Substance found in sand filter...

temporary plant shuts down

The temporary sanitation plant was closed last week after having failed to meet the Texas Water Commission requirements for the past couple of months.

Davis Water and Waste Industries, Inc. (Daveco) was called to come look into the situation. "They emptied the water out of the sand filter, which is the final stage of treatment," City Manager Kelvin Knauf said. He continued, "And once they emptied the water they noticed black clumps of material throughout the sand filter." Some where bigger than others, Knauf added

Samples of the material were taken and sent to a laborator in Amarillo. According to Knauf the lab report the material is some kind of hydrocarbon. Knauf explained that this means the material is new or used oil, petroleum

Knauf went on to explain that right after the temporary plant was started in February, while Daveco employees were still here, they noticed that a lot of oil was coming from the sewer system into the temporary plant. "This occurred on at least two occasions," Knauf stated. He continued, "That has lead us to believe that someone has dumped this substance into the system. We don't know who or when." He added, "We only suspect (this is what happened). We don't know for sure, but from the employees' observation and the testing it looks like that is what has happened.

Knauf then explained that the substance could have came from various places such as any business or person that deals with oil, petroleum, or animal or vegetable



The cost of replacing the sand and gravel filter was quoted at \$4,500, plus the labor and travel expenses for Daveco to replace it is a minimum of \$2,000, according to Knauf. He added, "The city is going to have to absorb this cost because it wasn't a problem with Daveco's equipment or installation as far as has been determined as of Tuesday, April 13.

Although the temporary is closed Knauf said that the old plant is still running.

Knauf concluded the interview by saying, "If you dump these substances into the sewer system we are urging you to quit. It is illegal disposal and if it is discovered (who is doing it) legal action will be

The Gruver Board of Education held a special meeting on Monday, April 12, to adopt a resolution expressing opposition to Constitutional Amendment 1 and in support for Constitutional Amendment 2 on the May 1 ballot.

According to the ballot, Constitutional Amendment 1 would allow limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local district to set a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem lax levied by county education districts.

Constitutional Amendment 2 is stated on the ballot as exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates.

The board is encouraging voters to voice their opinions regarding the constitutional amendments by contacting Senator Teel Bivins at 374-8994 (Amarillo) or 512-463-0131 (Austin) and Representative Warren Chisum at 1-800-692-1389.

Though each of the entities is holding early voting Monday through Friday, the voting times

Both the City of Spearman and the City of Gruver conduct early voting from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. To vote for the city offices in Spearman, individuals need to report to Spearman City Hall, 30 S.W. Court. Those voting for city offices in Gruver will go to the Gruver City Hall, 108 E. Broadway.

If individuals are voting in the school district elections the times vary. Gruver I.S.D. will be taking early voting in the Gruver HighSchool Business Office, 601 Garrett Street, from 8 a.m. to 4:30

p.m. Both Spearman I.S.D. and Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. voting times are from 8 a.m to 4 p.m. To vote for the Spearman Board of Trustee positions report to the Spearman High School Business Office, 403 W. 11th. Those voting for the positions on the Pringle-Morse school board need to go to the Pringle-Morse Superintendent's Office, 100 5th Street, in Morse.

The time set for voting in the Hansford County election is from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

"LEVEL 4. PLEASE"!! II Corinthians 5:14

As a child I remember going shopping in downtown Amarillo. Department stores still had elevator operators. Shoppers boarded the elevator and told the operator the desired floor. Each floor was organized around particular goods (women's clothing, menswear, etc.). That wasn't important to me. I just liked riding the elevator. The higher the better

To get to the top level, the elevator had to pass each floor in succession. That's obvious, but worth noting.

One thousand years ago, a monk named Bernard of Clairvaux lived and ministered in France. He was a man with deep insight into Scripture, and rare devotion to Christ Jesus. One of his books, On Loving God, is a classic. In it he describes why and how to love God. He defines four levels of love.

The basic level of love is that of a person loving himself for his own sake. It is a natural enough attachment. Paul says no one hates his own flesh, but nurtures it. Without checks and balances this level of love breeds meanness and judgmentalism.

Secondly, a person loves God for his personal benefit. God is a great -- the greatest Benefactor. He certainly wants everyone to know His blessings.

Thirdly, says Bernard, a person learns to love God for God's sake. Moving beyond His blessings to His Person. Tasting God and knowing He's good, apart from His blessings, is a major step.

Finally, a pinnacle few stand on, and yet all are invited to, comes in learning to love yourself for God's sake. Finding we are fearfully and wonderfully made by God Himself; and then freely sacrificing ourselves to our God, Who is also our Father, that is the top floor.

FRUITS: A NATURAL SWEET

Fruits, often called nature's sweet, are an important part of a healthy diet. According to surveys, most people eat fresh fruit for snacks; and the banana is the most popular fruit in America, followed by apples and seedless grapes.

The USDA Food Guide Pyramid recommends two to four servings of fruit each day. For most, that's easy to do because fruit is so popular and makes such a handy snack when eaten fresh. Because it's also naturally sweet, it can serve as a dessert, substituting for higher fat and calorie-laden desserts.

Fruit gives a quick source of energy in the form of carbohydrate.

Fruits and fruit juices also provide important amounts of vitamins A and C and potassium. They are low

in fat and sodium. Some fruits provide a good amount of fiber, including apples, berries, figs, pears, peaches and prunes.

Serving sizes are important when interpreting the Food Guide recommendations. A serving size is a particular amount of food, not just the number of times it is eaten per day. For example, a serving size of fruit would be a small to medium orange or banana, or half of a large banana; one-half cup chopped, cooked or canned fruit; and threefourths cup juice. When selecting juices, only 100 percent fruit juice products are considered a serving. Other products such as fruit punches, ades or sodas contain only a little juice and added sugar. Fruit jellos also do not qualify.

Other tips for including fruits in the diet follow:

· Include many forms. Choose fresh fruit, fruit juice and frozen, canned or dried fruit. Go easy on fruit canned or frozen in syrup or sugar. Read the labels for content.

· Include whole fruits. They are higher in fiber than fruit juices.

· Include citrus fruits, melons and berries because they are rich in vitamin C. We need vitamin C each day because the body does not store

· Always wash fresh fruits before preparing or eating to remove any surface dirt, residue or bacte-

chatted with former President George Bush, and given White House tours to the likes of Kevin Costner, Arnold Schwarzenegger and the Chicago Bulls.

Although happily settled in Abilene and pursuing a bachelor's degree in agriculture, the sergeant from Gruver occasionally misses life as a Marine and is well-known among friends for stories of his military days.

"Nothing compares to working in the White House," Ross says with a thick Southern accent. "I had what they called a 'top-secret-category clearance,' and I'm allowed to look up classified material and can even carry a loaded weapon 15 feet of the president.

"I even got to talk to President Bush for 10 minutes," he enthuses. "He is a really nice man. I have a lot of respect for him.

Besides guarding the White House, Ross traveled with the president to such exotic places as Ha-

waii, Egypt and France in 1990. The well-mannered sergeant also received his greatest honor while serving in the White House.

"I received a Presidential Service Badge after being at the White House for one year," he says beaming with pride as he removes the prized badge from its case. "It is solid gold, you know'.

"Every time they make one, it While most of his freshman is numbered," he says pointing to the number on his badge. "President Kennedy gave orders to have these given out, and since then only 11,000 have been given out. Very few Marines have one of these. Even colonels who have been in the Marine Corps for 20-30 years won't know what it is.'

His face smooths into a wide grin as he reminisces about the past.

"All the badges are worn on the left except for the Presidential Service Badge," he explains. Soit is not unusual for an officer of higher rank to walk up and bellow "What is

"I would reply, 'Sir, that's the Presidential Service Badge. It is worn on the right.

The year spent guarding the White House was the best of Ross's four years in the Marine Corps.

Out of 100,000 Marines he was one of four chosen to guard the White House. However, like anything worthwhile, the opportunity did not come easy. Three years of training went into preparing him for the mission.

After undergoing basic training 13 weeks, which was "constant marching, constant training and constant chaos," Ross went on to infantry school in North Carolina to learn how to be a good foot sol-

He quickly learned that strenuous physical and mental training for the Marines was as common as eating meals.

However, Ross remembers one incident when the training was almost too much to bear.

"Oh, howdy! Swim training was the worst memory I have," he drawls. "You have to swim 25 meters with boots, full uniform, a 30-pound pack, an 8.79-pound rifle, helmet and two full tin cans.

"In the water, you have to take off your pack and lay your rifle on top of it so that you can shoot at someone if you're being shot at," he

To make the task more challenging, each Marine is also expected to jump off a 12-15 foot platform and tread water with the heavy load for 5-8 minutes. ***************

"A lot of guys don't pass swim training the first time and get dropped from their platoon," he

"If I had been dropped, that would have been my worst," he says, "I remember praying every night. 'Lord, please do not let me get dropped.

The main thing that separates the Marine Corps from the other services is that when it comes to mental training, it is tougher than the other services 100 times," he

They mess with your mind. I was not prepared for that. I was prepared for the physical training,"

While Ross was training diligently, the FBI was investigating him because it saw potential in Ross to become one of the few Marines selected to guard the White House.

The FBI was right about Ross having potential. He was chosen to be the Marine of the Year in 1990.

"They went to my hometown, talked to my family and church members to find out what kind of a kid I was," he says. "The investigation lasted for one year, and by then they had spent \$60,000 to get me a top-secret-category clearance.

"They don't send people to Desert Storm after spending so much money," Ross says. He pulls out a gray calculator, does some quick calculations and continues, "Only 60 Marines had ever been selected to guard the White House since President Nixon started the program in 1972.'

While most people would find the transition from guarding the White House to going to college in Abilene difficult, Ross is ready.

He finds it refreshing to be with Christians after spending four years in the Marine Corps, filled primarily with non-believers. Ross also is glad finally to be studying agriculture in his parents' alma mater to fulfill his dream of becoming a

Brought up on a farm in Gruver was like the 'Little House on the Prairie," he says fondly. "I'd always helped my father raise wheat, milo and corn. I also love working on the horses and the cattle.

Now, in addition to using farming vocabulary, Ross also is hooked on some military terminologies.

"I would say open the hatch instead of the door, and if someone I mean floor," he grins.



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


