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PDRA hires Derington as assistant manager

The Palo Duro River Authority hired Jim Derington to the assistant manager position during the regular meeting Tuesday, Aug. 10.

Mr. Derington was selected after the board interviewed the two finalists. According to General Manager Johnnie Lee, Derington is scheduled to begin September 1. Lee added that he is planning to retire October 1 but will be re-

tained as a consectant.

In other business, the board approved the 1993-94 fiscal year budgets for the maintenance fund, park fund, project fund and debt service

fund. Lee said, "I do not anticipate atax increase. The budget will probably take a 3 percent increase because of inflation. That's not very much." He added that the maintenance budget will probably increase by \$3,000 or \$4,000.

Medi-Vac helicopter lands in Spearman

On Friday, Aug. 13, the Medi-Vac helicopter based at North West Texas Hospital in Amarillo landed at 1:30 p.m. in front of the Hansford Hospital.

Personnel making this trip to the Hansford Hospital were Dr. Vaughn, medical director, AERC; Mary Irwin, neo-natal nurse; Kevin Gross, chief executive officer (CEO); and Rick Mercier, pilot.

According to Gross, the team has been visiting several cities during the week to familiarize them with the services. In addition to the CEO and pilot, the helicopter will carry one nurse and one paramedic in the adult cases, and one neo-natal nurse and one respiratory therapist in neo-natal infant

Gross reported that the Medi-Vac crew has a five minutes response time to the hospital. For example, it will take 30 minutes to travel to Spearman for a total of 35 minutes from the time of the call for the crew to arrive at Hansford Hospital. This is possible because the pilot quarters are within 50 feet of the chopper, Gross stated

Medi-Vac will cover a 150 mile radius, covering 26 counties in the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles and parts of east New Mexico. The crew can travel farther if necessary, but the helicopter would have to be refueled. Gross explained that the helicopter can travel 300 miles before having to refuel.

To use the Medi-Vac helicopter there is a \$950 lift-off fee plus \$32 per mile once the patient is on the helicopter.

The Medi-Vac helicopter was dedicated at 10 a.m. on Monday. Aug. 16, in Amarillo. Medi-Vac was made available for service at 11 a.m. the same day. The services are available seven days a week, 24 hours a day.

The Free Lunch Myth

when I entered the business world are usually not aware of value was: Never pass up a free lunch. added manufacturing taxes, cor-Years later, I learned one of life's greatest lessons: There are no free

In business, education, government or personal matters, there are no free rides and no free meals. The promise of something for nothing, with rare charitable exceptions, is a false promise.

Right now, politicians are propagating a subtle, but vicious myth in Washington and in some state capitols around the country. The myth is that when our government gets involved in providing services to deserving citizens, the services are

Recently, while standing in line at the grocery store, I overheard two local folks discussing the national healthcare issue. Both were employed, but apparently their employers were unable to provide healthcare coverage to their fami-

The first stated that he would be glad when the new administration started providing free medical benefits. The second person agreed immediately and stated that her family had no coverage because they simply could not afford it. Both expressed the opinion that the federal government should provide basic healthcare coverage for them.

Someone pays Unfortunately, there is a widespread misunderstanding of how government programs really work. Before we go on, let me remind you there are no free lunches.

Please allow me to review Free Enterprise Economics 101. First, government revenues come from taxes. Some of these taxes are highly visible to every employed American. The federal income taxes and FICA or self employment taxes we see stripped out of every paycheck are visible examples.

Other taxes are nearly hidden. For example, we seldom think about the 34 cents per gallon gasoporate income taxes and other subtle little tariffs that are levied by the federal government.

Where do these taxes come from? Ultimately, all taxes come from "we the people" or more accurately 'we the employed people." The root source is profitable business. All government revenue comes from profitable businesses and their employees.

I believe that government can be, and should be run more like a business. I mean a well-managed, task-oriented, cost-efficient business. Many doubt that our federal government can really run like a business. However, I believe it can, if we want it to and if we're willing to pay for our own lunches as we go.

Paying for lunch The problem comes in when we have to pay for lunch. History hows us that every time our government takes on additional roles, taxpayers pay more than when the private sector supplies those services.

History also shows that as the government takes on more services, it grows in other areas too. That growth has always led to higher levels of regulation which generates more growth and requires even more taxes to sustain it. Taxes, you may recall, come from the employees of private sector businesses.

Yes, I know that government workers pay taxes, too. However, every penny of their wages comes from private sector taxes. The fact interest call us!! that they put a small portion back into the tax pool does not alter the original source.

We must keep as many services as possible in the control of the private sector. For example, transferring or nationalizing the healthcare system will not make medical care more affordable. History shows that costs will go up and the level of service will decline.
