Internet Course



# **Applications Accepted For EQIP**

Farmers and ranchers may apply for the new Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) beginning July 14, 1997, and ending August 1, 1997.

This new conservation program, a result of the 1996 Farm Bill, offers a limited number of producers who have serious soil, water, and other natural resource problems with technical, financial, and educational assistance.

According to John P. Burt, State Conservationist for USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), "EQIP is not like

Program (ACP). This program is extremely limited and is for persons engaged in livestock or agricultural production who would provide the greatest environmental benefits at the least cost to the program.

"Applications will be prioritized after August 1, 1997, according to specific criteria," Burt continued. "After Farm Service Agency (FSA) determines producer eligibility, NRCS conservationists and the producer will make an inventory of the natural resources, identify natural the former Great Plains resource problems and concerns, Conservation Program (GPCP) or determine treatment needs, and

Agricultural Conservation agree upon the land management and structural practices the producer will install." Burt added that the extent of the conservation practice, fields and acres to be treated, and cost-share rate and incentive payment levels the producer will accept, as well as the total program payments, are included in a ranking formula.

Twelve Geographic Priority Areas (GPA), encompassing 167 counties, are the primary target for over \$8.7 million EQIP funds allocated to Texas. Each GPA has similar natural EQIP sign-up resource problems and concerns which EQIP can address. Water conservation, excessive wind and water erosion, limited water supply, and brush invasion are a few of the specific resource concerns identified in the GPAs.

Each application will compete with other applications in their GPA, while those outside of the GPAs will compete against each other. "Contracts will be awarded based on their ranking, regardless of location," cautioned Burt. "That means some counties may not have any contracts, even though they are located inside a GPA," he said. Burt added that applications for a single conservation practice on an individual field addressing a single natural resource concern may not be competitive in a GPA or with the statewide natural resource concerns.

Acceptance into EQIP will require a 5- to 10-year contract, even if only 1 year of cost-share is needed. Contracts are for a maximum amount of \$50,000 with a maximum 75 percent cost-share. Though entire farms or operating units are not required to be included in a contract, the proposed area must include that portion with the identified resource concerns which meets the goals and objectives of the GPA or statewide natural resource concerns. Producers may increase their chances of acceptance by submitting a lower than maximum cost-share rate, enrolling entire operating units in the contract, and by agreeing to fully meet treatment needs of all identified natural resource concerns on the farm or ranch.

## Missionaries Travel To Belarus

On July 10, 1997 two residents of Spearman set out for an adventure of a lifetime to Minsk, Belarus, one of the commonwealth countries of the former Soviet Union. By invitation of the Secretary of Children's and Social Affairs of Balarus, Johnny & Sherry Taylor will be leading a team of 15 short term missionaries from the panhandle of Texas to "teach" Christianity in the largest and most prominent children's camp in the country. "With the recent election of Lukeshencko, a hard line communist, we feel that the opportunities for Christian evangelization in Belarus could come to a halt very soon. We've already seen many organizations denied visas in recent months with all the new laws being passed to prohibit Christian evangelization." said Pastor Taylor of Trinity Fellowship Church in Spearman.

Pastor Taylor and his family have been in Belarus every year since 1992, working with the C.I.S. Church Development Foundation of Amarillo. The CISCDF has been working in the former Soviet Republics since 1992 and have delivered more than \$6 million in medical supplies and medicines into some of the most impoverished areas of Belarus, delivering the supplies directly through the local churches to the hospitals. "This has, by far, been the most effective means of delivery. The changes of confiscation by government officials, or criminals has decreased dramatically because we deliver all the goods ourselves! You can't even begin to imagine the gratitude of the people of Belarus. We meet some of their most basic needs and then we tell them why we are there - children to." said Pastor Taylor. "During the "Soviet" years, these camps were used to indoctrinate the children into communism, Marxism and socialism. The children are required to attend the camps each year and most remain there for no less than thirty days per year. The old system still remains, but for now, instead of hearing about the glory of communism, they'll be hearing about the Glory of God and Salvation through Jesus Christ." Taylor beamed.

Taylor believes that the doors to the former Soviet Union are slowly being closed and the opportunity to evangelize there may be totally taken away very soon. "It is imperative for us to do all we can, as quickly as we can to reach all those we can before it is too late!" he said.

Pastor Taylor, his wife Sherry and Amy and Matt spent three months in Belarus during the summer of 1993 along with a native of Spearman, Josie Holt, daughter of Larry and Jan Holt of Spearman. "It was the greatest time of my life", remembers Sherry, "It was one of the most eye opening experiences of my life, but still one of the best."

"As we go back to Belarus this year, it will be a lot like a homecoming. We'll see old friends and meet new ones, but this year may be a very special one. It very well could be our last. Only God knows for sure!"

Let us replenish the seed of faith through...

DR. DOBSON: Kids have been playing "cowboys and Indians" and other combat games for hundreds of years, and I'm inclined to feel that the current worry is

Young boys, particularly, live in a feminine world; they're with their mothers far more than their dads. The teachers of the nursery school, kindergarten and elementary school are likely to be women. Their Sunday school teachers are probably female, too. In this sugar and spice world, I think it is healthy for boys to identify with masculine models, even if the setting involves combat. Two boys can "shoot" each other without emotional arousal. "Bang! Bang! You're dead," they shout.

On the other hand, parents should limit the amount of violence and killing their children view on television and in the movies. The technology of audiovisual electronics has become tremendously effective and can be far more stimulating and damaging. Measurable physiological changes occur while a child is watching a violent movie; the pulse rate quickens, eyes dilate, hands sweat, the mouth goes dry and breathing accelerates. If repeated often, the emotional impact of this experience should be obvious.


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


### **Gruver College News**



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# Ag Day Set For July 24th

Virtually any issue that concerns High Plains growers or impacts production of summer crops will be highlighted during the 1997 North Plains Research field Ag Day, say scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and USDA's Agricultural Research Service, in conjunction with West Texas A&M University Agriculture Division faculty, organizers of the event.

The field day will take place on Thursday, July 24th at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's North Plains Research Field, nine miles north of Dumas on U.S. Highway 287. Registration starts at 8:30 a.m. with refreshments and opportunities to see a select group of exhibits. Attendance is free

and lunch is being sponsored by the Texas Corn Growers Board.

Research and demonstration field tours will begin by 9 a.m. Three continuing education units (CEUs) will be available for commercial, non-commerical, and private applicators needing credits for pesticide applicator recertification.

"We've structured our program to provide growers with the essential information they may need to make better decisions with summer crops production," said Thomas Marek, Field Station superintendent.

The event, now held once every three years, offers growers the latest information on how to improve crop quality and consistency for irrigated and dryland systems.

"Our current research and

demonstration efforts also reflect direct input from the growers. It's an excellent way for them to see our progress," Marek said. "Our chief aim is to help them solve problems and make improvements in their production systems."

Specialized topics include presentations from Leon New, Extension agricultural engineer who will discuss heat unit changes in the North Plains PET Network. Insect modeling validations and insect resistant pre-treated grain sorghum seed for both dryland and irrigation will be featured. Extension entomologist, Carl Patrick, will address biotechnology issues involving transgenic or Bt corn variety trails.

Soybean variety results will be offered by Clay Salisbury, Experiment Station agronomist, who will also address weed control problems in the Panhandle. Extension agronomist, Brent Bean will present results of three major studies regarding limited water production of corn, starter fertilizer assessments on corn and planting date, and maturity and production work with corn yield for the northern panhandle.

County Extension agents will address corn varietal tests using limited sprinkler water and narrow row corn spacing trials. Experiment Station plant pathologist, Charles Rush will discuss current issues involving ergot disease development in grain sorghum.

Grower-subscribers to the North Plains PET Network and anyone interested in this new tool benefiting area production systems can see a high tech demonstration using computers and the internet to obtain data generated by ten weather stations linked around the Panhandle.

During lunch, keynote speakers include Amarillo Experiment Station research director, John Sweeten who will describe the new initiatives for agriculture being pursued by units headquartered in the Panhandle. State representative David Swinford will be briefing participants on legislative issues directly impacting Panhandle. Texas A&M University System\* Agriculture Program official, Ronald Lacewell of College Station will address the future of irrigation in the Texas High

The final segment of interest to growers using irrigation will feature a demonstration of a new generation of water well drilling technology, aided by mini-camera videography inside well casings. Water well reclamation issues will also be addressed.

Other organizations actively sponsoring for this year's event are the North Plains Ground Water Conservation District No. 2, and the Panhandle Agriculture Advisory Council.

The students are required to learn, work hard, achieve discipline, and have some fun. Recognition and scholarships are offered as rewards.

The Bobwhite Brigade is the "Brainchild" of Dr. Dale Rollins, Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialist of San Angelo, Texas. He is also the camp director.

Cadets were divided into coveys and each covey competed for prizes. Each covey performed a necropsy on a quail to learn anatomy and functions of the various parts.

One of the most exciting activities for me was the radio telemetry. A radio collar was placed around the quail's neck, then secured under the wings, and released into the wild. A day later we used a receiver to track our birds.

A most unusual thing happened to my covey while looking for our quail. We found that a five foot rattlesnake had swallowed it!

We learned far more than just about the quail. Leadership, public speaking, cooperation and team work were learned. At the same time we studied about ecology, biology, wildlife management, etc.
