

With a great deal of interest and pleasure I read the article by Mr Rodney Sumner entitled 'Teachers make a difference'. I agree wholeheartedly with Mr Sumner that there are teachers who want to inspire students to excel; to learn and to acquire knowledge that is above and beyond that which is required to graduate high school. And this is a good thing.

My great fear, however, is that the federal (No Child Left Behind) and the state (TAKS) requirements of standardized testing have the perverse effect of directing the energies of our teachers toward the middle or lower end of the achievement scale. The federal and state rules and policies are devoted to bringing the lower achieving students up to a minimum standard. (hence, NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND). This standard becomes higher each succeeding year.

In the federal and state achievement measuring system, the teachers, schools and school districts are graded against a minimum standard. The controlling factor is how many students attain the minimum passing score. No points are given for excellence.

Would anyone be surprised, then, to find that the schools and the teachers are spending a great

Can Teachers continue to "Make" amount of time trying to ensure that all the students pass the TAKS tests? Furthermore, the federal requirement of meeting "Annual Yearly Progress" is a matter of compelling interest to the schools and the school district.

Now, attempting to ensure that all students get a minimum passing grade on the various TAKS tests requires many hours of tutoring, drilling and practice testing on likely TAKS test questions. Each hour devoted to TAKS preparation is an hour that is not available for teaching the regular curriculum and/or for devoting special attention to individual students.

Whether we want to admit it or not, almost all of us, teachers included, operate on the principle of enlightened self-interest. So long as the teachers, schools, administrators and school districts are being measured and graded on how well students perform on the TAKS tests, we will have students who are taught to pass the test; when they should be learning the curriculum and learning how to

acquire and apply knowledge. A lot of good teachers will be so busy "teaching to the test" they will not have time to do for students those special things that create life long memories.



Project Childsafe is funded by a grant from the United States Department of Justice that has supplied law enforcement agencies all over the state of Texas with nearly 1.2 million of the free gunlocks in the last two years, to simply remind gun owners that their most important responsibility is to know how to safely handle and properly store their firearms at home.

We are in the Season of Pentecost, yet this Sunday is Trinity Sunday. Our lessons are in Genesis 1:1-2:4, Psalm 8, 2 Corinthians 13: 5-14, and Matthew 28:16-20.

We profess belief in God the Father by whom all things were made, in Jesus Christ his Son, who died for us, and in the Holy Spirit which leads us to faith in Christ and keeps us in faith. Yet, we also profess God is

Can you understand or explain this, Christian? Contemporary Muslim theologians believe that modern Christians have less of a grasp of the Trinity than earlier Christians, and they believe we are all in error. because God is One!

Christ is a Messenger of God (a prophet to the Christians as

Mohammed is a prophet to Muslims). Jewish theologians also believe we Christians have erred, inasmuch as God is One and if one is to try to explain God by aspects or "personalities" three is far too few. St. Patrick addressed Christians of his day by plucking a clover and pointing out its three leaves which are different but part of the same

plant; thus, for St. Patrick, God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit are One but exhibiting different aspects of the God-head. Our Genesis lesson and Psalm 8 shows us God the father, Paul exhorts the Corinthians in his "harsh letter" to realize that Christ is in us through the Holy Spirit, Matthew shows us Christ as God giving his disciples

their commission, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations...". Please read these lessons, pray over them, and study them that you may more readily understand the Triune nature of our One God. May the Holy Spirit grant you understanding and time for amendment of life.

Lake Level--May 16, 2005-- Palo Duro Creek was most likely a crossroads of many different peoples. He believes, based on sites discovered during his survey, that the Palo Duro Creek watershed has been occupied intermittently for 10,000 years.

It is, of course, difficult to date sites but one method that is commonly used is based on projectile points found. The oldest of the projectile points is the Clovis point and while none have been found in our watershed area, at least three Clovis point sites are relatively near including the

Miami site in Roberts County. Perryton, and Texhoma. Tents Peterson writes, "Because of the were set up in the different smaller indisputable association of Clovis projectile points and mammoth remains, and the consistency of radiocarbon dates that place the finds between 11,000 and 12,000 years ago, these sites are extremely important. Palo Duro Creek is essentially bracketed on the east, west, and south by these sites " The Folsom projectile point, the next oldest, has been found in the Palo Duro Creek area. It is a smaller projectile than the Clovis point and is generally considered to be more refined. It has been found in association with the remains of the extinct bison -- bison antiquus. It is the Folsom point that gives us an idea that our first "settlers" on Palo Duro Creek arrived about 10,000 years ago.

Storm Watchers Needed

The Amarillo National Weather Service (NWS), along with local citizens, are in the process of developing a new severe storm network called "TOP SCAN" (Texas & Oklahoma Panhandle Skywarn Cellular Area Network). TOP SCAN members are volunteers, who will be dispatched to the field when severe weather threatens. They will use personal cell phones to relay critical severe weather information to a local dispatch, who, in turn will relay the reports to the Amarillo NWS. The purpose of TOP SCAN is to assist and improve the severe weather warning process by obtaining real time reliable reports from trained spotters to compliment and expand upon the Amarillo Radio Spotter Network already in place. "We believe this is the first organization of its kind, said Warning Coordination Meteorologist Steve Drillette. We are excited about its pos-

TOP SCAN will consist of several chapters across the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles. Each chapter will be responsible for seeing that members are trained by Amarillo NWS, and will be responsible for activating and directing spotters in the field. Each chapter will maintain a central dispatch, where it will receive severe weather reports. The dispatcher will relay these reports to the Amarillo NWS. Several citizens of the area have worked with officials from the NWS to lay down the ground work for the organization. Several chapters (noted below) are currently being organized and are looking to recruit members. USDA-NRCS Continues 2005 Conservation Security Program Sign-Up for 20 Watersheds in Texas

Signup for the 20 Texas watersheds selected for funding in 2005 continues through May 27, 2005. The Conservation Security Program (CSP) is the first conservation program to recognize farmers and ranchers for their high levels of environmental stewardship and to help producers maintain and further their conservation commitment.

"CSP is a whole new direction in the history of USDA conservation programs," said USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) State Conservationist Dr. Larry D. Butler. "It represents the first time agricultural producers are being paid not just to fix a problem, but in recognition of their ongoing stewardship.

The Upper Wolf Watershed in Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Hansford and Hutchinson counties is one of the watersheds selected for CSP. Producers interested in participating will need to fill out a CSP selfassessment workbook and bring the completed workbook and needed documentation of conservation management activities to their local NRCS office. NRCS personnel will then determine if their operation meets the requirements for the program. CSP information and the selfassessment workbook are available at local NRCS Service Centers, or on the NRCS Web site at www.tx.nrcs.usda.gov/programs/csp.

If the operation meets CSP requirements, NRCS personnel will then determine the enrollment category and tier the producer qualifies for, and selects the categories to be funded. "All successful applications begin with the demonstrated protection of soil and water quality," said Butler. "However, most CSP participants will go beyond the minimum and work to further enhance soil and water, improve wildlife habitat, and conserve or produce on-farm energy."

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

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Hansford Hospital's Respiratory Care Department receives new equipment

Respiratory The Department at Hansford County Hospital District recently received a grant from the Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA), which allowed them to purchase much needed equipment. A new ventilator and EKG equipment was obtained as the result of two different grants that allowed several departments to upgrade or buy new equipment.

The ventilator was afforded as the result of a Bio-terrorism grant. The new ventilator replaces a very old one that was built in the 1970's. Although still operational, it has become extremely difficult to get parts for the old ventilator, and it lacked several updated functions that our physicians need to provide the best care possible. Primarily, the ventilator is used for breathing support for patients that are unable to breath on their own or need assistance with breathing.

The new EKG machine and a stress treadmill were made possible through the ORCA Capital Equipment Improvement grant. The old EKG equipment was donated to the hospital through an outreach program provided by Baptist St Anthony's Healthcare system over 15 years ago. It is still operational but lacks the ability to incorporate stress testing, which our doctors would like to do. The new equipment has the stress option and allows more specific gender and pediatric interpretation capabilities. The new EKG machine also prints out a full-page report, as compared to the strip printed by the old equipment.

Also afforded by the ORCA grant was the purchase of a new oxygen regulation and alarm console. The new system regulates the oxygen that is piped into all of the patient rooms, as well as the emergency department. The old system was installed when the hospital was built in the 1950's. The new system provides oxygen pressure and alarm monitoring capabil-
