Garnett Re-elected to Farm Credit Board

Jon "Mike" Garnett was re-elected Jan. 4 to serve as vice chairman of the Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT) Board of Directors. The Austin-based bank also re-elected Ralph "Buddy" Cortese chairman of the board. Both men were recently re-elected to the board of the financing cooperative by Tenth Farm Credit District stockholders.

Garnett was elected vice chairman of the board in 2000. He joined the bank board in 1999 after serving as a director of Panhandle-Plains Federal Land Bank Association for 23 years. He has represented the Tenth Farm Credit District on The Farm Credit Council Board of Directors since 2003. He was appointed to the USDA Texas State Technical Committee the same year. Garnett farms grain and forage crops and feeds stocker cattle near Spearman, Texas.

Other members of the FCBT Board of Directors include Kenneth Andrews of Madisonville, Texas; Joe R. Crawford of Baileyton, Ala.; Jimmy Dodson of Robstown, Texas; Elizabeth G. "Betty" Flores of Laredo; and William F. Staats of Baton Rouge, La.

The Farm Credit Bank of Texas is the source of funds for 20 local lending cooperatives in the Tenth Farm Credit District, which includes Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico and Texas. The \$13.7 billion bank is part of the nationwide Farm Credit System, the nation's single largest source of loans for agriculture, agribusiness, rural real estate and country homes.



It helps reduce the risk of stroke, diabetes, high blood pres-Being active helps children and teens maintain a healthy weight and build strong bones. For busy adults, exercise has proved to be an excellent way to fight stress, improve your mood and relieve depression.

When it comes to exercise, the first step is the biggest challenge. The Department Texercise of Aging and Disability Services has 10 tips to help you get off to a good start:



Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

This week we who are in darkness see a great light as we study Isaiah 9:1-4, Psalm 27:1, 4-9, 1 Corinthians 1:10-18, and Matthew 4:12-23. After the invasion of Israel by Tilgath-pilessar circa 733 BCE, the Assyrian provinces of Galilee (Zabulon/Naphtali). Dor (Way of the Sea), and Gilead (land beyond Jordan) were created. To the oppressed Jews, Isaiah writes that there is no gloom for those who were in anguish, for the enslaved provinces will me made glorious and the people who walked in darkness will have seen a "great light". This "great light" is the manifestation of the power of God as He frees the oppressed. The cure for a depressed, oppressed people is an encounter with the Light of God. The Psalmist sings, "The Lord is my light and salvation; whom shall I fear?" Despite adversity, despite war, despite loss, the Psalmist lives by trust in the Lord. This learning to trust God in all circumstances is an ongoing process that is vital to our life. When the light of God shines in our being, no darkness can extinguish it.

Paul seeks to lovingly chastise the members of the faith community in Corinth who are divided into factions, claiming loyalty to one apostle, or one evangelist, rather than recognizing that all the faith community belongs to Jesus Christ. Verse 12 can be translated to read, "What I mean is that each of you says, 'I belong to Paul', or 'I belong to Cephas', or 'I belong to Apollos', whereas, I belong to Christ! Paul does not demean baptism, he is demeaning those who would relate the efficacy of baptism to the person performing the sacrament and not to the power of the Word and Spirit. Paul finishes by noting that the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are in their sins and cannot accept the concept of "grace".

Matthew quotes our passage from Isaiah to show that Jesus is Messiah! Jesus is God intervening directly in human history. Matthew relates the recruitment of two sets of fishermen to the Kingdom. The brothers, Andrew and Peter, and their cousins, the brothers, James and John, are approached by Jesus who recruits them to "fish for men". A good fisherman has patience, perseverance, courage, an eye for the right moment, the right bait for the fish, and the sense to keep himself out of sight. Not a bad idea for a preacher, eh?

The sequence in Matthew is Jesus is baptized, Jesus is tempted. Jesus begins to preach the gospel. Too many in our day equate "preaching the gospel" with boredom; yet, Jesus "preached" with authority, with certainty and with a message from beyond self.

May the Holy Spirit help you to be a better fisherman for Jesus Christ.

> Declining Ogallala Aquifer The recent North Plains Ground Water News had an informative article on the data the Conservation District had gathered from 1981 to 2006 on the declining water table in the 8

county district. Hartley County had lost the most with a decline of 62 feet, and Dallam County was next with 50 feet. Sherman County had a decline of 45.

Hutchinson and Moore Counties were close with 38 37 respectively. Hansford lost 32 feet, while Ochiltree had 17 and Lipscomb only 7 feet.

However, when it came to new wells drilled in the last 10 years, Hansford and Hutchinson had the least with 30 and 29 wells compared to Hartley County with 474 and Dallam with 312. Sherman, 243, and Moore with 183 were next. Ochiltree had 103 and Lipscomb 110.

The Amarillo Globe-News on January 16 had a little piece entitled "Water plan moves forward." It said the 5 counties in the Panhandle using the most water are Dallam, Hartley, Sherman, Moore, and Hansford counties - places where irrigated crops, cattle in feedlots and milk cows drink the water pumped from the Ogallala Aquifer. These counties used 65% of the total water used in the Panhandle Water Area in 2000.

Through 2060, it is projected the greatest shortages will be in those counties except Hansford.

In 1997 Daron Norwood began speaking in schools across Texas. His program, "Keep It Straight", has been designed to warn students of the dangers of drug and alcohol abuse and also educate them on the effects of bullying and violence. The program lasts one hour. The first

half Daron sings and entertains the audience. He uses this time to get to know the students, break any barriers and gain the trust of the audience. The second half is dedicated to helping the students realize the dangers that they will be faced with and the consequences of making wrong decisions when faced with danger. Daron becomes someone the children can relate to and because of this he becomes a part of their environment. "I can relate to them because I've been to the bottom... addicted to both drugs and alcohol," Daron

"The thing I kept hearing was, be real, be honest and give it to us straight. If you drink and drive, you can kill yourself and others. If you do drugs, you can become addicted." When asked about the effectiveness of this program, he will share countless stories of young lives that have been changed. "The only way not to be successful is to do nothing at all," Daron says. "If I do a program and only change one life, then the program was successful."

To date, Keep It Straight has been seen by 650,000 students in the past 10 years and that number is growing. No one knows exactly how big this powerful program will get but Daron and his supporters have their sights set high. "I just want to keep changing lives for the better. Keep It Straight is more than just a phrase, it is a lifestyle. I want to share it with everyone in this great nation."
