At a special called meeting the North Plains Groundwater Conservation District's Board of Directors on Friday, August 6, the board voted to approve a budget which would include the funds needed to initiate a Modification/ Precipitation Enhancement program for the eight-county District. The Board's vote on Friday night came after a series of informational meetings held Dalhart,

across the District in Spearman, Perryton, Hartley, Stratford, Lipscomb, Gruver, and Dumas. The informational meetings were presented by Bomar, George Meteorologist/Water Quality Senior Technical Specialist for the Texas Natural Conservation Commission, in conjunction North Plains Groundwater Conservation District staff. The program was presented to 273 people who attended the informational meetings, including three programs presented by Mr. Bomar at an earlier trip in June. Many questions were asked and answered by the people attending, and the Board members were able to receive valuable input during these meetings.

Many of the 273 people who attended the meetings voiced concern over the increased taxes which would be necessary to fund the program; however, a majority increase in rainfall (which could possibly be achieved through weather modification efforts) would be more than sufficient to generate the savings in water costs to pay for the increase in taxes. orem tax rate on the average homestead would be \$8.91, from \$5.24 from last year. Proposed taxes would increase \$3.49 for the average District homeowner.

Research conducted by Texas Tech University using crops grown in the High Plains area (cotton, corn grain sorghum, and wheat) indicates that there is approximately a \$700 return for every \$1 spent on cloud seeding efforts. With this in mind, and the charge of the North Plains Water District being to provide for the conservation, preservation, protection, recharge, and prevention of the waste of groundwater and groundwater reservoirs within the District, the Board of Directors unanimously voted to adopt a budget which would adequately fund a weather moderation program for the District.







Bindweed Mite Studied

by Beth Barbee

Not only does field bindweed cover over 600,000 acres of Texas farmland and cause an economic loss of over \$50 million a year, but it's also a significant problem on lawns, roadsides, and abandoned sites across the state.

This problem has spawned a new research partnership between growers and scientists, headed by Dr. Jerry Michels, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Bushland. Michels has found a way to manage the menacing weed while saving crops and money.

The herbicides currently used to curb the pest are a costly and often ineffective answer. Presently, 17 Panhandle counties spend \$69,000 annually (excluding application costs) to control bindweed on 3,000 acres. The weed is especially difficult to control on highway medians, where mowing and chemical applications are restrict-

Biological control is providing to be a more attractive alternative because it costs less and is environmentally sound.

Aceria malherbae Nuzzaci, a Greece, feeds on bindweed exclusively. The mite attacks the plants by producing galls on the leaves, petioles, and stems. It stunts new growth, deforms leaves, limits seed production and reduces vege-

the Bushland Experiment Station for nine years and have proven successful in the area's semi-arid conditions. The insects are slow moving and easy to relocate to target areas by growers.

Texas, in conjunction with Oklahoma State University and the Colorado Department of Agriculture, are also cooperating in a program to release the mites across the High Plains.

Now the scientists are ready to track the mites' success under various conditions.

"In May, over 150 sites were established in Oklahoma during a distribution program at a field day in Lahoma, OK," said D.r Jerry Michels. "We did the same kind of release program here at the North Plains Ag Day in June." The pests were issued to more than 60 interested producers from 16 Texas Panhandle counties, who signed up to take the mites home.

"The release sites will be monied to protect summer wildflowers. tored over the next few years to track the success of the mites on bindweed under varied situations," Michels said.

Since the Ag Day, an additional 22 farmers from 14 counties have eriophyid mite imported from contracted for the mites through their county agents.

> "That will end the mite disbursement for this year, since the best distribution season has past," the scientist said. Michels plans on distributing more mites next year in May or early June using the cur-
