Spearman ISD Earns State's Highest Fiscal Accountability Rating

pleased to announce that the District has received a rating of "Superior Achievement" under the Texas School FIRST financial accountability rating system. The Superior Achievement rating is the state's highest, demonstrating the quality of Spearman ISD's financial management and reporting system.

This is the fourth year of the School FIRST (Financial Accountability Rating System of Texas), which was developed by the Texas Education agency in response to Senate Bill 875 of the 76th Texas Legislature in 1999. The primary goal of the Schools FIRST is to achieve quality performance in the management of the school district's financial resources, a goal made more significant due to the complexity of accounting associated with Texas' school finance system.


"We are very pleased with Spearman ISD's Schools FIRST rating," said Spearman ISD Superintendent Rodney Sumner. "It shows that our district is making the most of our taxpayers' dollars. This rating shows that Spearman's schools are accountable not only for student learning, but also for achieving these results cost-effectively and efficiently." Mr. Sumner added, "This is the fourth year in a row that Spearman ISD has received this top ranking of "Superior," and I Larry Murphy, Assistant Superintendent of Business and Finance for his leadership in this area for making sure that the District follows the established criteria for the management of the District's financial resources.

The Schools FIRST accountability rating system assigns one of four financial accountability ratings to Texas school districts, with the highest being "Superior Achievement," followed by "Above-Standard Achievement," "Standard Achievement" and "Substandard Achievement." Districts with serious data quality problems may receive the additional rating of "Suspended - Data Quality." Districts that receive the "Substandard Achievement" or "Suspended - Data Quality" ratings under Schools FIRST must file a corrective action plan with the Texas Education




Henry was grinning from ear to ear when he showed the vet had completed his examination, Cousin Henry asked, "Will I be able to race him?"

He was a member of the Marella Methodist Church, Griggs, Oklahoma.







Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

In the twenty-third week of Pentecost we study forgiveness in Isaiah 1:1-20, Psalm 32, 2 Thessalonians 1:1-12, and Luke 19:1-10. Through Isaiah, God rebukes Israel for using ritual as a substitute for obedience and transformation. The Lord refuses to hear empty prayers from lying lips. God calls for social justice and adherence to his law. If Israel will repent, God will forgive. We learn in this passage that "Grace experienced must be grace lived". When we pray honestly, God listens. The Psalmist sings of the happiness of forgiveness in Psalm 32, which follows time-wise, the Psalmist's sin in Psalm 51. A great psychological truth is here. When we are wracked by guilt and remorse, we are often physically ill. The Psalmist struggles and then confesses his sin to the Lord. The weight of sin leaves him, the Psalmist is forgiven. Notice that the Psalmist then shares the joy of this forgiveness with others. Learn from this that forgiveness is a way of life, it is not just a one time random act of Deity. Jesus said, "Come to me you who are weak and heavy laden, and I will give you rest.'

Paul in this introduction to his letter begins with unmixed praise for the positives of the Thessalonians before he issues a rebuke for their shortcomings. We glean from this passage that even in persecution the Christian is expected to perform work that is inspired by faith, to labor for the good of the faith community prompted by love, to exhibit that endurance founded on hope. We as Christians serve in this world and expectantly wait for the perfection of the

Kingdom of Heaven.

Luke gives us the story of Zacchaeus. Now the name Zacchaeus means "righteous one or pure one". This Zacchaeus was a chief tax collector, a chief crook, a collaborator with the Romans; he was hated by his people, the Jews of Jericho. But Zacchaeus, the little short crook, wanted to meet Jesus. Jesus seeks Zacchaeus out and announces, "I must stay at your house today". Jesus came to Jericho to "find" Zacchaeus. Jesus says, "For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost." In this case "lost" means one who is in the wrong place. Zacchaeus, the little crook, was in the wrong place spiritually. He was alone, despised, rejected, filthy rich. Zacchaeus met Jesus, Zacchaeus is forgiven, Zacchaeus' household is saved and the poor of Jericho are blessed as Zacchaeus agrees to give half of his wealth to the poor and to restore four fold any money that he has extorted from others. This is done voluntarily by Zacchaeus and is more than the mosaic law required, which was restitution of the amount extorted plus twenty per cent. Good News! Even the rich can be saved, forgiven! To round this out, compare the salvation of this rich crook to the denial by the rich young ruler who asked, "What must I do to have eternal life?" Jesus told him, give your wealth to the poor and follow me. That rich young ruler went away and was lost. He that hath an ear let him hear. May the Holy Spirit guide you to forgiveness and keep you rom being in the wrong place.

Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

The theme of "the Day of the Lord" runs through our studies in Malachi 4:1-2a, Psalm 98, 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13, and Luke 21:5-19. Malachi attacks the superficial worship of the leaders of the faith community. He reminds them that the "Day of the Lord" is coming. When God shall appear in judgment and evil-doers will fuel the fires, but those who fear God and abide in Him will bask in the sun of righteousness and healing. The Psalmist sings a call to praise. All creation-creatures, man, and matter, should praise God for his steadfast love, and rejoice that He is coming to judge

Paul rebukes the Thessalonians for having a "wrong attitude" about the second coming of Christ. Some of the Thessalonian faith-community are no longer working, living off what they can mooch as they await the arrival of Jesus. Paul calls them "truants". And tells them to earn their living! Paul 's thought follows a Jewish proverb, "He who does not teach his son a trade, teaches him to steal". What then dear Christian? Do we approach our work in a Disney 7-Dwarves-like fashion: "Hi Ho! Hi Ho! It's off to work we go." Or, do we approach our work, "I owe! I owe! To work I must go!" Our greatest Christian influence is not within the walls of our church buildings, but in our conduct and attitude where we earn our living. Therefore, "So let your light shine that they may see your good works, and give glory to your Father who is in heaven." Work then, dear Christian, have patience, wait!

Jesus prophesies the destruction of the temple in response to his disciples comments about its beauty. This prophesy came true in 70 AD when the Romans sacked Jerusalem. 1.1 million people were killed and 97,000 were taken into captivity. The Jewish rebellion was smashed. He then talks of the indications of the "Day of the Lord" and the persecution that will come upon the believers. Jesus reassures his disciples that although they may lose their lives. they can never lose their souls. Today we hear some preachers that claim to know when this second-coming is to happen, many claim that we are in the "last days". Hogwash! Jesus has told us that only the Father knows when that hour is. That is sufficient for me. The point is that if we are in the "end times" then we need to be working for the Kingdom! The point is that we as believers have only a certain time to be on this earth, and we need to be working for the Kingdom! Work then, dear Christian, have patience

May the Holy Spirit empower you to work for the fields are white to harvest!

12, 2007 This past week Trixie and Nick Holt paid us a delightful visit. Among other things I picked up a rattlesnake story from Nick that started me thinking about earlier columns on rattlesnake mothers swallowing their young to protect them. I have an index for the first 4 years of Out at the Lake and was able to find them.

On April 1, 1996 I wrote of a story from "Then and Now" written by Charlotte K. Bollinger and Ruth Mary Whitson about a child picking up what she thought were eggs from a bird nest, putting them in her apron, and taking them home. When she got home and started to show the pretty eggs to her mother, it brought a scream of "Get those little snakes out of here."

The child in later years visualized them as rattlesnakes and very dangerous until she learned that rattlesnakes do not lay eggs but produce live babies.

I wondered at the time if there was any way to learn which snakes lay eggs and which don't. I still don't have an answer.

This story brought a response from Frances Alexander Murrell, now

deceased. On a trip to Red River, New Mexico, when she was 13, a group of young people were shooting ground squirrels near a trash collection point when they spied a moderate size snake. They were too interested in the snake to shoot it, and as they were looking at it, it opened its mouth, and all of these little 6 inch snakes came out! Finally, the snake overcame its fear and began catching and swallowing the young snakes again.

Frances and I both thought we had heard that snakes sometimes swallow their young to protect them. Hoping to find if this were true, I did some research at the Gruver Library. Two different books said this was not true. The myth had started from people seeing big snakes swallow little snakes. Some species of snakes (the King snake is one) are cannibals, and they are making a meal out of baby snakes.

On June 24, 1996, the column shows Ollie Jarvis, also now deceased, had a story proving the experts wrong. To be continued.

PROPOSITION 10 (HJR 69)

HJR 69 would remove constitutional references to the former office of inspector of hides and animals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the constitutional authority for the office of inspector of hides and animals.

PROPOSITION 11

(HJR 19) HJR 19 would require a vote taken in either house of the legislature to be recorded by record vote, if the vote was on final passage of a bill, other than local bills, a resolution proposing a constitutional amendment, or any other resolution that is not purely ceremonial. The record vote must be archived

and available for public view-

PROPOSITION 12 (SJR 64)

SJR 64 would anthorize the Texas Transportation Commission to issue up to \$5 billion in general obligation bonds for highway improvement projects, the proceeds of which will be used to pay for projects, costs, and payments owed under related credit agree-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds by the Texas Transportation Commission in an amount not to exceed \$5 billion to provide funding for highway improvement projects."

PROPOSITION 13 (HJR 6)

HJR 6 would authorize the denial of bail to a person who violates conditions of release in a family violence case and permit the legislature to authorize the denial of bail to a person who violates certain court orders in a family violence case.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the denial of bail to a person who violates certain court orders or conditions of release in a felony or family violence

PROPOSITION 14 (HJR 36)

HJR 36 would limit a state justice or judge's service to December 31st of the fourth The proposed amendment year of the term if he/she is elected to all or part of a six year term, and reaches mandatory retirement age during the first four years of said term.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting a justice or judge who reaches the mandatory retirement age while in office to serve the remainder of the justice's or judge's current term."

PROPOSITION 15 (HJR 90)

HJR 90 would require the legislature to establish the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas, and would provide for its management, duties, and powers. It would authorize the issuance of up to \$3 billion in general obligation bonds to be used for operations and grants for the purpose of scientific research of all forms of human cancer.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the creation of the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas and authorizing the issuance of up to \$3 billion in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for research in Texas to find the causes of and cures for can-

PROPOSITION 16 (SJR 20)

SJR 20 would authorize the issuance of up to \$250 million in general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board to provide financial assistance to economically distressed areas of the state to help provide adequate sewer and water supply services for res-

idential use. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$250 million to provide assistance to economically distressed areas."


Gorilla's Return to the Jungle


