NIJMEGEN, Netherlands--Before the sun could rise above the
Netherlands' horizon, soldiers started to march out of their camp equipped with 22 -pound backpacks and a goal to march 25 miles a day for four days, just to prove that
they can do it. Air Force Staff Sgt. John P. Hartwick, 33, son-in-law of Dale one of more than 800 U.S. service members who participated in the 76 th Nijmegen International Four Day Marches 21 through 24 July Marching 100 miles in four day is a difficult task, but with over people, the pleasure of making international friends and proper medical treatment for punished feet, the groundpounders' march through the street and countryside of the Netherlands a little easier. after the third 25 -mile day fter the thrd 25 -mile day a different experience. "The march is a great way to
meet people from other nation's military, and a great way to find your energy limit, said the 1978 graduate of Jefferson High School, Lafayette. "One hundred miles in
