Stationmasters House Museum Hosts Book Signing

Cleon Roberts, author of Charley Newell Shot!" will be it the Stationmaster's House Museum on Monday, September 9, 2002 from 10 a.m. until noon

for a book signing.
Roberts' book is about Charles
Callaway Cooper Newell, who
died in 1923 at the age of 77. Newell had been a soldier, miner, buffalo hunter, cattleman, mail carrier, freighter and merchant. Roberts was asked by Jean McNaughton, one of Newell's granddaughters, to find any information he could on Newell's Texas stay.

Roberts' trip into the history of the Texas Panhandle began in 1996 when he was contacted by McNaughton. She had wanted to find out something about Newell's life in Texas, but she had run into dead ends.

All she had was a brief statement written by Newell:

"In the year A.D. 1878, resided in the county of Hansford, State of Texas, and was engaged in ranching, trading and freighting. In the month of May..., while my wagons were returning from the railroad in Kansas, loaded with supplies, my mules were stampeded from the train. On the morning of 18th of May, 1878, while riding in pursuit of said mules I was fired upon from a bushy ravine by an unseen foe and my right arm was so badly shot that amputation became necessary

Roberts, a Hereford genealogist and historical researcher who says he has a particular interest in the pioneers who have been forgotten by history, agreed to see what he could do, although he didn't promise anything.

Six years later, he had found out quite a bit about Charley Newell. The results of his research are recorded in a 484-page book.

West Nile Virus Confirmed in Panhandle

Texas Department of Health has confirmed that four horses have been diagnosed with West Nile Virus infection in four counties in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains region. Based on information provided by the owners or veterinarians, the horses had all been in their respective locations long enough to have become infected locally. The horses were located in the following counties: Briscoe, Floyd, Swisher, and Deaf Smith. Three of the horses appear to be recov ering, while the fourth was euthanized.

Horse owners may wish to contact their veterinarian to discuss vaccination of their horses against this disease. Everyone is encouraged to eliminate mosquito breeding areas, such as standing water, buckets, flower pots, or tires that may have accumulated water in them. Also, insect repellent with DEET should be utilized to reduce the risk of being bitten by a mosquito Wearing a long-sleeved shirt and long pants is recommended especially in the time when mos quitoes are most likely to feed such as dawn and dusk.

Anyone finding sick or dead blue jays or crows is asked to contact their local health depart ment or county agent regarding shipping of the birds for testing.

CO² Extinguishes Potential Explosive Threat

Quick action and appropriate response is credited in the abatement of a potential grain explosion at the Sunray Coop, Gruver Branch, Monday, August 26.

Carbon dioxide trucked from Liberal, Kansas arrived in Gruver near 2 p.m., and was used to extinguish the fire beneath the large steel tank system located just south of the of Highway 15 and the old office of Equity Grain.

Smoke was first discovered by

Sunray Coop employee Steve Schmidt at approximately 8:15

The small fire in the tunnel beneath this steel grain system was the cause of much concern for Gruver firemen and citizens last week. Charred, wet gunny sacks and bits of burned residue are all the evidence that remains of the fire. The wet sacks were placed over the small amount of grain which burned in the tunnel system of a steel grain bin last week to stop any grain dust from being stirred up as the burnt material was removed.

"There was no grain down there," Schmidt said "There was only just grain dust.'

Due to the high explosive threat of grain dust and the glowing mass observed in the tunnel of the system, Fire Chief Robert Blevins contacted the fire chief in Guymon and Rusty Shoulders, manager of Morse Equity. Both urged the use of carbon dioxide to smother the fire by cutting off the supply of oxygen to the blaze.

As a safety measure, the area around the elevator was evacuated as was a portion of the city of Gruver from Main Street to 15th Street to Broadway until 5:00 p.m. Traffic was also stopped from entering Gruver from Highway 136 North and Highway 15 East

According to Chief Blevins, the pressure of water from hoses in an attempt to douse the flame would probably have resulted in stirring up the grain dust and possibly triggering an explosion.

After locating carbon dioxide at Prax Air in Guymon, firemen waited for delivery until approximately

2:00 p.m. After use of the carbon dioxide, firemen waited for 1 1/2 hours before going into the tunnel beneath the tank system to remove

the burned material. "The burn area was about five foot by five foot, "Blevins said. No injuries were reported in the blaze and only minimal damage

was observed. There was really no damage, "Stinar said," Just down time lost. The cause of the fire is still under investigation.
