# Spearman enters into disposal agreement with Perryton

The City of Spearman voted unanimously to enter into a solid waste disposal agreement with the City of Perryton at the cost of \$16.85 per ton at the regular City Council meeting held Tuesday, Aug. 18.

City Manager, Kelvin Knauf, stated that the contract would let us (Spearman) haul its solid waste to Perryton's landfill. This will extend the life of the Spearman land-

The council also considered resolution #5-92, which is a resolution on the project for water and sewer improvement in the Crawford Addition and authorizing the mayor, Burl Buchanan, to represent the city in all matters pertaining to the Community Development Program. The city has applied for a grant from the Texas Community Development Program (TDCP) for the past several years. The total application for grant funds is \$229,120 and the city's cash match is 5%, \$11,460. The county's match is also \$11,460. A discussion was held and a motion was made to adopt the resolution. It passed unanimously. The resolution went into effect August 18, 1992.

Other business conducted at the meeting was consideration of selecting a company to design a new city logo. Kauf stated that he had

contacted several graphics design firms in Amarillo about designing the city logo. The only firm interested was Graphix Unlimited. It will cost \$400 for their services plus expenses for color proofs, negatives or black and white art. A motion was made to hire Graphix Unlimited, it carried unanimously.

Council members also considered agreements between the City of Spearman and Hansford, Hutchinson and Ochiltree counties for fire protection and rescue services. Knauf stated that the agreements with all three counties were fill is determined, "we will enter the same as last year. The Hansford County Appraisal District Board set a \$230,090 budget for the 1992-1993 fiscal year at the regular board meeting held Wednesday, Aug. 12.

Chief Appraiser, Alice Peddy, said that this is down 7.58% (\$18.890) from the original 1991-1992 fiscal year budget which was

She said that the following had been collected for the current levy: City of Gruver, 96.69%; City of Spearman, 94.94%; Gruver I.S.D., 99.28%; Spearman I.S.D., 97.99%; Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D., 96.18%; and C.E.D. (County Education District), 98.18%. These percents represent how much of the 1991 taxes have been collected.

Overall 98.01% has been collected. Peddy said that at this same time last year only 97.8% had been collected. She added, "(We) usually collect about 98% of the current levy. When you add in delinquent collections the percentage is usually around 100."

Other business at the meeting was the approval of 1992-93 Collection Contracts. The City of Gruver, the City of Spearman, Spearman I.S.D. and Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. contracts were all approved. Peddy said that they are the same as last year. The Collection Contract for the Gruver I.S.D. was not approved because Gruver had not yet taken action, explained Peddy. She continued, this item will be added to the next meetings agenda.

The board also considered the 1992-93 Contract of Employment of the Chief Appraiser. It was set for October 1, 1992 through September 30, 1993.

Regular business at the meeting was the reading and approval of the last meeting's minutes. They approved expenditures for July 10 and paid bills for August 12.

# Spearman ISD finalizes budget

Final 1992 - 1993 budget work was conducted by the Spearman ISD Board of Trustees during their Monday, August 24, meeting, according to Larry Butler, SISD superintendent.

The board was putting the final touches on the budget before it goes before a public hearing scheduled for Monday, August 31. Butler indicated that adoption of the new budget and setting of a local tax rate are on the August 31 agenda as well.

"The 92 -93 budget is in the neighborhood of \$4,200,000," said Butler. This is a little higher than last years budget. Butler indicated that the slight increase will be made up by additional moneys expected from the County Education Dis-

trict taxes and other state support. He stated that the board expected to set a local tax rate at the same level as last year. That rate was .37 per \$100 evaluation.

In other business the board accepted the resignation of Francis Pipkin. She was to teach High School speech and drama, but had problems getting certified, according to Butler. The board authorized administration to interview and hire a replacement pending board approval.

Butler further reported that the board held discussions on the Site Based Decision Making Plan being implemented in the district. He indicated that the first copy of the plan will be completed by Septem-

Under regular business, the board paid bills totaling \$51,359.88 according to Butler. The board then

COPING WITH THE LANDFILL CRISIS

With the closing of the Spearman landfill, now estimated to be closed shortly after January 1, 1993, Spearman residents will have to start looking for different ways of handling yard waste (grass clippings, leaves, branches and other plant matter). Two ways to handle grass clippings are to mulch your yard rather than emptying grass clippings in the dumpster and building a compost pile.

Why is mulching and composting such good ideas? First of all, our landfill will close and we will have to start hauling our waste 20 miles or more. The less we have to haul, the more we can keep garbage rates down. Also, beginning in 1994, the State of Texas will not allow yard waste to be deposited in any landfill. Second, using a mulching mower is easier than bagging your clippings. Mulching also reduces your mowing time as much as one-

Spearman City Manager third compared to bagging. Third, mulching is good for your lawn. Short, mulched grass clippings return nutrients to the soil. With regular mulching, lawn fertilization can be reduced by as much as 25 percent.

> To mulch your yard properly you have to follow several rules. The most important rule is the "onethird rule." No more than one-third of the grass blade should be cut at each mowing. While you may be mowing higher, cutting one-third of the grass blade is better for your yard. Clippings disappear much easier and a deeper root system develops. Cutting grass to short weakens the root system. You should also mow your lawn every four to five days instead of once a

Because mulching leaves clippings on the lawn, come people think that it can cause a thatch problem. Not true. Thatch is mostly made of dead grass roots, caused by shallow watering, overfertilizing and improper mowing. Grass clippings are 85 percent water and decompose rapidly.

Composting turns yard waste into fertilizer through natural processes. A proper compost pile is easy to build and, if maintained properly, does not give off unpleasant odors. Composting lets the homeowner reapply grass clippings, leaves and other yard waste to his/her lawn in an efficient and economical manner. The Hansford County Library can provide you with more information about mulching and composting.

Mulching and composting are not just today's fads; they are necessary for homeowners and cities to cope with the landfill crisis. If every homeowner and business in Spearman would mulch their lawns and compost their yard waste, we can make the cost of hauling garbage to another landfill bearable for all of us.



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

RESEARCHER STUDYING TEEN GIRLS' DIETARY NEEDS

In an era of dieting and fast food, teenage girls may not be meeting their dietary needs, according to a researcher at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. Dr. William Wong, who suspects

that recommended daily allowances for some nutrients may not be appropriate for teens, is conducting a two-year study involving teenage girls.

He is looking at diet, proportion of body fat to muscle, bone density levels of nutrients such as iron and calcium and number of calories burned in relationship to age, stage of puberty and race.

"We want to know what and how much teenage girls are eating and what is happening to their bodies during this stage of their development," he said.
