Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock, stated, "Winter driving
is treacherous because it's so unis treacherous because it's so un-
predictable. Fog could be over the next hill, a patch of ice on an over-
pass, or someone in front of you on a snow-packed road goes into a
skid. However, if drivers arearmed


Probably, the most basic driving
rule of all is to adjust your driving rule of all is to adjust your drivin
to the current conditions. If all driv ers follow that one rule, collisions year round could be reduced dra
matically. Major Cawthon advised
there there are two general winter driv-
ing rules which could help keep drivers out of trouble on hazardou roads: Rule No. 1-Drive smoothly Anytime you are on a slick surface
you must maintain traction. Any you must maintain traction. Any traction causing loss of control. So turn of the wheel, every move to

The State Comptroller's office has released a report of state sales
and use tax for the first quarter 1992 in Hansford County. For all indutries in Hansford ter of 1992 totaled $\$ 17,498,357$, as compared with $\$ 14,804,701$ in the first quarter of 1991. That represents a 18.2 percent.
The number of reporting outlets decreased from 1991 to 1990. In 1991 there were 147 outlets listed
