Spearman and Gruver name 13 to all-district

The Hansford Hoopsters may not be tying up their high-tops and hitting unbelievable treys any more, but their strenuous efforts and their relentless pursue of excellence have earned eleven top-notch players a spot on the all-district basketball team.

The district champions, the Lady Hounds of Gruver, had four of these outstanding athletes to make the honored list. Kaysha Cluck, a very aggressive sophomore, was one of two the youngest girls from Gruver to appear on this older-dominated list. The other of the two was electrifying sophomore Amber Murrell. Of course, when the Lady Hounds are mentioned, one must certainly think of junior sensation Molly McLain. Although McLain was out most of the season, the coaches of 1-

2A believed she had earned a spot on this group of athletes. To round out the list of talented gals, senior leader Julie Meyer was the only Lady Hound to finish her career with honors.

The Spearman Lynxettes finished their season impressively, although they were nudged out of a playoff spot. Only two girls from this young team, which dominated the court most of the season, made the selections. Basketball great junior Kara Townsen, the leader most of the time in most points scored, was one of these girls. In addition to this talented athlete, thrill-maker senior Ashley Shieldknight, also a high point maker, finished off the list of Spearman girls chosen for the honor.

No one can actually put a label

on the second place in district 1-2A Gruver Hounds. When it comes to talent and heart, the Hounds are more than plentiful. It is a big shock and surprise that out of this well-rounded ball club only two players made the all-district selections. Jace Dawson, a senior and a big part of the Hounds this year in points, but more importantly leadership, was the only senior guy to appear on the list. Big 6'2" Wylee Maupin, a junior, also proved he was just awesome this year by making the selections.

As for the Lynx of Spearman, one might say that they did not have the kind of season that was expected of them, but they did have two fabulous players to hit the all-district honors. Chad Wilkerson, a 5'8" senior, has been a household

name ever since his flag football days as a youngster, and this honor was no surprise to him or basketball fans. Another outstanding player to make all-district was the dunk man, Shad O'Quin. This 6'2" junior had an awesome year, and his efforts and talent earned him this rightful spot.

Spearman also had three more members of the basketball squad to make the team, however they are on the honorable mention team. The 3-point man, senior Heath Archer, appeared on the list, as well as juniors Jarod Huddleston and Dillon Miller.

Whether win or lose, all teams in the Hansford County area did an excellent job this year, and they, as well as their coaches, should be commended on a job well done.

More candidates sign-up for elections

Elections for Gruver and Spearman City Council and Spearman, Morse, and Gruver School Boards are not until May 6th, but people choosing to run are already starting to sign up.

The Spearman City Council has three positions open to be filled. To

date, there has been no change in those filing for these positions. Incumbents Steve Brown and Ed Gardner have again applied, as well

as new comer Brian Gillaspie.

The Spearman School Board is also up for elections this year. Craig

Schuman and Bob Boxwell have made their intentions to run known, and recently Archie Smith added his name to the list.

Gruver City Council, so far has two names listed for the positions available. Archie Nelson has applied for Mayor, and new filer Roy Mayhew has put his name down for an additional position.

As of now there have been no changes in the filing for the positions on Gruver School Board.

Marquerite Nelson and Buddy Lowe are the only ones signed up for the openings thus far.

The Morse School Board has two people with positions expiring. Mike Martin had previously signed up, and Betty Womble has recently put her name on the list of those running.

Deadlines for filing on any of these positions is March 22 at 5:00 p.m., and all elections will take place on May 6th.

Maddox arrested by local police officer

The Spearman Police Department had a successful week with the arrest of a man in possession of a stolen vehicle.

On March 2nd at 9:37 p.m. Officer Philip LaRue recovered a 1983 Pontiac Firebird here in Spearman, which had been stolen in Amarillo, and arrested Donald Aaron Maddox

who was in possession of the stolen vehicle.

The twenty-five year old Maddox was charged with the unauthorized use of a motor vehicle and his bond was set at \$5,000.

Maddox has since been escorted back to Amarillo where he is currently out on bond.

Two men arrested for theft of Seaboard wood

A theft NE of Gruver involves law enforcement agents from three states.

On February 21st, two bundles of treated 2X6 lumber, worth \$1826, was stolen from the worksight at the new hog farm NE of Gruver on Highway 207 at approximately 10:30 p.m.

Construction manager Gerald Danley was returning home when he passed a pick-up and trailer hauling two bundles of lumber.

Danley recognized the lumber and contacted the Beaver County Sheriff's Department. They in turn located the pick-up and trailer and confirmed that it was the lumber in question. The lumber used at the worksight was of a type that was not sold in this area, which is how identification was made.

The owner of the pick-up, James Lee Johnson of Turpin, OK, was driving when stopped by the Beaver County Sheriff's Department. He told the officers that he loaned his truck and trailer to a Toby Nichols of Liberal, KS who called

Johnson a told him that he needed to pick up his truck and trailer.

Johnson told the officers that upon finding his pick-up, he assumed that the lumber loaded on it belonged to Nichols, so he was attempting to take it to him. The pick-up and trailer was impounded by the Sheriff in Beaver.

Nichols was an employee of a sub-contractor hired to work on the construction of the hog farm. The following day Nichols' employer asked him if he knew anything about the stolen lumber, and he admitted that he and Johnson took the lumber in order to build a fence.

Assistant DA Roy Carper, of the 84th judicial district, was contacted about the situation, and he drew up the paperwork for the arrest of both Johnson and Nichols. Johnson was arrested in Liberal, and is currently out on \$5000 bond. Nichols has not yet been arrested.

Roy Carper has in the meantime filed the necessary paperwork to seize the pick-up and trailer which would be forfeited to the Hansford County Sheriff's Department.

Museum Musings

No museum would be complete without a medical display. The one featured in this issue honors Dr. Roland Kleeberger.

Dr. Kleeberger graduated from Creighton University Medical School in 1943. He was issued a Texas license in Hansford County on June 18, 1948, and practiced here until his death in 1982.

One thing I noticed in his graduation picture, there are no girls in it. Things have changed a lot for women since 1943.

J.D. Wilbanks recalled when Dr. Kleeberger first came here, J.D. was short of help during one harvest. Dr. Kleeberger told him he would help. He got right up in that big truck and scooped grain.

A medical bag is also on display. This particular one belonged to Dr. Kleeberger's father, who was an optometrist.

Dr. Kleeberger touched many lives while he was in Hansford County, as a good doctor, and also as a very active Lion's Club member.

Included were several whose deeds have been put into many movies - the bombardier of the Enola Gay and some crew members; some of the Jimmy Dolittles' crew: some of the Navaho Indians who handled communications in their native tongue which so baffled the Japanese; some navy and air force veterans, and marines of other units.

The air strip was absolutely essential to the U.S. war effort. The isle was about eight square miles and there were 23,000 Japanese entrenched in sulphur mines. The beaches were lava and sand and impossible to dig foxholes in. There were about 600 B-29 bombers used in the action.

The Third, Fourth and Fifth Marine Divisions made the initial landing. Harry Stumpf was a corpsman with the Fifth, and Johnnie Lee was a machine gunner with the Third.

Johnnie was 18 years old, and his memories are still vivid. He recalls that they were awakened at 2 a.m. and after a breakfast of steak and eggs, waited for daylight, then went ashore in a Higgins boat under heavy enemy fire, landing about nine and fighting until three the next afternoon. He recalled that in taking one hill 45 marines started up and 15 survived to reach the top.

He had a few hours sleep in spite of artillery and mortar shells ex-

ploding overhead. When asked how he could sleep, he recalled on a previous landing at Saipan, he slept in a foxhole one night, next to a dead Japanese.

Wesley Jenkins was a marine taking part in the landing and Ed Haner came in a few hours. Neither attended the anniversary.

If the Veterans of Iwo Jima and other World War II actions were to describe their experiences to a history class of youngsters, history would never again be dull dates and events, but vivid and meaningful for the students. The next time they saw a war movie - for example - John Wayne in "Sands of Iwo Jima", they would be seeing young Johnnie Lee, Harry Stumpf, Ed Haner, and Wesley Jenkins.

After the episode in recent news regarding the Enola Gay and the Smithsonian Institute authorities, a public poll was taken with dismal results. Among "baby boomers" now parents all were taught that the Enola Gay bombing was needless and a degradation on the part of the U.S. and none knew the name of the president who ordered it.

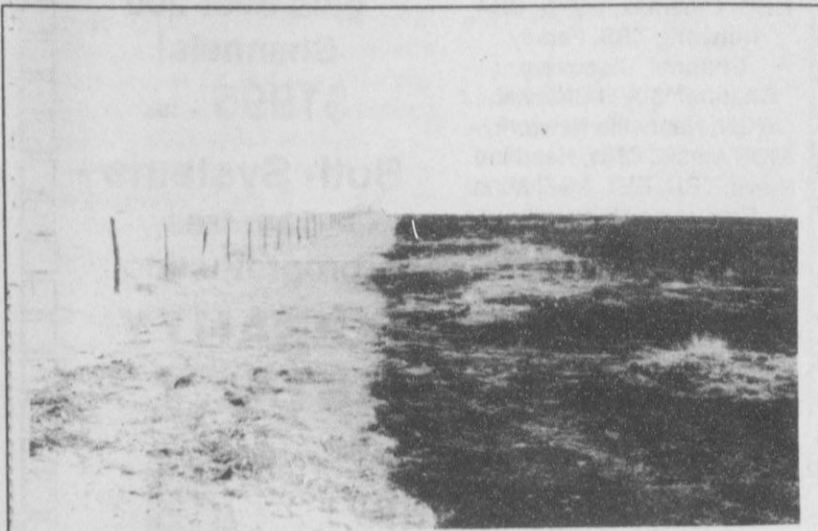

NCRS discourages grass burning until rain

Until Mother Nature brings the much needed spring rains, the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NCRS), formerly known as the Soil Conservation Service, is discouraging producers from burning rangeland, pastureland, and Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) fields. The NCRS supports and encourages the use of fire as a management tool, but only under the right circumstances. To date, there is inadequate moisture in the soil profile to ensure that we are not damaging the stand.

Fire can be a very effective tool for grass managers, but this tool must be used under the proper conditions. Grass stands can suffer irrevocable damage if burned during a severe drought. Forage production can be suppressed by as much as 50% the following growing season, with notable reduction the second year. Burns under extreme conditions can result in permanent damage to the stand.

Under drought conditions, grass plants in over-grazed pastures are much more susceptible to the ill

effects of a fire. Properly grazed grass plants have a more elaborate root system which enables the plant to extract moisture from the soil at greater depths.

A number of the CRP fields in Hansford County need to be burned for stand rejuvenation. The annual growth from many of these fields has not been harvested for several years, causing an excessive accumulation of litter. This can be stalling to grass plants, and can ultimately reduce the plant population of the stand. These fields would benefit from a properly conducted burn, but it is not recommended at this time. Last week's snow helped, but we must have more rain in the next two or three weeks before we will consider burning any grass this year.

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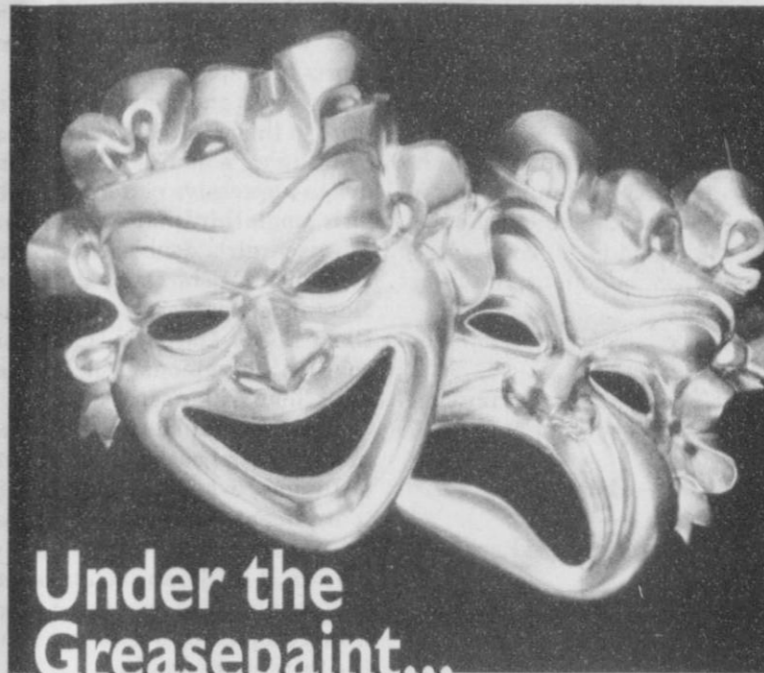
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Under the Greasepaint...
