Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: Soilmoisture levels were improved by 0.5 inch to 5 inches of rain. Many counties reported record or near-record amounts of rain for April. Wheat looked good, and the rain was particularly welcomed by dryland wheat growers. Reports of insects were few, but weed control was still a problem in some areas. Some producers started to plant corn, but they were stopped due to rain and cooler temperatures. However, as the soil temperatures rise back up to the mid to upper 50s, the rains will help with the remaining corn to be planted. There should still be plenty of soil moisture for silage and sorghum when planting begins near the end of April. Pastures looked good as spring growth came on. Livestock producers were winding down supplemental feeding of cattle.

Third Cutting tied with Don't Look Twice and Phil Rapp of Weatherford. The winning horses' owners each pocketed \$43,265.

Rice also finished 17th in the 5-and 6year-old Classic finals aboard Peptos Stylish Sue with a marking of 211 (\$6,788).

After competing in the 4-year-old open finals, Rice tied for 10th on a first-year mount named Boonie Tunes with a 215. The strong finish earned the horse's owner, Danny Poole of Texline, \$26,620.

Lee Francois of Murchison and Reys Desire won the 4-year-old open title with a 224. The victory earned Alabama owner HB Bartlett the \$112,599 first place prize. The Super Stakes 4-year-old open divi-

sion is the second jewel of the NCHA's Triple Crown Series.

USDA's Farm Service Agency Reminds Producers to File Annual Report of Acreage to Meet Farm Program Requirements

Agency (FSA) in Hansford County today reminded producers to submit their annual report of acreage to their local FSA county office to meet FSA program eligibility requirements.

Producers must file their reports accurately and timely for

Rick Hargrove, Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service all crops and land uses, including prevented and failed acreage, to ensure they receive the maximum FSA program benefits possible," said Hargrove.

Accurate acreage reports are necessary to determine and maintain eligibility for various programs, such as the Direct and Counter-cyclical Program and newer programs authorized in the 2008 Farm Bill. Programs include the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program (SURE), Average Crop Revenue Election Program (ACRE), Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), Tree Assistance Program (TAP), and Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm Raised Fish Program (ELAP).

Acreage reports are considered timely filed when completed by the applicable final crop reporting deadline, which may vary from state to state. Prevented acreage must be reported within 15 calendar days after the final planting date. Failed acreage must be reported before the disposition of the crop. Producers should contact their county FSA office if they are uncertain about reporting deadlines.

Late-filed provisions may be available to producers who are unable to meet the reporting deadline as required. Reports filed after the established deadline must meet certain requirements to

be accepted and may be charged late fees. Producers should visit their county FSA office to complete acreage reporting. For questions on this or any FSA program, including specific crop reporting deadlines and planting dates, producers should contact their county FSA office. The Texas Ethics Commission recently approved new rules requiring public disclosure of direct campaign expenditures by corporations and unions to

The rule comes in the wake of the Citizens United U.S. Supreme Court case, which took the lid off donations to candidates.

Extending the disclosure requirement "would favor the public interest by providing information to the public regarding efforts to influence elections through spending," according to the draft language adopted by the Commission.

Every day is Earth Day at TxDOT

On April 20, two days in advance of Earth Day, a Texas Department of Transportation news release said every day is Earth Day for the agency.

The main reason is that TxDOT is one of the state's leading consumers of recycled goods, such as roofing scraps, old tires, worn asphalt and other materials that Texans normally pitch into landfills. For example, in 2009, TxDOT used for than 2.8 million tons of reclaimed asphalt and about 780,000 tires worth of scrap rubber.

The agency pointed to its fleet of more than 3,300 alternative fuel and hybrid vehicles as an example of and proceed toward career its efforts to improve air quality and the fact that it offers an annual clean air incentive program for department staff. The program encourages the use of public transit, carpooling and brown-bagging a lunch to further reduce emissions.



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
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My Pepa, My Hero





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

Indian Pit Houses

were quite interested in the remains of Indian rock houses in the Panhandle. Not far east of Lake Palo Duro is Buried City, which has been known for over 100 years for its stone houses. Another well known center is around Lake Meredith. Pit houses, on the other hand, have been harder to find and identify. In the last ten years, science has provided tools to make geophysical investigation,

"ground truthing", easier. They check the magnetic field gradient, electrical resistance, and use ground penetrating radar. Now

several pit houses are

being worked on.

Pit houses are generally rectangular areas dug into the ground up to three or 4 feet deep with cedar posts set in the ground on corners and in the interior for the roof supports. The walls are constructed of smaller vertical picket posts. There is an east-facing entry way into a central channel flanked by earth from clay is in the center. Quite often the floor and the benches are covered with a caliche plaster. These small shelters had a Early day archaeologists life of seven to 15 years. The Indians had learned to char the tips of the cedar posts they buried to make them last longer.

Some earlier archaeologists thought the pit houses predated the rock houses. but the carbon dating found both types with the same dating.

My next column, May 10, will be on what we know about the people who dug these pit houses.
