hand rubs are not recommended when hands are visibly soiled.

Keep the child care environment clean and make sure that supplies re available.

 Clean frequently touched surfaces, toys, and commonly shared items at least daily and when visibly soiled.

• Use an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered household disinfectant labeled for activity against bacteria and viruses, an EPA-registered hospital disinfectant, or EPA-registered chlorine bleach/hypochlorite solution. Always follow label instructions when using any EPA-registered disinfectant. If EPA-registered chlorine bleach is not available and a generic (i.e., store brand) chlorine bleach is used, mix? cup chlorine bleach with I gallon of cool water.

• Keep disinfectants out of the reach of children.

Remind children and care providers to cover their noses and mouths when sneezing or coughing.

Advise children and care providers to cover their noses and mouths with a tissue when sneezing or coughing, and to put their used tissue in a waste basket.

 • Make sure that tissues are available in all nurseries, child care rooms, and common areas such as reading rooms, classrooms, and rooms where

• Encourage parents of sick children to keep their children home. Encourage sick care providers to stay home.

• Encourage parents of sick children to keep the children home and away from the child care setting until the children have been without fever for 24 hours, to prevent spreading illness to others. Similarly, encourage sick care providers to stay home.

 Consult your local health department when increases in respiratory illness occur in the child care setting.

 Consult with your local or state health department for recommendations to prevent the spread of respiratory illness. Fast Facts

Jimmy SUVs due to slow sales. Both SUVs have suffered dwindling
sales since being replaced in GM's lineup with more current models.

Congress Trims Money for Science Agency
Congress has cut the budget for the National Science Foundation, an engine for research in science and technology, just two years after endorsing a plan to double the amount given to the agency. Supporters of scientific research, in government and at universities, noted that the cut came as lawmakers earmarked more money for local projects like the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland and the Punxsutawney Weather Museum in Pennsylvania.

Rwandan Troops Enter Congo, Congo Officials Say
Rwandan troops have killed at least 19 civilians in an attack on a town
in eastern Congo, a Congolese commander said on Tuesday, after
Rwanda said its forces may have launched an attack in pursuit of Hutu
rebels. There was no independent confirmation of a Rwandan incursion
but both comments raised the prospect of fresh war in the region, where
four million people have died in the past decade from genocide, war and
conflict-related hunger and disease.

Republican Dino Rossi was certified as the winner of the Washington
governor's race on Tuesday, but Democrats were expected to request a
hand recount in the closest gubernatorial election in the state's history.
Washington Secretary of State Sam Reed certified Rossi as the winner in
the drawn-out contest for governor of the Pacific northwest state with a
42-vote victory over Democratic Attorney General Christine Gregoire.
Gregoire's backers have until Friday to request a hand recount, which
Reed said could delay the final outcome of the election for several more

A suicide bomber rammed his car into a group of policemen waiting to
collect their salaries on Monday morning west of Ramadi, killing 12
people and wounding many others in the latest attack on Iraq's security
forces, officials at the Interior Ministry said. In Baghdad, two American
soldiers with the First Cavalry Division were killed and three were
wounded when a roadside bomb detonated near their convoy, military
officials said.

U.S. Officials Say Iraq's Forces Founder Under Rebel Assaults
Iraqi police and national guard forces, whose performance is crucial to
securing January elections, are foundering in the face of coordinated
efforts to kill and intimidate them and their families, say American officials in the provinces facing the most violent insurgency. For months,
Iraqi recruits for both forces have been the victims of assassinations and
car bombs aimed at lines of applicants as well as police stations.

Board Accepts Nuclear Vow by Iranians
In a defeat for the Bush administration, the 35-country ruling board of
the International Atomic Energy Agency passed a mildly worded resolution on Monday welcoming Iran's total freeze on a sensitive part of its
nuclear program. The resolution, passed by consensus without a vote,
removes the possibility that the group will drag Iran before the United
Nations Security Council for possible censure or even sanctions.

Bush Says Iran Must Go Beyond Nuclear Suspension
President Bush on Tuesday welcomed a decision by Iran to freeze sensitive nuclear activities but said that was not the final step and the Islamic republic needed to go further to show its commitment to abandoning nuclear weapons ambitions. "The Iranians agreed to suspend but not terminate their nuclear weapons program. Our position is that they ought to terminate their nuclear weapons program," Bush said during a joint news conference with Canadian Prime Minister Paul Martin.

U.S. Rejects Guantanamo Detainee Torture Claims

The International Committee of the Red Cross has accused the U.S. military of using tactics "tantamount to torture" on prisoners at the U.S. Naval base at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, a claim the Pentagon flatly rejected. Responding to a leaked ICRC memorandum in The New York Times on Tuesday, the Pentagon strongly denied allegations of abuse of prisoners being held at the base and the State Department said it believed detainees were treated humanely.

Bush Nominates Kellogg Executive for Commerce Secretary
President Bush on Monday nominated Carlos M. Gutierrez, among the
most prominent Hispanic business executives in the United States, to be
his commerce secretary, as the president continued with what
Republicans said would be a broad overhaul of his cabinet. Mr.
Gutierrez, 51, has been chief executive of the Kellogg Company, the
cereal maker, for more than five years, and has built a reputation as an
innovative and forceful business leader with broad international experience.

Car Bomb Kills Seven, Wounds 20 in Iraq
A car bomb in a crowded market north of Baghdad killed at least seven civilians and wounded 18 Tuesday as a U.S. military patrol passed by. As well as daily attacks on Iraqi security forces and civilians, November has been one of the deadliest months for U.S. troops, with at least 134 killed

-- just one short of the figure in April which was the highest monthly toll so far. The U.S. military says it expects violence to escalate before elections scheduled for Jan. 30.

Oil Prices Slip, Winter Supplies Seen Up
Oil prices fell on Tuesday as an expected increase in U.S. heating fuel supplies eased concerns over an inventory crunch should this winter's

supplies eased concerns over an inventory crunch should this winter's weather prove colder than normal. New York crude futures settled down 63 cents to \$49.13 a barrel, reversing an earlier rally that had brought prices over \$50 on production problems from oil fields in the North Sea and eastern Canada. London Brent crude fell 24 cents to \$45.48 a barrel.

Israeli Coalition Crisis May Force Early Election

Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon's shaky coalition Tuesday faced collapse in a row over the 2005 budget, raising the prospect of early elections that would endanger his plan to withdraw from the Gaza Strip. His largest partner, the secular Shinui party, ignited the crisis by saying it would oppose the 2005 budget at its first reading in parliament Wednesday. Sharon's aides said he would dismiss Shinui if it defied him in the vote.

Shiites End Talks With Al-Sistani Group

A group of 38 Shiite Muslim political parties broke off negotiations Tuesday with backers of Iraq's most influential Shiite cleric, claiming a candidate list under discussion was dominated by religious extremists. "We don't want to be an extension of Iran inside Iraq," said Hussein al-Mousawi, spokesman for the Shiite Political Council. "We found out that the top 10 names in the list are extremist Shiite Islamists who believe in the rule of religious clerics."

Iraqi officials Tuesday appealed to neighboring countries to do more to
stop the cross-border activities of rebels whose relentless attacks have
cast doubt on whether Jan. 30 elections can be held on time. Iraq's interim government is determined to go ahead with the elections as scheduled, despite daily attacks on Iraqi security forces and civilians which

inquiries have been conducted into the prisoner abuse scandal, and three
more reports are pending. "Results show the actions depicted in the Abu
Ghraib abuse photos were not the result of US policy," said the







#### Hunters to converge on county for opening of pheasant season

The population of Hansford County may double this weekend with the start of the 2004 pheasant season on Saturday,

Beginning this year, the season will start on the first weekend in December rather than the second weekend of the month and will be an extended season of 30 days.

The season will begin Saturday, December 4 and run through Sunday, January 2, according to Mike Wheat, Texas Game Warden for Ochlitree and Hansford counties.

Game Warden Wheat stated that the 2004 limit will be two pheasant cocks per day per hunter. A hunter may have no more than twice the bag limit or four birds in possession. With pheasant numbers up, Wheat did not think county hunters would have a problem reaching their limit.

"Hunters may encounter some problems with wet fields and mud," Wheat said. "It may be hard for hunters to get around."

In the way of advice for hunters, Wheat emphasized the need for hunters to take the Hunters" Safety Course. The course is mandatory for all hunters born after September 2, 1971.

Several county organizations such as the Morse Lions Club and Alpha Mu Psi of Gruver are seeking to raise funds by sponsoring hunts or breakfasts for hunters.





## Items needed for soldiers at Landstuhl hospital

Editor's Note: My daughter, (victory3n1@hotmail.com) Jennifer McNulty sent me the following letter from Mary Beth Sanders, a volunteer at Landstuhl Regional Medical Center in Germany, where many of our wounded soldiers are sent for medical treatment.

If you would like to make a donation, you may bring your items to the Reporter-Statesman, 213 Main Street, in Spearman.

Wounded soldiers arrive at Landstuhl Hospital with only the clothes on their back. This may be the uniform they were wearing when they were injured, or a hospital gown if they were sent to a field hospital prior to being sent to Landstuhl. Obviously, neither of the above is suitable to wear for travel when they leave the hospital, regardless of their destination.

There is a Clothing Closet set up to provide clothing for our brave young soldiers during their stay at the hospital and for their flight home, 100% of which is donated from all over the United States: families, schools, churches, organizations, clubs, and businesses.

The heartfelt appreciation and gratitude expressed by the soldiers when they receive these items is overwhelming. Unfortunately, supplies have been seriously depleted. The Clothing Closet is in dire need of new, unused sweat shirts, sweat pants, and long-sleeve T-shirts in sizes Medium through XXL. They will be distributed to our military personnel who are being treated there or being transferred. These items should not have any organizational logos on them; however, name-brand logos are acceptable.

Many of the bases in Europe are conducting drives to provide the above mentioned articles of clothing. However, due to limited shopping opportunities here, we cannot purchase enough to satisfy the need. Our local military exchanges do not carry a sufficient inventory of these articles, and are prevented from ordering large numbers unless they are pre-paid.

Also, men's boxer shorts, all sizes would be helpful. And since there are some female patients, something feminine would be nice.

Phone cards are greatly appreciated. They would not have as many units available because it would be an overseas call, but they would make it possible for the soldiers to contact their loved ones, especially those who face an extended stay in the hospital.
