Police and Sheriff's Departments Offer Tips for Safe and Happy Halloween



To get the most out of Trick or Treating, be safe and use good common sense.

Trick-or-treaters

Be sure your costume is not too long. You don't want to be tripping over it.

If you wear a mask, be sure you can see out of it clearly. Consider using face paint instead of a mask because you will be

It is a good idea to wear clothing with reflective tape.

Trick-or-treating

Be sure your parents know where you are going. Take along a couple of quarters for emergency phone calls. Go with a group of three or more people.

If you feel unsafe, take along an adult.

Do not ride a bicycle. Your costume could get hung up in it. Carry a flash light. Walk on a sidewalk.

If a sidewalk is not available, walk on the left side of the road facing traffic.

Cross busy streets at a intersection or cross walk. Be sure to look both ways (2 times) before crossing the street.

Walk, don't run. Take off your mask while walking from house to house.

Stay away from parked cars. Be very cautious of strangers

Only stop by houses that have their front porch light on. Accept treats only in doorway - never go into the house. Always say "Thank-You".

Homeowners

Make sure your yard is clear of such things as ladders, hoses, leashes and flower pots that can trip the young


Battery powered jack o'lantern candles are preferable to a real

Make sure paper or cloth yard decorations won't be blown into a flaming candle.

Crisis Center Receives Grant

The Panhandle Crisis Center recently received the news that the final funds needed to renovate their building were being provided by the Meadows Foundation in Dallas in the form of a \$50,000 contribution.

The Meadows Foundation is a private philanthropic institution established in 1948 by Algur H. and Virginia Meadows to benefit the people of Texas. Mr. Meadows built General American Oil Company of Texas into one of the nation's most successful independent oil and gas production companies. Algur and Virginia Meadows established The Meadows Foundation so that their philanthropy would continue in perpetuity. The foundation's assets have grown to a current value in excess of \$800 million, and it has dispersed over \$430 million in grants and direct charitable expenditures to over 2,000 Texas institutions and agencies. The Foundation looks for programs and services that seek to alleviate pain, enhance social skills and promote better human relations. The Meadows Foundation is among the most recognized private philanthropies in the country

Bivins Foundation in Amarillo awarded \$35,000 to Panhandle Crisis Center in support of its fundraising efforts. The Mary E. Bivins Foundation is committed to improving and enriching the quality of life in the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle. They are dedicated to meeting the physical, mental, social and spiritual needs of people by helping them achieve and maintain dignity, independence, self-worth and good health. The vision of the Mary E. Bivins Foundation centers on elder care, religious-based organizations and communitybased charitable undertakings. The foundation was founded with the noble goals of the betterment of humanity, leaving the earth better than it was found, and encouraging those who follow to do the same.

Previously in June, The Mary

Also, The Sunshine Lady Foundation, Inc. has contributed \$5,000. Mary Frances Ellzev was awarded the 2002 PEACE award from this foundation and because of this award, high priority was given to the Panhandle Crisis Center when considering

their request for a donation towards their capital campaign. The Sunshine Lady Foundation stated that their contribution was a testimony to the need panhandle Crisis Center has recognized in the community and their ability to address it. They join the Crisis Center in an effort to end violence against women and children.

Earlier this year, Panhandle Crisis Center purchased the building located at 301 S. Ash in Perryton with funds raised from the campaign. The entire budget for the project is \$200,848. In addition to the \$125,000 awarded from foundations, \$75,848 was raised locally in Ochiltree, Lipscomb Hansford and Counties. Once renovated, the building will serve as a comprehensive counseling center for victims of family violence and sexual assault. Included in the building will be a small resale store where second-hand clothing and furniture will be sold. The profits from this store will be used to support the Center's services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, as well as provide another place where families can obtain needed items at bargain prices. Panhandle Crisis Center plans to utilize many volunteers to help operate this business. The Center hopes to move to its new facility in January of 2004.

In preparation for the remodeling project, no further donations will be accepted at the building site. Any donations must be delivered to Panhandle Crisis Center's office at 317 S. Main. The Center is accepting few donations at present due to its limited storage space.





Extension Specialist to Speak on Proposed Beef Regulations



A brisket lunch will be served. RSVP to Hansford County Extension Office, 659-4130 or 733-2901. The program is free; donations for lunch will be accepted.




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
