In 1965 they sang an anthem that is really the theme of a great number of people, now that. The most repeated line is "I can't tion." Funny it's named that. The most repeated line is "I can't get
no...satisfaction." Lots of people can't seem to get any satisfaction. It's because they're not looking in the right place. Only one thing in life ultimately satisfies, a real relationship with God.
Jesus spoke of that satisfaction in the Sermon on the Mount. His word for the satisfaction of knowing God is righteousness. The whole sermon is built around the theme of righteousness: what it is, how to
get it and what it looks like. get it and what it looks like
Jesus begins with how it is attained. It must be desired. In fact He
says if you don't "hunger and thirst for righteousness" you won't be says if you don't "hunger and thirst for righteousness" you won't be
satisfied. If you don't have a voracious appetite to know God, you'll satisfed. if you get seated at the table.
Next Jesus says that "if your righteousness does not exceed that" of the most religious people you can shake a stick at, you'll have no
portion of His Kingdom. Jesus definitely has a way of shaking up the status quo. The ROLLING STONES have nothing on Him in that
caily, Jesus says that righteousness is to be the primary goal for the child of God. Don't search for meaning in life via possessions,
pleasures, etc., but "seek first My Kingdom and My righteousness," He says.
