Hansford County receives \$74,303.01 in grant money

ORCA also provided license social worker Gail Petree with \$3,701.42 for loan repayment and stipend through funds from tobacco settlement money given to rural healthcare providers.


Cross Country Fans!

In honor of Veteran's Day I thought I would share the following information about the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

How many steps does the guard take during his walk across the Tomb of the Unknowns and why? 21 steps. It alludes to the twenty-one gun salute, which is the highest honor given any military or foreign dignitary.

How long does he hesitate after his about face to begin his return walk and why? 21 seconds for the same reason as answer number 1.

Why are his gloves wet? His gloves are moistened to prevent his losing his grip on the rifle.

Does he carry his rifle on the same shoulder all the time, and if not, why not? He carries the rifle on the shoulder away from the tomb. After his march across the path, he executes an about face, and moves the rifle to the outside shoulder.

How often are the guards changed? Guards are changed every thirty minutes, twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a

What are the physical traits of the guard limited to? For a person to apply for guard duty at the tomb, he must be between 5'10" and 6'2" tall and his waist size cannot exceed

Other requirements of the Guard:

They must commit 2 years of life to guard the tomb, live in a barracks under the tomb, and cannot drink any alcohol on or off duty for the rest of their lives. They cannot swear in public for the rest of their lives and cannot disgrace the uniform {fighting} or the tomb in anyway.

After two years, the guard is given a wreath pin that is worn on their lapel signifying they served as guard of the tomb. There are only 400 presently worn.

The guard must obey these rules for the rest of their lives or give up the wreath pin.

The shoes are specially made with very thick soles to keep the heat and cold from their feet. There are metal heel plates that extend to the top of the shoe in order to make the loud click as they come to a halt.

There are no wrinkles, folds or lint on the uniform. Guards dress for duty in front of a full-length mirror.

The first six months of duty a guard cannot talk to anyone, nor watch TV.

All off duty time is spent studying the 175 notable people laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery. A guard must memorize who they are and where they re interred. Among the notables are: President Taft, Joe E. Lewis (the boxer) and Medal of Honor winner Audie Murphy, {the most decorated soldier of WWII) of Hollywood fame.

Every guard spends five hours a day getting his uniforms ready for guard duty.

Grant them eternal rest, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them.

May God bless and keep you; May He make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you; May the Lord lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace. Numbers 6:24-26


Hargus To Participate In Scholarship, **Recognition Program**


Samantha Hargus of Spearman will participate in the "Distinguished Youth of Texas Scholarship and Recognition Program," November 26-28, 2004 in Austin.

Due to the unlikelihood that Hansford County Hospital District will receive the flu vaccine before the end of the year, residents will have to rely on other methods to prevent the flu.

The best bet this flu season? Wash your hands and cross your fingers.


Influenza Update

During week 43 (October 24 -October 30, 2004)*, influenza activity was low in the United States. Fifteen (1.4%) specimens tested by U.S. World Health Organization (WHO) National Respiratory and Enteric Virus Surveillance System (NREVSS) collaborating laboratories were positive for influenza. The proportion of patient visits to sentinel providers for influenzalike illness (ILI) and the proportion of deaths attributed to pneumonia and influenza were below baseline values. One state (New York) reported regional influenza activity, one (Texas) reported local activity, and 26 states and New York City reported sporadic influenza activity. Twenty states and the District of Columbia reported no influenza activity.

During week 43, 6.4% of all deaths reported by the vital statistics offices of 122 U.S. cities were reported as due to pneumonia or influenza. This percentage is below the epidemic threshold of 6.9% for week 43.

* Reporting is incomplete for this week. Numbers may change as more reports are received.

Tips to prevent the flu The most important thing that you can do to keep from getting sick

is to wash your hands. By frequently washing your hands you wash away germs that you have

picked up from other people, or from contaminated surfaces, or from animals and animal waste.

What happens if you do not wash your hands frequently? You pick up germs from other sources and then you infect yourself when you

- · Touch your eyes
- Or your nose · Or your mouth.

One of the most common ways people catch colds is by rubbing their nose or their eyes after their hands have been contaminated with the cold

You can also spread germs directly to others or onto surfaces that other people touch. And before you know it, everybody around you is getting

The important thing to remember is that, in addition to colds, some pretty serious diseases -- like hepatitis A, meningitis, and infectious diarrhea -- can easily be prevented if people make a habit of washing their When should you wash your hands?

You should wash your hands often. Probably more often than you do

now because you can't see germs with the naked eye or smell them, so you do not really know where they are hiding. It is especially important to wash your hands


