Adult Lap Swim

The City of Spearman has received numerous requests for an adult lap swim time at the city pool. City Manager Ed Hanson has announced that the City will now offer the following swim times: Wednesday 6:30-7:30 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday 5:30-6:30 p.m.

The pool will be open for adults only. No one under 18 will be allowed in the pool area. No one will be allowed to use the kiddie pool or any of the slides. No one will be allowed to use the deep end of the pool. Children will not be allowed to sit inside the pool area while parents swim. This time will be strictly available for adults to use the swim lanes for exercise purposes only.

The charge is \$2 a session with a minimum of three swimmers needed to have a session.

Be Careful with Fireworks Use

For many, fireworks are an exciting part of Fourth of July celebrations. But the colorful fun they provide can easily turn into a dangerous situation if proper and safe use is not followed.

"It only takes a spark to start a wildfire," said Tom Spencer, fire risk assessment coordinator for Texas Forest Service. "Fireworks, especially aerial fireworks, can be the

source of that spark."

Much of the state is experiencing drought. As a result, the grasses in these areas have dried and are easily ignited. Spencer recommends keeping fireworks use well away from dry grass and other flammable vegeta-

tion, to prevent accidental fires.

The Texas Forest Service recommends the following precautions for safe fireworks use-

 Adhere to all county and city fireworks laws and restrictions

 Use fireworks outdoors, away from dry grass and buildings.

Follow label instructions on how to properly discharge fireworks.

• Only use fireworks with close adult supervision.

 Keep a bucket of water, wet towels and a garden hose nearby.

• Discard used fireworks; never try

to relight them.
• Allow used fireworks to cool thor-


oughly before handling to avoid possible burn injuries.

Caution is advised on fireworks use because of the potential they pose for starting wildfires. Texas Forest Service urges those celebrating the Fourth of July with fireworks to plan ahead and limit use of fireworks to areas where accidental fire

starts will not occur.

"Everyone doing their part will help make sure we all have a happy and safe Independence Day holiday," said Spencer.



AUSTIN - Gov. Rick Perry signed the 2010-2011 state budget and vetoed 35 bills two days before Sunday, June 21, the deadline for approving or vetoing legislation passed by the 81st Texas Legconsumption in a vehicle.

Perry said the final outcome of all bills would "move Texas in the right direction."

Now, here are samples of a few bills the governor vetoed: HB 130, creating a prekindergarten education grant program. In his veto state-

ment, Perry said a similar grant program already exists, and the new state budget contains \$25 million earmarked for HB 130, so the Texas Education Agency should use Texas Windstorm Insurance those funds to bring 21,000 more students into the existing program.

• HB 821, mandating that television manufacturers collect and recycle a quantity of televisions to be determined annually by the Texas Com- small business franchise tax mission on Environmental Quality.

• HB 1293, creating disclosure requirements and consumer education standards relating to the sale and marketing of life insurance and annuities.

"Although the bill establishes standards of transparency and improvements that are important, I believe it will do more harm than good" because it would create more opportunities for frivolous lawsuits, Perry said.

• HB 3481, authorizing the expunction of criminal records, including law enforcement case files, 180 days after an arrest if no formal misdemeanor or felony charges have been filed.

 HB 3485, relating to certain county, municipal, district, and other governmental functions, procedures, powers, duties, and services, including certain criminal procedures. "The bill's provision regarding physician liability was neither debated nor discussed, but rather amended onto this bill late in the ses-

"It risks unraveling the progress we made in curtailing excessive liability and ensuring that patients who need physicians will be able to find them," Perry said.







Words from Faith & Grace



by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister In the fourth week of Pentecost, we study 2

Samuel 11:1, 17-27, Psalm 130 (1), 2 Corinthians 8: 7-15, and Mark 5:21-43.

Samuel shows us David grieving for the loss of King Saul and his son, Jonathan, David's friend. These verses are a tribute to friendship. Jonathan although next in line for the throne. had all but conceded this position to David because of his love for David. David grieved over Saul who was King of Israel. the first anointed by the lord. Some may see David's praise of Saul to be a political move to help consolidate David's power by appealing to those loyal to Saul. We should receive from this scripture that the Christian should find in the church service of remembrance for a loved one a place where death can be faced realistically and a place where grief over loss can be safely expressed.

The Psalmist in his distress calls to the Lord, "Out of the depths, I cry to you, O Lord." When we face grave loss and sorrow, when depression dwells in our minds, out of the depths of our sorrow, we can call upon the Lord knowing that the Lord will hear us, comfort us, restore us.

Paul is soliciting aid for the impoverished mother church at Jerusalem. He uses five arguments for generosity: 1) The example of others, the Macedonians had given generously despite their own poverty; 2) The example of Jesus Christ who not only died on a cross for our sins, but even more, who left position in heaven to seek our redemption; 3) Paul cites the necessity of acting on the generous impulses that the Corinthians had when first hearing of Jerusalem's plight; 4) the example that life acts to balance their abundance with Jerusalem's needs. We can learn these same lessons from this scripture. Paul could have made this request an order but he made it a request. Hence, we learn that to be a 'giver,' it is necessary to give something of ourselves to make a "gift." As Jesus restored us, so should we restore others.

Mark tells of two healing miracles of Jesus. Jairus, who was the administrator of a synagogue, lays aside his pride and dignity of office to beg Jesus to heal his daughter. Jairus seeks Jesus out. Jesus consents to go with Jairus to heal his daughter. As he is enroute, a woman, suffering from a disorder of blood, which made her ritually unclean and excluded her from society, seeks Jesus out with the idea that if she can only touch his garment, she will be healed. Despite being surrounded by a crowd of people, Jesus asks, "Who touched me," The disciples think of Jesus as being 'out of it.' But the woman confesses' her action and Jesus tells her that her faith has cured her. Jesus continues on to Jairus' house and tells the professional mor to leave because the girl is only sleeping. The mourners laugh at Jesus. Jesus says in Aramaic, "Talitha cumi" which is "girl arise!" The girl rises. Jesus has restored woman to health and community; Jesus has resurrected a young girl from death to life. Jesus is master of healing and death. Jesus is Messiah!

May the Holy Spirit assure you of Jesus' gift of salvation and allow you to be a "giver."

Gruver School Board Reduces Taxes

The Gruver School Board approved a 20% reduction in the homestead values for the tax payers of Gruver ISD.

That will mean that if you have a homestead valued at \$75,000 it will only be taxed on \$60,000.

That is a savings \$156 in taxes.

GISD Makes Changes To Concurrent Classes

Gruver ISD has made changes regarding concurrent classes at Gruver High School for the 2009-2010 school year Due to a continuing financial deficit to the college fund (because of students failing or dropping the classes), Gruver ISD has set up some new guidelines for juniors and seniors who wish to enroll in concurrent classes.

All concurrent classes will be paid for up front by the student and his/her family. Upon completion of the course, said money will be refunded under these stipulations: students receiving a grade of "A" will receive a 100% refund with the student enrolled in a post secondary school; students receiving a "B" will receive a 50% refund with the student enrolled in a post secondary school; studente receiving a "C" will receive a 25% refund with the student enrolled in a post secondary school; students receiving a "D" or "F", and students who drop the class will not receive a refund

fund.
Gruver High School will not refund any cost for the

books required.

To qualify for concurrent classes the student must be a junior or senior, score a certain percentage on their TAKS test and/or take the Accuplacer test at a cost of \$10 before school starts.

Attached is a tentative list for the cost of each course offered at GHS through Frank Phillips. There are also books that will need to be purchased by the student.

Museum Musings

If you missed the quilt show, at the Museum, on June 13th, during the Heritage Days Celebration, you really missed a treat. There were many beautiful quilts on display.

Helen Neal, of Amarillo, historian of the Underground Railroad, had a display of her collection of information about the Railroad. This was not really a railroad, as we know one. The Underground Railroad was a secret way for slaves to get to freedom, by using quilts as signals. These quilts were hung on porches or clotheslines. Helen had made some quilts and quilt blocks that represented the quilts of that era. Each block had a meaning, instructions for slaves, telling them what to do or where to go on their way to freedom in Canada.

One pattern was the Bear's Paw, which meant to follow the bear's path through the woods. That one sounded very dangerous to me, but I guess it worked. These clues were not recognized by the general public. Only people helping to free slaves.

There is always something in history that pertains to your own life, if you have studied your family history. Helen had an article about slave travel, by the Underground Railroad, in Nodaway County, Missouri. My grandfather, True Ulmer, was born in this county. At one time, as a little girl, my mother, Marguerite Nelson, lived in this area.

It was a sad time when I went to the Post Office this week and saw the old Spearman Hotel smoldering. I knew it was going to be destroyed, by controlled burn-

ing, but I did not know when. A lot of history went up in smoke, but the building had become a hazard.

This building was the Palo Duro Hotel, that had been moved from Old Hansford in 1920, to Spearman. It was started in 1908 and finished in the spring of 1909. There are pictures of the hotel being moved in our Hansford County History books. Hansford hills were a problem for all things moved from Old Hansford to Spearman and Gruver, when the railroads came. (In the pictures in the history book, the sign on the hotel reads Pala Duro Hotel, with an a.)

One hundred years of history is gone! That hotel could have told us a lot of stories, if it could have talked.

The new sidewalks on Main Street are going to be so nice. I know getting them has been an inconvenience for the store owners and customers. (I had never taken my cleaning to the alley before.) It will be good for both, owners and customers, when the sidewalks are finished. So far, one block of Main, on the west side, is nearly complete.

Please visit the Stationmaster's House Museum, whenever you can. There is a lot of history to talk about there. Doris Breeden will be glad to show you through. She is the caretaker of the museum! The museum is open Tuesday through Saturday afternoons. Maybe you can add some information, to our collection of history, that we are not aware of. Summers are a great time for Family Reunions. Bring your family to see the museum and reminisce!







SEDCorp Project Holds Open House




