

USDA Issues Disaster Payments for Crop, Livestock and Feed Losses

Acting Agriculture Secretary Chuck was planted or prevented from being planted Conner announced that USDA will begin before Feb. 28, 2007. At this time, USDA is issuing payments today to tens of thousands of farmers and ranchers across the country who suffered losses because of natural dis-

"Numerous agricultural producers suf-fered financial hardships in recent years because of floods, wildfires, tornadoes and other weather-related disasters," Conner said. "These funds will provide assistance to producers affected by these disasters."

USDA is currently processing about \$1 billion in payments under the Crop Disaster Program, Livestock Compensation Program and Livestock Indemnity Program. Sign-up for these programs is ongoing. The programs provide payments to agricultural producers who suffered crop, livestock and feed losses in 2005, 2006, and before Feb. 28, 2007. But, producers must choose one year for

which to receive payments.

The Crop Disaster Program (CDP) provides benefits to farmers who suffered quantity and quality losses from natural disasters and related conditions that happened in 2005, 2006 and for 2007 crops if the crop

only compensating producers for quantity losses under this program. Payments for the quality losses will not be distributed until

early 2008, after sign-up for quality loss.

The Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) compensates livestock producers for feed losses resulting from natural disasters that occurred between Jan. 1, 2005, and Feb. 28, 2007. Producers who suffered losses caused by blizzards that started in 2006 and continued into 2007 are eligible.

Producers in primary or contiguous counties that were declared secretarial disaster areas or counties declared presidential disaster areas between Jan. 1, 2005, and Feb.

28, 2007, are also eligible. Additionally, USDA will soon issue more than \$11 million to Alabama, Florida, Idaho, Mississippi and Oklahoma through the LCP Catfish Grant Program. Alabama will receive \$3,121,477.94; Florida \$34,879.25; Idaho \$6,968.00; Mississippi \$8,123,840.88; and Oklahoma \$5,651.10. USDA also approved the following six states to receive funds through the Catfish Grant Program:

Arkansas, California, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana and Texas. USDA will distribute funds to the six states after they conduct sign-up and submit requests for payments. The Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP)

compensates livestock producers for livestock losses between Jan. 1, 2005, and Feb. 28, 2007, that were caused by natural disasters, including blizzards that started in 2006 and continued into 2007. Producers in primary or contiguous counties that were declared secretarial disaster areas or counties declared presidential disaster areas between Jan. 1, 2005, and Feb. 28, 2007, are

also eligible.

The "U.S. Troop Readiness, Veterans' Care, Katrina Recovery, and Iraq Accountability Appropriations Act, 2007," signed into law on May 25, 2007, by President Bush authorizes CDP, LCP and LIP. USDA's Farm Service

Agency (FSA) administers the programs. Farmers and ranchers can apply to receive benefits through these and other disaster programs by visiting their local FSA service center. Find more information about FSA disaster programs online at: http://disaster.fsa.usda.gov.







We enter the Season of AHA! Of discovery! Of Epiphany! We study Isaiah 60: 1-6, Psalm 72:1-7, 10-14, Ephesians 3: 1-12, and Matthew 2: 1-12. Isaiah gives a vision of Hope as God restores Jerusalem to glory for the benefit of all nations. The Psalmist sings of a King to Come, a Davidic king through whom the blessings of God shall flow to the

Paul imprisoned in Rome awaiting trial by the tyrant Nero writes that he is a prisoner for Christ Jesus. Paul wants all Christians to realize the enormous power of God which resides within them. He describes the grace which was granted him, and the mission entrusted to him. Jew and Gentile are sharers in the promise of Jesus Christ through the gospel. All believers now have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in Him. Grace is granted us by God that we may share it. Dear Christian, God can make His enemies prophetic voices for His truth!

Matthew shows us Magi seeking the child born King of the Jews. Now the magi were a Median tribe which came to be a tribe of priests in Persia. They were philosophers, healers, mathematicians, and astrologers. They interpreted dreams and foretold events. God had revealed to them the birth of His King. They appear at Jerusalem and ask, "Where is the child?" King Herod inquires of his chief priests and scribes, where the King is to be born. They cite Micah, in Bethlehem of Judah. Herod then called for the Magi and inquired when the star first appeared. He then sends them away to find the child and report to him. The Magi proceed eight miles south of Jerusalem and find the child.

As the Magi enter the house they see the child and Mary his mother, they kneel and pay homage. The gifts they present to the child, gold, frankincense and myrrh are symbolic. Gold is the gift for kings, frankincense is a gift for the priest who makes supplication to God, and myrrh is a gift for one who dies. The gifts they present were also practical They were valuable and no doubt assisted the holy family in their flight and sojourn in Egypt to escape Herod. The Magi being warned about Herod return home.

August Caesar quipped about Herod the Great by saying, "It is safer to be Herod's pig than Herod's son". Herod was so fearful of loosing power that he murdered his wife and her mother. He then assassinated his three sons. To him killing a few two year olds in Bethlehem was not a major undertaking.

The Holy Spirit revealed the coming of the King to non-Jews and to Jews alike. May the Holy Spirit surprise you this Epiphany Season!

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TEXAS Health Matters

Smoking Cessation

If you're among the 18 percent of adult Texans who smoke, odds are good that "stop smoking" appears high on your list of New Year's resolutions. The Department of State Health Services has some tips for turning that resolution into a reality.

"Smoking remains the leading cause of preventable death in our state," says Dr. David Lakey, the state's health commissioner. "A person under 50 who stops smoking today cuts their risk of dying in the next 15 years in half. No one thinks it's easy to quit smoking, but the health benefits will make that effort worthwhile."

Dr. Lakey advises smokers to set a date and develop a plan to stop smoking.

"Nicotine is a powerfully addictive drug so you should think about how you're going to cope with withdrawal symptoms," Dr. Lakey says. "Different strategies work for different people. The important thing is to have options that will help you get over the craving to smoke."

Many people benefit from using medications or nicotine replacement products, such as a nicotine patch or gum. Studies have found that smokers who use prescription medications or nicotine replacement products when they try to stop smoking double their chances of success.

The Department of State Health Services offers these tips for dealing with the side effects of nicotine withdraw-

Irritability or anxiety: Cut down on caffeine. Take deep breaths. Go for a stroil. American Cancer Society's Trouble sleeping: Take a warm bath. Drink herbal tea

or warm milk. Read. Trouble concentrating: Simplify your schedule for a few days. Make a "to do" list. Take a break.

Increased appetite: Drink more water, especially out of a sip bottle. Eat slowly. Snack on carrots, pickles, grapes or rice cakes.

Constipation: Eat more fresh fruit, vegetables and whole grains. Drink 6 to 8

glasses of water a day. Sore throat: Sip ice water. Suck on sugarless hard candy or lozenges.

Fatigue: Take a nap. Go to bed early. Try not to push yourself for two to four weeks.

"Remember that a withdrawal symptom or craving usually only lasts for a short time," Dr. Lakey says. "That feeling is going to pass in about 20 minutes whether you smoke or not."

It's also good to know what triggers your desire for a cigarette. For some people it's drinking coffee, driving or watching television. Try avoiding the activities or places that trigger your desire to smoke.

You can also replace your smoking habit with a healthy alternative, such as walking, drinking more water or eating more vegetables. The healthy activities will help you cope with nicotine withdrawal in addition to providing other benefits.

"One of the most important things to remember is to be patient," Dr. Lakey says. "Most people make several attempts to stop smoking before they are successful."

Dr. Lakey also recommends finding a supportive friend or family member who can help you through the cravings.


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
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
