Grace, Faith Churches Celebrate Reunion Sunday

'The church reformed and reforming.'

This was the spirit of one of the many changes that occurred within Christianity during the 15th and 16th Centuries following the birth of esus Christ -a period of church history known as the Reformation. In a time when governments were splitting and new ones forming, and great numbers of people were becoming more independent, the church also

plit and became more independent. Among the earliest Christian faith-traditions still in operation today which came from this period) are those that trace their roots to the practical ministries of Martin Luther and John Calvin. These men learned for themselves and demonstrated to others ways in which faithful Christians ould practice their faith, while remaining true to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Their understanding was that the one church of Jesus Christ had not split, but that new ways of being the church - in different settings of place and culture - had multiplied.

Among the youngest congregations in Spearman, however, are Grace formerly "First") Presbyterian Church, organized in 1960, and Faith Lutheran Church, organized in 1964. Having come out of the Reformed tradition and the Lutheran tradition, respectively, these two congregaions (caught up once again in that same practical spirit of "the church reformed and reforming) were led in 1990 to try a mutually acceptable arrangement whereby they would call a pastor together and would, in most ways, "be the church" together locally. This was done while maintaining their respective faith-tradition roots and denominational affiliaions. In doing so, they believed they would be able to continue to remain faithful and grow as Christians while offering a new way for being the church in this community.

This Sunday, October 27, 2002, (Reformation Sunday), is being celebrated by Faith and Grace as "Reunion Sunday." Not only is it the approximate 40th anniversary of each, but it is the 12th anniversary of arrangement by which they reformed. These congregations ha come to understand this arrangement as a "covenant relationship," maintaining a partnership in ministry and mission which is open to new part ners at all times, as well as other initiatives in cooperative projects and ministries.

The Communion Service this Sunday at Grace and the dinner and other activities which will follow at Faith are intended to celebrate and show appreciation to any and all who have taken part and made their gifts of service and support available to the congregations both separately and together. In this way, Faith and Grace hope actively to demonstrate their eternal gratitude for the faith and grace God has given them in Jesu Christ - The gifts of God for the people of God!

All are invited to any part of this event. Sunday morning services begin at 11 a.m. at Grace Presbyterian, located at 11th and Cotter, and will be followed by a dinner at Faith Lutheran, located at 11th and Bernice.

Reaping The Wind

County Commissioners Meet with Wind Energy Group

Hansford County Commissioners Court met last week with Jay Lobit and John Baum of Great Plains Windpower, LLC. The meeting was a further discussion of their September 30 meeting in which the company presented a wind turbine site plan for the county.

The development company is seeking to build three 80 megawatt fields of wind turbines in a 10,000 acre area of northwestern Hansford County near the Oklahoma state line and extending into Texas County, OK.

Commissioners discussed the steps necessary for creating a possible tax abatement for the development firm.

Those steps are: (1) Adopting a tax resolution indicating the intent to participate in a tax abatement,

(2) Adopt tax abatement guidelines and criteria, (3) Provide seven days written notice to all taxing districts and hold a public hearing to designate a "reinvestment zone," (4) provide seven days written notice to all taxing districts of intent to enter into a tax abatement agreement, and (5) adopt a tax abatement agreement with a majority vote at a regularly scheduled meeting.

Hansford County Commissioners will meet again with representatives of Great Plains Windpower in an open meeting Monday, October 28, at 10:00 a.m. in the Commissioners Court Room.

Great Plains Windpower has asked the county for a 10 year, 100 % tax abatement.

We have not offered any tax abatement at this point," Judge Jim Brown said.

Catch The Facts, Not The Flu

Flu, a highly contagious respiratory tract infection, can sweep through communities in epidemics. In North America, flu season begins in November and lasts through April. Most people who

get the flu fully recover within one to two weeks; however, some people can develop serious, lifethreatening complications, such as pneumonia.

At greatest risk for serious illness and complications are those with chronic diseases of the lungs and heart. People with cancer, diabetes, kidney disease, and immune system disease are also at increased risk, as are the elderly. Flu is associated with 20,000 deaths nationwide and many more hospitalizations.

What are the symptoms?

Symptoms of flu include fever (usually 100F to 103F in adults and often higher in children), chills, headache, muscle aches and fatigue. Other common symptoms are cough, loss of appetite and a runny or stuffy nose.

Children who have flu may also experience nausea, vomiting or diarrhea. These gastrointestinal symptoms are not usually part of flu in teens and adults.

Most healthy people recover from cases of flu without a problem. Sometimes, however, a child with flu develops complications, such as an ear infection, sinusitis or pneumonia.

How is it spread?

Flu is spread from person to person by direct contact or through virus-infected droplets coughed or sneezed in the air. The incubation period is one to three days, and people with flu are contagious from the 24 hours before they become ill until their symptoms

How is it treated?

Flu can usually be treated at home with bed rest and plenty of fluids. A non-aspirin pain reliever, such acetaminophen, can be used to reduce fever. Do NOT give aspirin, which has been linked to the development of Reye's syndrome in children with flu. Call your doctor if there are signs of dehydration, seizures, earache, a cough that produces discolored mucus, or difficulty breathing. Children with chronic conditions, such as severe asthma or cystic fibrosis, may require hospitaliza-

How can it be prevented?

The best way to prevent influenza is to get an annual "flu shot." Although the vaccine is not recommended for all children, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) does recom-

mend that it be given to children who have chronic diseases of the heart, lungs or kidneys, diabetes, and conditions that weaken the immune system. The CDC also recommends the flu vaccine for all persons aged 65 or older and women who may be in the second or third trimester of pregnancy during flu season. Household members, including children of persons in the high-risk groups, should also be vaccinated.
