Clinton must release brakes on Community banks

After many months of campaign results is here. Bill Clinton pre sides in the Oval Office and the mystery of the moment is how he will structure the economic stimulus package he has promised for so many months. To succeed, the President must do two things at
once: rev up our economic engine and release the brakes.

Today our banks are laboring under an unending Certainly there is a need for the fundamental bank regulations guarantee bank safety and soundness. The public has a right to a secure banking system. However, one banking information services company has estimated that the cumulative stack of laws and regulations, changes and updates governing today's financial institutions exceeds 200,000 pages and is growing every day.
Putting an exact dollar figure on the burden is difficult. The American
Bankers Association (ABA) found that banks spent $\$ 10.7$ billion in Bankers Association (ABA) found that banks spent $\$ 10.7$ billion in
1991 -or 59 percent of their annual 1991 -or 59 percent of their annual profits-simplykeeping pace with
industry rules and regulations. A separate, more aderal Financial Institutions Examination Council blaced that burden is that banks are finding it increasingly difficult to sume their customers in the face of this paperwork blitz.
At President Clinton's economic summit in Little Rock, Arkansas, the
