COPING WITH THE LANDFIL CRISIS With the closingof the Spearm landfill, now estimated to be closed shortly after January 1, 1993 Spearman residents will have to start looking for different ways of handling yard waste (grass clippings, leaves, branches and other plant matter). Two ways to handle grass clippings are to mulch your yard rather than emptying grass building a compost pile.
