Lynx Lasso Roughriders

The Lynx went to Sunray Friday night hoping to put another victory under their belt. After a slow start, the Lynx started rolling and ended up beating Sunray 35-6. Sunray was not holding anything back as they tried everything to beat the Lynx, but it just didn't happen. They were blitzing linebackers all night and throwing halfback passes and doing what they could to try and catch the Lynx off guard. The Lynx defense came up big as they were responsible for two touchdowns of their own. Homer Munoz pickup up a Sunray fumble and ran it in for a touchdown, and Jeramy Mackie intercepted a pass and returned it for another touchdown.

Spearman won the toss and elected to receive from the south end zone. After Jordan (Bucko) Brock returned the opening kickoff to the 20 yard line, the Lynx offense made one first down and then had to punt to Sunray. Sunray started their first drive at their own 32 yard line. They did not waste any time with the trickery as they threw a half back pass the first play from scrimmage that was complete, and they ran it all the way down to the Lynx 27. That must have been a wake up call for the Lynx because the Lynx defense stiffened, and they held Sunray on 4th and 11, and Spearman took over on downs

The Lynx did not waste much time on their next possession that started from their own 33 yard line. Just a few plays later, Aaron Winegarner threw a screen pass to John Brock on 2nd and 10, and Brock dashed 55 yards for Spearman's first touchdown of the night with 4:20 left in the first quarter. Teddie Whitefield's PAT was good, and the Lynx led 7-0.

The Bobcats next possession

started on their own 25. They ran two plays and picked up two quick first downs. This did not look good for the Lynx, but the Lynx defense once again rose to the occasion. On 3rd and 11, Sunray ran a middle screen, but Spearman's Dusty Barber was there to make the stop short of the first down. Sunray then lined up to punt the ball, but ran a fake and picked up the first down, but they were called for holding and that nullified the first down. They ended up punting this time, and the Lynx took over on their own 23 with :57 seconds left in the first quarter. Several plays later, Sunray stopped the Lynx on 3rd and 8 from the Sunray 39, and the Lynx had to punt.

After punting the ball into the end zone, the Bobcats started on their own 20 yard line. Sunray made one first down, then the Lynx defense held, and Sunray had to punt back to the Lynx. With 4:41 left in the half, Spearman started from their own 36. After several plays of hard-nose, run it in your face football, Spearman's Winegarner threw deep to Bucko who had his man beat deep and trotted into the end zone for the touchdown. Whitefield's PAT was good and Spearman led 14-0.

The Bobcats started this drive on their own 24 with time running out in the first half. Sunray drove the ball down to the Spearman 35 vard line with 1:10 left. Two plays later, on 2nd and 10 from the 20 with :32 left, Sunray threw a pass into the end zone. The Spearman defender had good coverage, but the ball got tipped into the air and a secondary Sunray receiver was close by and caught the ball for a touchdown. The PAT kick failed, and the Lynx still led 14-6. The Lynx ran out the clock, and that was the score at half time.


Spearman kicked off to start the

second half and on the first play from scrimmage, Sunray fumbled the snap and Spearman recovered at the Bobcat 23 yard line. Spearman drove down to the 6 where they had a first and goal. On 2nd and 6, Spearman got flagged for a personal foul that backed them up 15 yards. Sunray's defense held, and they took over on downs at the 16. The Bobcats could not move the ball on the stingy defense of the Lynx, and they went 3 and out and punted back to the Lynx.

The Lynx started this drive on the Sunray 33 with 6:21 left in the 3rd quarter. The Lynx had a 3rd and 9 from the 32 when Kelsey Henton ran around the right end for a first down, but Spearman was called for holding. Spearman ended up having to punt. They punted into the end zone, and Sunray started from their own 20 yard line. On the first play from scrimmage, Sunray fumbled the ball, and Spearman's Homer Munoz was there to scoop it up and he rumbled 20 yards into the end zone for a TD with 4:18 left in the 3rd quarter. Whitefield's PAT kick was good, and the score was 21-6.

Sunray could not move the ball after starting from their own 13 and had to punt to the Lynx. Spearman started this drive on their own 40 with :34 left in the 3rd quarter. The Lynx drove down to the Sunray 24 and had a 1st and 10. On the next play from scrimmage, Barber broke loose around the left end and dashed 24 yards for the touchdown. The PAT was good, and the Lynx increased their led to 28-6 with 9:58 left in the game.

Sunray started their next possession on their own 29 yard line. The Lynx defense held the first three downs. On 4th down, the Bobcats

tried another fake punt, but this time they made enough for the first down out to their own 41. After another first down, a pass interference call, and a completed pass, Sunray had a first and 10 on the Spearman 14 yard line. The Spearman defense withstood another test as they held Sunray on 4th and 5 from the 9 with 5:05 left in the game

The Lynx had to punt the ball back to Sunray after the Bobcat defense held Spearman on their next possession. Sunray started their last drive from the Lynx 41 with 3:13 left in the game. A few plays later, the Bobcats were deep into Lynx territory when Jeramy Mackie stepped in front of a Sunray receiver and out ran every-body 85 yards for another Lynx touchdown with 1:51 left in the 4th quarter. The PAT was good, and Spearman led 35-6. Sunray got the ball back one more time, but the

Lynx beld on 4th down and then ran out the clock, and the final score was 35-6 Spearman.

Spearman is now 2-0 in district play and now they will take on the West Texas Comanches. This will be a much tougher game than last week, so the Lynx better be ready to play. West Texas always plays hard when district rolls around. As fans let's show a lot more spirit and enthusiasm next week so we can cheer our Lynx on to victory! Another great job Lynx! Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Effective October 6, 1999, Hansford County, Texas was designated as a primary natural disaster area based on the damages and losses caused by hail and a tornado that occurred on June 29, 1999. Hutchinson, Moore, Ochiltree, Roberts and Sherman counties in Texas were also named as contiguous disaster counties. This designation makes family-sized farm operators in both the primary and contiguous counties eligible to be considered for low interest emergency loans from the Farm Service Agency (FSA). FSA will consider each loan application by taking into account the extent of losses, security available, repayment ability, and other eligibility requirements. Farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business. whichever is less (maximum amount \$500,000).

The farmers must be unable to obtain credit from private comnercial lenders to be eligible for the emergency loans.

The interest rate on the actual loss loan is 3.75%

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent oss of production to be eligible for an emergency loan. Proceeds rom crop insurance are taken into account when determining eligi oility

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be ccepted until June 6, 2000 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Applications may be obtained at the local FSA Office.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) prohibits discrimination in its programs on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, and marital or familial status (Not all prohibited bases apply to all programs). 





Businesses are small shops, sparsely stocked, and there are many street vendors.

Packs of vicious dogs roam the streets, especially at night. Larry had to use pepper spray on a pack.

He and four other police officers rent a house together. The owners moved in with relatives to make it available. The washing machine holds about 1/4 of a load and takes three hours to wash. The clothes are then hung in the attic to dry.

Cooking is an adventure. Larry said he ate only fruits and vegetables for the first month as good meat was not available. Finally they found a good butcher. They learned which day he butchered, and get there early for fresh meat.

The Albanians nod their heads up and down for "no" and sideways to express "yes.

Larry receives little news, only when one of the group goes to the Larry was thankful for his hat. If the U.N. succeeds in restoring order and a viable government, he expects to return next summer to his family here.







Boys Ranch fumbled the kick off and Spearman recovered on the Roughrider's 32 yard line. Two plays later, John Brock ran it in from 15 yards out for another touchdown with 4:07 left in the first quarter. Aaron Winegarner threw to Bucko in the corner of the end zone for a two point conversion and the Lynx led 14-0.

Boys Ranch started on their own 36, but the Lynx defense stiffened and they went three and out and had to punt. Spearman started on their own 47. Two plays later, Winegarner threw a strike to Bucko over the middle and he ran it down to the Boys Ranch 35. John Brock ran around the left end on the very next play for 35 yards and another touchdown with :46 seconds left in the first quarter. Whitefield's kick was good and the score was 21-0. Boys Ranch started their next possession on their own 11, but the same thing happened again: three and out. After punting to the Lynx, Spearman started on their own 45. Four plays later behind great blocking by the offensive line, Dusty Barber ran up the middle and he rumbled 20

yards for his first TD of the night. Whitefield's kick was good and the score was 28-0 with 10:14 left in the half.

The Ranch started on their own 30 yard line. They had a 4th and 1 from the 39 and the Lynx defense came up big again as the Lynx stopped them for no gain and Spearman took over at the 39. Several plays later, the Lynx drove the ball down to the three yard where John Brock ran it up the middle for his fourth TD of the night with 5:18 left in the first half. Whitefield's kick was good and the Lynx increased their lead to 35-0.

After the Lynx defense once again did not let Boys Ranch have a first down, the Ranch had to punt back to Spearman where they started this drive on the Boys Ranch 44 yard line. The high powered Lynx offense did not waste much time in scoring again. On the first play from scrimmage, Kelsey Henton broke loose around the right end and out ran the Roughrider's defense to the end zone from 44 yards out with 3:21 still left in the half. Whitefield's kick was once again good and Spearman led 42-0.

On their seventh possession of the first half, Boys Ranch finally made a couple of first downs. They started on their own 23 yard line and after a couple of pass completions, they had a first down at the Lynx 46. Several plays later, they threw a long pass down field that was complete and the receiver ran it in for a touchdown with 1:08 left in the second quarter. The PAT run was good and the Lynx led 42-8. Time expired after that and that was the score at half time.

Spearman kicked off to start the second half and once again the Roughrider offense could not move the ball on Spearman's dominating defense. Boys Ranch went three and out and Spearman started this drive on their own 27. On the first play from scrimmage, John Brock broke loose again and raced 73 yards for his fifth TD of the night. Whitefield's kick was good and Spearman led 49-8 with 9:52 left in the 3rd quarter.

Boys Ranch did make one first down on their next drive before having to punt back to the Lynx. Spearman started this drive on their own 45 yard line. 



House Passes \$8.7 Billion In Emergency Farm Relief

second consecutive year of the worst farm crisis in recent memothe U.S. House of

Representatives today passed by a vote of 240 to 175, the FY 2000 Appropriations Agriculture Conference Report which contains \$8.7 billion in emergency farm relief.

"There is no doubt we needed to pass this legislation," said House Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest (R-TX). "But, in the future, Congress has to strengthen the farm safety net so we can move away from ad hoc funding every time there are crop losses or low prices. That is why the Committee is going to begin a comprehensive review of farm policy early next year."

Included in the emergency farm relief package:

· Market Loss Payments totaling \$5.5 billion and equal to 100% of a producer's 1999 AMTA payment to be delivered within 2 weeks of enactment.

· \$475 million in direct payments to oilseed producers.

 \$1.2 billion in Production Loss Payments to producers who suffered weather-related losses in 1999.

• \$650 million in Crop Insurance Premium Assistance to provide a premium discount to producers who purchase crop insurance in the 2000 crop year.

· \$201 million to fully fund Cotton Step 2.

· An increase in the payment limitation for Loan Deficiency Payments and Marketing Loan

As farmers and ranchers face the Gains from \$75,000 to \$150,000. · \$125 million in dairy assistance

> \$200 million in assistance for livestock producers.

"Farmers and ranchers are facing hard times around the country, and this relief is essential to helping them get through this year." Combest said. "I only hope that Secretary Glickman gets these payments out on time rather than repeat the extreme delays farmers experienced last year.'

Over \$100 Million Available For Panhandle Farmers

Rep. Larry Combest announced that over \$100 million in Market loss Assistance payments will be available for farmers in the 19th district of Texas, which were included in the emergency aid portion of the FY 2000 Agriculture Appropriations bill passed by the House of

Representatives last week. "With American farmers facing another year of financial crisis, these payments will be instrumental in helping ease some of their financial burdens," Combest stated. "In addition, this legislation allows farmers the option of receiving all of their FY 2000 payments beginning October 1, in the hopes that they could better cope with any cash shortages they may endure.

The Market Loss Assistance Payments will be equivalent to the FY 1999 Agricultural Market Transition Act (AMTA) payments that producers received earlier in the year. AMTA payments are annual payments made to producers who have entered into a Production Flexibility Contract with Commodity Credit Corporation for crop years 1996-2002. The payments will be made available upon Senate passage of the FY 2000 Agriculture Appropriations bill.

The following counties in the 19th district of Texas will receive these approximate amounts: Andrews - \$800,000, Bailey - \$4.6 million. Cochran - \$3.8 million, Dallam - \$5.6 million, Deaf Smith - \$9.9 million, Gaines - \$10 million, Hansford - \$6.4 million, Hartley - \$4.4 mil lion, Hockley - \$6.9 million, Lubbock - \$9.4 million, Midland - \$1 mil lion, Moore - \$6.4 million, Ochiltree - \$5.3 million. Oldham - \$1.2 million, Parmer - \$12.4 million, Randall - \$2.4 million, Sherman - \$6.3 million, Terry - \$7.8 million, Yoakum - \$3.7 million, TOTAL - \$108.3 MILLION.

Bill Helps Farmers & Ranchers Protect Against Losses

By voice vote, the U.S. House of Representatives on Wednesday approved major improvements to federal crop insurance law. H.R. 2559, The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 1999, makes across-the-board cuts in farmerpaid premiums, provides affordable insurance that protects pro-'ucers against price and production volatility, increases producers' insurable yields, and initiates new risk management for livestock producers.

The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 1999 strengthens the farm safety net by making crop insurance more accessible to growers of all crops. House Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest (R-TX) said this major reform effort reduces the need for producer dependence on Congress to cobble together improvised and costly disaster assistance packages.

"This is Phase One of Congress' commitment to provide our nation's farmers with the strong safety net they need," said Combest. "Producers already struggle more than enough to meet the uncertainties of markets and weather, but it is too much to ask that they struggle year after year without the means to manage their risk through an effective crop insurance program. Making federal crop insurance affordable and effective is sound policy. "The changes in crop insurance contained in H.R. 2559 allow us time to review and develop a comprehensive look at our long-term farm policy," said Charlie Stenholm, the House Agriculture Committee's ranking minority member. Features of The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 1999 · Strengthens the farm safety net by making crop insurance more accessible to growers, reducing the need for unbudgeted ad hoc disaster assistance.

· Helps farmers protect against declining prices and farm income by making more affordable insurance coverage that protects farmers not only against crop losses, but declining prices as well.

· Makes revenue insurance, including Adjusted Gross Revenue (AGR), Crop Revenue Coverage, and other policies developed (such as cost of production insurance) more affordable so farmers can better protect their bottom line.

· For the first time, offers assistance to livestock ranchers seeking risk management tools to combat the adverse financial impact of volatile weather and markets.

· Helps farmers protect more of what they grow by limiting any reduction in insurable yields due to crop losses from a natural disaster. (Under this bill, 60 percent of the county's average yield would be the lowest yield assigned to a farmer for a crop year when actual production history is calculated to arrive at insurable yields.)

· Instead of settling for coverage that insures 50 percent of yield and 55 percent of the crop's market value, farmers will be offered area yield insurance that carries a higher combination of yield and price protection.

Ever said to yourself, "I need to run in the store for just a minute, so it shouldn't hurt to park in the Disabled Parking slot," or "I'm going to park here because it's raining (or snowing)," or "it's late at night. Nobody's gonna need this spot." Well, if you have, the 76th Texas Legislature has a message for you. DON'T DO IT!

In the 75th session, the Texas lawmakers set stiffer penalties for folks not disabled choose to park in a s 'Handicap Parking Only.' The 76th session, which ended in May 1 999 upped the stakes a little. Beginning on September 1, 1999, the follow ing fine ranges apply to the first and subsequent convictions for this offense: First conviction - \$250 to \$500; Second conviction - \$300 to \$600 and 10 to 20 hours of community service; Third conviction - \$500 to \$1000 and not less than 20 hours or more than 50 hours of community service; Fourth conviction - \$1000 and 50 hours of community service. Keep in mind that court costs are added on top of the fine amounts above I asked a disabled person what she thought about the new fine amounts. She said she'd give that much to be able to walk.
