After a December 7-10 visit to the home of dairy farmer Jon Klemme in Fort Plain, New York, Keith Hight of the Spearman Economic Development Corporation reports progress is being made on the relocation of the Klemme Dairy to a site south of Spearman.

Hight was able to familiarize himself with the Klemme Dairy during his visit. He was also able to discuss plans for the dairy's move to Texas, which is slated for Spring 2005.

"It is a very expensive process for dairy farmers in New York to expand," Hight said. "Taxes in New York are high, and the weather makes it necessary that all cows are housed in free-stall barns, which are very expensive to build."


Hight reported that not only is the Klemme family moving ahead with plans to relocate their dairy this spring, but there is also the possibility of a second dairy coming to the area.

Evans Barrett, the son-in law of Jon Klemme is currently looking for additional land in the area in hopes of starting another dairy. Klemme's dairy manager, Harold Dettmeir, will be arriving in

Spearman later this month to look for housing for his family. "I think we will end up with a couple of more families coming here," Hight, said. "Jon (Klemme) has one son that is a carpenter, and his wife is from Texas. His son-in-law is very interested in finding land here for a

diary. I think they are all tired of the cold and taxes." Work on the proposed dairy farm will begin shortly after a dairy permit is issued by the State of Texas, which Hight believes will be forthcoming in March.

While in the Fort Plain area, Hight also contacted other dairy farmers in the region about the advantages of the Spearman area.

Public radio station to return to airwaves

Fans of High Plains Public Radio, which services the northern Texas Panhandle, may soon have their favorite radio station back on the air. The KTOT antenna was damaged by lightening this summer, forcing HPPR to operate the 89.5 FM frequency at a lower power for several months. Eventually even the lower power signal failed.

Rick Hicks, Executive Director of HPPR said that repairs to the antenna are underway.

"Repair operators required new parts and a specially trained crew to climb the 1000-foot tower, Hicks said. "The required parts are now in hand, and the crew is in the area working to complete the repairs needed

to return KTOT to full power." Hicks is estimating the station's return to the airwaves by early January, but reminds listeners that crews are able to work only when weather conditions are favorable.

High Plains Public Radio continues to stream on-line at www.hppr.org "We hope our listeners will take advantage of our on-line service as much as possible while the repairs are being made," said Deb Stout, HPPR Director of Promotions.

"We've heard from so many of our listener-members in the KTOT area who miss the service," said Stacy Yates, Texas Coordinator. "We want to assure those members of the HPPR family that we are doing everything possible to restore our signal to the KTOT listening area.'

Give, but give wisely, to Tounami rollief offerts

The Association of Fundraising Professionals (AFP) today encouraged the general public to contribute to tsunami relief efforts, but urged donors to use caution when giving to avoid potential scams.

"After this unprecedented tragedy, donations of money and supplies are greatly needed," said AFP President and CEO Paulette V. Maehara, CFRE, "Americans are a very generous people and always respond positively to these types of crises, but they should also be vigilant and

informed in their giving. Maehara stressed that potential donors should know two things before they give to any organiza-

supporting legitimate; and, 2. Will the funds they're giving be used in an appropriate way, con-

sistent with their intent? Regarding the latter point, some organizations might be concentrating on relief efforts only in certain countries, or emphasizing certain aspects of the relief efforts. In some cases, charities may have already received enough funding for their relief projects and may encourage giving to a general fund, where the money might be used for future disaster relief.

"There's nothing wrong with that as long as the charity tells you upfront how your money will be used," said Maehara. "If you want your money to go to a certain country or particular effort, make sure you know exactly what the organization is doing and who or how it is

But first, donors should determine whether or not the charity they're supporting is legitimate. Many national and international charities are household names.

organizations who are working on tsunami relief efforts, even those you haven't heard of, are legitimate," said Maehara. "But as we saw with the 9/11 relief efforts,

there are always a few unscrupulous scam artists who would seek to take advantage of American generosity and make a quick buck at the expense of others."

To avoid fraudulent organizations and ensure contributions will be sent to a legitimate organization, Maehara recommended the follow-

When giving at a website, make sure the site is secure and that your personal information cannot be seen or stolen by others. Make sure the website itself is legitimate; sometimes scam artists use similar but slightly different names or domain names.

* When giving via the phone, obtain a phone number for the 1. Is the organization they're charity and call the number to ensure the number is legitimate.

* Be aware of organizations with similar sounding names. 'United Wayfarers' for example, sounds similar to 'United Way' but it may be a completely different charity or simply a fraudulent organization.

* Be suspicious of callers and

"The tips above are applicable to all giving, whether one is giving to disaster relief, education, research, or any other cause," continued Maehara. "Most people will not encounter a fraudulent solicitor or organization, but we feel it's important to remind the public that it pays to be careful. Give freely, but give wisely."





Earlier in the day, Freddie showed up at home weighing about 3 pounds less than he did when he was last seen in a neighbor's driveway on Dec. 29.

Amid Tensions, Iraqi Leader Affirms Jan. 30 Vote Plan Resisting pressure from insurgents and rivals in his own government, Prime Minister Ayad Allawi of Iraq on Wednesday reaffirmed his commitment to holding nationwide elections here on Jan. 30, while President Bush tried to quash any momentum toward delaying the election by calling Iraq's interim president. The Iraqi president, Ghazi al-Yawar, had expressed his own misgivings about the elections on Tuesday, characterizing the decision to hold them on time as a "tough call."

F.B.I. Warns of Internet Scams That Capitalize on Tsunami The F.B.I. issued a warning on Wednesday about online frauds that try to capitalize on the Indian Ocean tsunami disaster. The schemes, which have been reported to the bureau's Internet Crime Complaint Center over the past week, have included unsolicited e-mail messages seeking money and a phony tsunami relief Web site capable of depositing a virus on the computers of people who visit it. In other instances, families who have posted messages and e-mail addresses on the Web as part of their search for missing relatives have been contacted by rogue brokers offering to help them - for a fee. The bureau said it would aggressively pursue "those who would attempt to victimize philanthropic individuals." Some of the solicitations bear a striking resemblance to variations on a

widely circulated e-mail swindle often associated with Nigeria. Governor Calls for Reforms, Spending Cap
California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger on Wednesday called for a special session of the legislature to consider controversial reform proposals, including a law that would trigger across-the-board spending cuts to close a widening budget gap. Speaking in his second "State of the State" speech, Schwarzenegger called on the Democratic-controlled legislature to pass reforms on education and pensions opposed by state teachers and powerful upions.

G.O.P. Divided as Bush Views Social Security

As he begins deciding on details of his plan to add personal investment accounts to Social Security, President Bush is confronting a deep split within his own party over how to proceed. Two Republican camps are pitted against each other over how big the accounts should be and whether the president should embrace cuts in benefits. Mr. Bush intends to step up his involvement in the issue in coming days. He is meeting with Republican leaders at the White House on Thursday and giving a speech next week speech next week.

> Solid Progress Reported in Relief Effort for Devastated Indonesian Area

Ten days after the earthquake and tsunami flattened this western edge of Indonesia, relief officials described real progress on Wednesday in turning what started as a limited airlift for isolated regions into a vast truckbased network to supply relief to hundreds of thousands of injured and homeless people. The progress comes after what relief officials agree was a frustrating first week - plagued by shortages, bottlenecks and damaged infrastructure - and as the outpouring of international assistance topped \$3 billion for the dozen nations hit by waves that killed more than 150,000 people. Australia committed \$765 million to Indonesia on Wednesday, and a total of \$1 billion over five years, making it the largest donor yet. Germany officially put up some \$663 million for the region-wide relief and rebuilding effort, and Britain raised its contribution to \$100 million. \$100 million.

Last Mission for Powell, Bush Team's Benign Face

Senate confirmation hearing on Wednesday as lawmakers praised his climb from refugee to chief executive of Kellogg Co. At the hearing's close, several Democratic and Republican members of the Senate Commerce Committee indicated they would back the Cuban-born businessman. The panel could vote as early as Thursday, setting the stage for a full Senate vote later this month.

Bush Nominee Plans to Stand Firm on War-Captive Memo

Alberto R. Gonzales, who goes before the Senate on Thursday as President Bush's pick for attorney general, plans to offer an unapologetic defense of a draft memorandum he wrote in 2002 describing parts of the Geneva Conventions as "quaint" and "obsolete," administration officials said on Wednesday. Critics of the Bush administration, who stepped up their attacks Wednesday on Mr. Gonzales, the White House counsel, have called on him to repudiate the memorandum, which held that the Geneva Conventions did not apply to prisoners taken in the war in Afghanistan. But a senior administration official who is involved in preparing Mr. Gonzales for what could prove a contentious hearing said that he would not back down from the legal rationale he had laid out in

E-Mail Advises Bush on Social Security

The success of President Bush's push to remake Social Security depends on convincing the public that the system is "heading for an iceberg," according to a White House strategy e-mail that makes the case for cutting benefits promised for the future. Calling the effort "one of the most important conservative undertakings of modern times," Karl Rove deputy Peter Wehner says in the e-mail that "the Social Security battle is one we can win."

U.S. Wants N.Korea Reply on Nuke Talks by Feb. -Paper The United States is setting a deadline of early February for a reply from North Korea on whether the communist state will return to six-party talks on its nuclear arms program, a Japanese newspaper said on Thursday. If Pyongyang does not reply positively by the time President Bush gives his State of the Union address, the United States will prepare to bring the matter to the U.N. Security Council, the conservative Sankei Shimbun said, quoting an unidentified diplomatic source familiar with the talks.

LIPSCOMB HISTORY

The first death and burial that occurred in our county (as reported by the Panhandle Interstate) was January 3, 1888. It was a child named Earl Wade, age 7.

The article in the newspaper is heartbreaking: "There is no church yard or public burying ground in the neighborhood, and when the neighbors came to dig the grave, the father, upon whose heart had fallen his first great sorrow, led them to the top of a rise of ground a hundred yards back of the house. When the spade cut the ground it was to him like they were cutting into his own heart....'

The poem recited at the service was as follows:

"Like the dew on the mountain, Like the foam on the river-

Like the bubble on the fountain, He is gone, and forever."

Another poem appeared on a moss-covered tombstone and reported in the Follett Times on Dec. 23, 1948:

"Here lies my wife, Samantha Who ketch a cold and wouldn't


