Local Woman Bitten By Rattlesnake

Sunday evening, June 7, 2009, Christi Hart, who lives with her husband Jerry Hart and family on a farm almost equal distance from Morse, Spearman, and Gruver, made a decision that caused a life-threatening event for her

Jerry decided to go to a nearby field just off of highway 520 where they live, to check some moisture-stressed wheat. Christi, curious about the wheat, decided to ride along. When they reached the field, she had to cross a weedy patch to exam the wheat. As she stepped over the spot, a rattlesnake struck her leg twice in quick succession as it rattled.

The bites were between the ankle and calf, and they began to bleed. Jerry helped her get back in the pickup as they made their plans. While Jerry drove, Christi was glad she had her cell phone. She called 911 to alert the hospital that she was coming in with rattlesnake bites.

The procedures to deal with snake venom have been changing. No more do we cut an X over the bite and try to suck out the venom. Nor is ice applied. A tourniquet is not tightened above the bite. The best thing to do is to get to a hospital setting where the antivenom can be started with as little movement of the affected part as possible.

The antivenom comes in little vials and is much improved over the earlier kind. It is given by I. V.s and as many as 30 of the vials

may be used.

Despite doing the right thing, the bites were extremely painful, and her leg became very swollen. Christi will stay in the hospital

a few days for the swelling to go down. The recuperation period is around 30 days.



How To Prevent and Treat Snake Bites

Snake bites can be deadly. It's important to react quickly to bites. If emergency medical services can be reached, request help through 911. If in a remote area, getting the victim to medical care is vital.

North America is home to several different

North America is home to several different species of venomous snakes. The most common is the rattlesnake. Antivenin is available, but it must be used as early as possible.

Safety first! Get away from the snake.
That's probably why it bit in the first place.
Follow universal precautions and wear personal protective equipment if you have it.

 Call 911 immediately! Waiting until the

pain may lead to permanent tissue damage. Remember that calling 911 on a cell phone is different than a regular phone.

3. Do not elevate. Keep the bite below the level of the heart.

Wash the area with warm water and soap.

5. Remove constricting clothing and jewelry from the extremity. The area may swell and constricting items will cause tissue death.

6. If the snake is an elapid species (coral snakes and cobras), wrap the extremity with an elastic pressure bandage. Start from the point closest to the heart and wrap towards the fingers or toes. Continue to keep the bite lower than the heart.

7. Follow the basics of first aid while waiting for responders to arrive. Be especially concerned about the potential for shock.

the drug store don't work. Cutting into the wound will just create infections.

An ounce of prevention is worth a ton of first aid:

* Wear long pants and boots taller than the

* Avoid tall brush and deep, dark crevices.

* Make plenty of noise and vibration while walking.

* Do not approach snakes, avoid them.

* Do not expect rattlesnakes to make any noises.

3. If the snake is dead, bringing it to the hospital is appropriate. Be careful, dead snakes can reflexively bite for up to an hour.

4. In today's digital world, pictures are easy to get. A quick picture of the snake - even with a cell phone - will help medical crews identify the animal. Rattlesnakes are pit vipers, identified by dents in the side of their heads that look like ears. Coral snakes are small with bands of red bordered by pale yellow or white. Cobras have hoods that spread

behind their heads.

5. It's not that important to identify the snake; medical crews in areas prone to snake bites can often identify the animal just from the wound. Pit vipers have two fangs and the bite often has two small holes (see illustration). Coral snakes have small mouths full of teeth with rows of small puncture wounds.



Budget Proposal May 28, 2009

Senators voted unanimously in favor of the final version of the budget Thursday, ending that chamber's work on appropriations for the 2010-2011 biennium. The final proposal would allocate about the same amount as the version approved by the Senate earlier in the month. It would spend about \$81 billion in state funds, and \$183 billion in all funds, including \$12.1 billion from the federal stimulus act. "Members, this budget is balanced," said Finance Committee Chair Steve Ogden, who lead Senate negotiations with the House to craft a final budget proposal. Health and human services

spending for the next biennium would increase 10 percent. This includes funding to improve the Texas' state schools, under fire from the Department of Justice and identified as an emergency issue by the governor at the beginning of the session. "We've made a historical commitment to assisting our citizens with intellectual disabilities," said Ogden. "It is significant that we are going, the next session in 2011.

funding necessary to reform our state schools and create many new alternatives, thousands of alternatives, for these most deserving citizens to receive the help and the treatment they need outside of an institutional setting."

Other winners in this session's budget include higher education, with a 7 percent increase in spending, cancer research, which would get \$450 million in new funds, and correctional officers, who would get a 7 percent pay raise over the next two years. The approved budget also allocates \$17 billion for the Texas Department of Transportation, with \$6 billion of that going for new road construction.

Once House members approve the final budget proposal, it will go to the governor's desk.

Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister In the second week of Pentecost, we study 1 Samuel 15:34

16:13, Psalm 20, 1 Corinthians 5:1-17, and Mark 4:26-34. The prophet Samuel really liked King Saul and was saddened by Saul's fall from favor with God. The Lord sends Samuel to anoint a new king for Israel. Samuel goes to Bethlehem, contacts Jesse, and asks him to bring his sons to sacrifice to the Lord. Samuel is impressed by the oldest son, Eliab, but God does not choose Eliab. Samuel meets six more sons of Jesse, but they are not chosen by God. Finally, Jesse sends for his youngest son, David. David was a ruddy youth, had beautiful eyes and was handsome. God chose David. Samuel anoints David in the presence of his brothers, and the Spirit of the Lord came mightily upon David from that day forward We learn that God does not see us as others see us; and that to be chosen by God is to be imbued with His Spirit.

The Psalmist sings a song seeking God's protection of His anointed. "Now I know that the Lord will help his anointed; he will answer him from his holy heaven with mighty victories by his right hand." Again, being chosen by God is indi-

cated by the presence of God's Spirit.

Paul is working with the problems of the Church at Corinth He tells the Corinthians that when our earthly tent (body) i destroyed, we have a new building (body), a house not made by hands, eternal in the heavens. We hold to God's promise of eternal life and the sign of that within us is the Spirit. Paul tells the Corinthians that we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense for what has been done in the earthly body. Yet, we who have received Jesus Christ need not fear this judgment. For in Christ, each believer is a new creation, pure and dedicated to the Lord. Being chosen by God is indicated by the presence of God's Spirit.

Mark shows us a different parable of the "mustard seed." I we scatter the seed on the ground, sleep and rise the next day and the seed sprouts and grows, we do not know how this happens. The "seed" is the word of God. If we spread this Word it will grow. We may not "see" it grow, but it continues until the Kingdom of God becomes the greatest of all kingdoms.

We learn that it is not the power of a sermon, not our theological acuity, not our eloquence in telling the gospel story that causes others to believe and the Kingdom to grow; it is the power of the Holy Spirit revealing the Word of God to those that hear. It is the Holy Spirit that leads others to believe.

If we follow the example of our Great Teacher, then we realize that a true teacher avoids self-aggrandizement and does not display a sense of superiority. The true teacher must possess understanding, patience and kindness.

May the Holy Spirit choose you for God's service and equip you for your daily ministry.

Continued from Page 2 the House amended a bill to continue those two agencies for two more years, in an effort to stave off a special session. When that measure came over to the Senate, many Senators, including the bill's sponsor Bryan Senator Steve Ogden, didn't agree with the parliamentary tricks the House used to extend agency deadlines. "It's preposterous to say that a technical correction to the funds consolidation bill, is the safety net bill for all these agencies to not go into sunset," said Ogden. "I thought it was kind of dishonest and I thought it was kind of an insult to the quality of work we've done over here."

Senators might still have accepted the measure, had the House passed a bill that would have given about \$2 billion in bonding authority to TxDOT. The House, however,

suddenly adjourned their session without approving the bonds, leaving some Senators scratching their heads and others condemning them as irresponsible. "The House's actions wreck the TxDOT budget," said Ogden. "Without passing the authorization issuing those bonds they basically wrecked their budget. It's not right.'

The Senate adjourned their own session without approving the measure to extend the sunset dates on TxDOT and TDI. This, said some Senators, practically guarantees a special session to deal with these important issues.

Should the governor not call a special session, TxDOT and TDI would cease to exist on September 2, 2010. Until that time, both agencies can conduct business as usual, giving the governor plenty of time to mull if and when to call a special session.
