

Protection says that the number of deaths could be cut by taking two simple actions. First make sure the smoke alarms in your house are in working order, and have a home fire exit plan.

We are recognizing October as Fire Prevention Month this year by encouraging every family in Texas to prepare for fire emergencies," said Michael E. Hines, executive director of the Commission on Fire Protection. The Commission is a state agency that focuses on fire suppression and fire prevention across the state.



Mr. Simmons was denied bail, but his son was admitted to bail of \$400, and both were given a change of venue. Judge Hendricks gave as his reason for the change of venue that a trial alike fair and

impartial to the accused and the State can not be had in Hansford County where the prosecution is commenced and the defendant is alleged to have committed the offence as charged is sparsely settled with not over 150 qualified jurors in said county, and upon account of the notoriety that has been given to the case and the opinions that have been formed and expressed by the people and jurors of said County. The Judge on his own motion changed venue to the District Court of Roberts County, the same being one of the counties of this Judicial

The Judge also added that Roberts County did not have a safe jail and that J. M. Simmons should be sent to the Hemphill County Jail at Canadian.

We have been unable to find out what Bert Cator did with his prisoners before the arraignment. Marshall Cator does not remember a jail in the Courthouse.

Sesame Nutz Mix ceived fourteen dollars for scalps of 2 wolves and 2 coyotes. In 1895 Bert Cator received \$56 for scalps of 8 gray wolves and 4 coyotes. Rabbit scalps seemed to stay at a dollar a dozen.

TAES offering computer classes

Record keeping for virtually any introductory Quicken 7 classes to size farming or ranching operation can be overwhelming for most owners or managers. Now, Texas Agricultural Extension Service is offering producers a variety of programs which should help in transferring most of their business records onto computers.

"We've found a way to take a learning laboratory direct to producers and teach them how to use computers and the latest software as tools for managing their individual operation," said Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension Agricultural Economist of Amarillo. Amosson specializes in farm and ranch management economics and coordinates the shortcourses for the Panhandle.

Aided by its traveling computer education laboratory, Extension Service specialists are offering shortcourse participants "handson" learning in a setting completely outfitted with the latest technology in software and computers. Classes start in mid-October and run through March of next year. Computer shortcourses taught in the Panhandle will feature Quicken 7 and BUDPRO.

Each shortcourse will be taught in either two and one-day formats. Classes begin at 9 a.m. and end at 3:30 p.m. each day. The two-day course fee is \$75. Cost for a one day class is \$45.

BUDPRO is a new software package that assists in generating enterprise budgets and conducting sensitivity analyses. The registration fee for BUDPRO training makes the package (a \$100 value).

Quicken 7 is an inexpensive, easy to use record keeping program that is the most widely accepted accounting system package being adopted by agri-business operators.

Participants will attend class in a "hands-on" laboratory with 14 laptop computers. Class size is limited to that number. Couples who shares responsibility of farm and ranch management and record keeping can attend for one fee and use of one computer.



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



After a run by Jeramy Mackie, the Lynx running back, Aaron Winegarner, threw a perfect half back pass to Delozier for a 25 yard


touchdown pass with just 2 seconds left in the half. This time the 2 point conversion by Barber was good, and Spearman's youngest bunch was up by 14.

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

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




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For The Sbort Of It
