

An era in the history of the city of Gruver will end this month with the sanitary trash containers and pick-up services. retirement of her first city manager,

Ratliff's tenure in Gruver is the story of the fiscal and governmental growth of a small panhandle town to meet the demands and modernization of the twenty-first century. In a 27-year association with the city of Gruver, three as chief of police, two in the joint capacity as chief of police and city manager, and 22 as city manager; Ratliff has overseen the transition of a city with only one full time employee and one half time employee to a city with seven full time employees providing a wide range of services.

Although the city's population has changed little since its 1970 census of 1265, the physical improve-ments, the range of services provided, and the governmental regula-tions affecting the city have grown dramatically.

The transition for Ratliff from law enforcement to city administration began in 1974. When then mayor of Gruver Kenneth Irwin asked Police Chief Ratliff to write a community block grant request in hope that funds could be secured to build lighted tennis courts in the city park. The writing of the grant was not only successful but was also instrumental in Ratliff's evolution into a new area of service to the city. With Ratliff's compliance to an additional request to help in long-range plan-ning goals for the city, his insight and talent in administration became evident. When Gruver's need for a city manager became materialized, Ratliff was a natural choice for the position and assumed those duties dually with his role as chief of

Other advancements soon followed as Ratliff was able to secure a second community block grant for the laying of sewer lines in west Gruver. After buying the water and gas system servicing the city from an independent entity, High Plains Utility, the city of Gruver undertook the responsibility of providing water and natural gas for residents. It was at this point the city's administrative duties required Ratliff's full attention as city manager, and he relinquished his role as chief of police.

In the coming year, Gruver residents would see other improvements and services. The first torna-1975, followed by the first animal control ordinance in 1978, the building of the city airport in 1979. and the 1980 implementation of

Paving streets became a priority through the years and progressed until the only remaining unpaved street is one block of Second Street between the Dairy Queen and Gruver Insurance. By 1983, all areas of the city were incorporated into a sanitary sewer system. In that same year, gas lines for the city were replaced through grant funds.

A swimming pool funded through matching grant funds as well as a 24-hour emergency medical services number followed in 1985. While other improvements as the curbing and guttering around the Golden Age Center through funding by Clifford George, and a sand separa-tor system for the city's water supply were added.

During the Ratliff era, the city of Gruver shared in the building of the Hansford County Tax Appraisal District's office, contracted with the Panhandle Regional Planning Committee for 911 services and a Gruver Chamber of Commerce was formed in 1989.

New additions have included the Gruver Fire Station and warehouse, facilities for animal control, and a recycling center. This past year, the tornado alert system was modernized to operate without electrical power, a new well was incorporated into the Gruver water system, and the entire water system was computerized.

Ratiff's dedication and talent was honored in 1977, when he was selected by the Gruver Lions Club as Citizen of the Year. He was cited for his convice on an experience. for his service as an emergency medical technician, a volunteer fire-man, and the civil defense director. In 1998, he was also recognized by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission's (PRPC) with the Goodwin Regional Administrator Award not only for his exemplary service as city manager but also for his work in the Panhandle City Managers Association, the PRPC Grant Review and Comment Committee, the Solid Waste Management Advisory and Economic Development Committees, and as a member and officer of the Texas Gas Association.

Appreciation was expressed to Ratliff on Monday with a reception at Gruver City Hall, and on Tuesday, with a reception by the Texas Municipal League, Region I, which is composed of area municipal administrators.

Upon retirement, Ratliff will relocate near Ranger, Texas, where he

plans to be more accessible to care for his parents. In reflection, Ratliff states; "I have loved every minute of my time in Gruver, and I have made many good friends. To me, Gruver is the greatest town in the world." The heartfelt sentiment is apt for a man, who by chance or by fate, came to love a small Texas town and adopt it as his own. And who, like a parent, nurtured and guided to lead his prodigy to its maturity and place in the new mil-

Spearman and Gruver received received approximately seven inches of snow between Friday morning, January 26th through Sunday, January 28th.



Positives & Negatives: How To Measure Your Success

How do we measure our success? Usually, we go by our feelings. We seldom measure our own success very analytically,

The intent of this column is to give you some new ways to measure your success. You can use this column to gauge your strong and weak areas. Once you know how you're doing, you can congratulate yourself for the positives and create a plan to correct the negatives

How Am I Doing?

* Don't compare yourself to others. All too often we look at the lives of others to measure our own suc-cess. The problem with this measurement is that you can always find someone who appears to be doing better than you. In truth, they may only be better at keeping up external

appearances.

The questions most successful people ask are, "Am I making progress toward my goals?" "Am I the same person in all areas of my life?" Is my life well balanced?" "Am I proud of what I do?"

If you can answer yes to these questions and others like them, you're doing fine. How much money Bill Gates has, and how slim and attractive some movie star is, are not relevant measurements to your achievements.

* Chart your own course. A common characteristic of achievers is go. They decide which mountain to climb and which battle to fight. They have a plan and are guided by

their goals. Goals have three major benefits. First, they help us establish direction in our lives. Second, they give us a benchmark with which to measure our progress. Third, they can help us keep our focus.

Don't underestimate goal power. You have the power to change your direction and chart a new course. If you don't take control of your own life, someone else will do it for you.

* Prove your success financially. I believe money is a method of keeping score and tracking progress. Whether you own your own business or work for someone else, wealth does bring some security and give you options. I do not believe it is the most important, nor do I believe it is the only way to measure success.

There are many measurements you can use. If you're a business

owner ask these questions: Are both sales and profits increasing? Is your debt decreasing as a percentage of assets? Are you earning more from your business than you could working for someone else? Are you building wealth (asset value) on your balance sheet?

Now let's look at your personal finances. Do you have more than one active credit card? Do you pay off your credit cards every month? Do you have more than one car payment? Have you borrowed against your home's equity? Are you building wealth on your personal balance

I know these are tough questions. However, if you will answer them honestly, you'll probably discover some areas on which to focus your financial improvement strategies.

you happy, fulfilled and ready to start each new day? Do you have interests outside your work or business? Do you have time for family, friends and loved ones? Is your schedule flexible enough to include some fun? If you can't answer yes to these questions, you may need to reevaluate your priorities.



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


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

The SPWA has tall mills, short mills, expensive mills, and cheap mills. Mills that are Leaders, Stars, Butlers, and one mill that Eclipses all others, the Railroad Eclipse with an 18-foot wheel, a tower within a tower, and a \$15,000 price tag.

The SPWA receives no tax support and depends on donations and adoption of its mills for support.

Here are some of the mills that can be adopted. All of the mills listed are part of the J. B. Buchanan collection and will be put in the Windmill Park, but if you want some other mill, SPWA will try to get you what you want.

The mill was brought to Spearman to the J. B. Buchanan Windmill Park, but the age of its original restoration forced the SPWA to take it down in December to restore it.

The mill is built by the Flint and Walling Co., and the Star #15 dates from the decade before WW1 and the decade after. The Star was built with either a steel or wooden wheel, but fortunately, the Star #15 that Mr. Buchanan obtained is the wooden wheel model.

The mill is a direct stroke. The wheel turns a shaft that turns a crank plate. The rotary action of the crank plate gives the pittman arm its up and down action which gives the rocker arm its up and down action that is transmitted to the sucker rods so that they move up and down.

The mill is spectacular in color. The blades of the wheel are white, tipped in red, with the tails white and a blue and red star on each tail Both tails are outlined in red, and the engine of the mill is hunter green. The lettering on the tails is black. The stars and lettering are by Wanda Reed.

The wooden tower is painted barn red and is impressively stout, built entirely of new treated lumber.

J. D. Wilbanks once again did the machine and bearing work on the engine with assistance from other SPWA members including Don Maize, Orville Latham, and Don

Orville Latham cut out the blades, notched the bows that the blades fit into, and he and Don Reed assembled the wheel.

How much time to restore a mill? The mill has occupied the SPWA's attention for most of the month of January on pretty much of a daily basis for four to eight hours each

day.
The Star #15 is truly pretty. It's a Star that will shine in the J. B. Buchanan Windmill Park all day and night. Look for its ascendancy again this week or next.



The mountain bluebirds are still around--sometimes in great numbers and other times just small groupings. Leona Stavlo told me one of her special memories was seeing a big number of them one sunny morning after a snow as she walked to her son's house. They were in the cedars, on the fence, and on the ground.

In my years of writing this column, I have studied the animals of Hansford County, but I have not been sure that weasels should be on the list. No one had told me about weasels being around, until we started trying to identify the killer of Daniel Harris's hens. Joel Stavlo and Rochell Smith were trappers on the creek many years ago, and they would have been sources of information. I have been trying to find someone else who lived on the creek or trapped on it. One day I saw C. A. Davis and remembered he lived in the Turkey Track stone house on the road from Gruver to Morse at one time. He gave me my first weasel story.

C. A. and his 15 months younger brother Jim, 14 and 13 years of age, were riding their horses on the creek bottoms north of the house one winter day, when they saw an animal they had never seen before. The long bodied creature was tannish brown with darker markings. They decided it might make a pet, so they tied their horses to a tree and began to chase it. They cornered the hissing animal in a pile of brush. As they closed in on it, it turned and hurtled itself at C. A., hitting him in the chest. By this time it had also emitted a somewhat skunk like odor. With that the boys gave up on it as a pet and left it alone. Later their father, Charley Davis, also saw the animal. They thought it was a weasel, but they were not sure.

Weasels are in the family of mustelids, along with skunks, badgers, mink, and ferrets. One of the questions is "Do they suck the blood of their prey?"
