Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: A few isolated showers were reported, with accumulations ranging from 0.1 inch to 1.5 inches. However, the region overall continued to experience hot, dry and windy weather. Soil-moisture levels were mostly very short. The danger of wildfire remained high. Farmers with irrigation were applying lots of water to all summer crops. Rangeland and pasture conditions were very poor in most counties. Ranchers continue to cull herds due to the drought. Supplemental feeding was heavy by those ranchers trying to hang on to cattle.

Weekly Update

Texas, May 31- Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 7.0 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.63/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has fallen 3.2 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.77/g, according to gasoline price website Texas-GasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were \$1.03/g higher than the same day one year ago and are 20.3 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 13.7 cents per gallon during the last month and stands \$1.04/g higher than this day one year ago.

The Hansford County Commissioners Court will meet on Monday, June 13th. The Commissioners will Consider/Approve extending the Burn Ban and will also consider banning all fireworks sales and use in the county.



HB 1's conference committee report, however, was a train without wheels: it could not go anywhere without passage of a "state fiscal matters" bill that instructs how and where the funding comes from. That bill, SB 1811, also in the form of a conference committee report, commanded the spotlight on Sunday, May 29. While it requires 6 percent acrossthe-board school funding cuts in 2012 and more complex formulas for cuts to be made in 2013, the conference committee report prompted a string of questions and speeches decrying its patchwork of budget cuts augmented by fee and fine increases, accounting delays, speed-ups, deferrals and revenue projections. On Sunday, the 139th day of the 140-day session, a number of lawmakers protested the fact that the 205-page conference committee report was only made available late that same morning, and therefore did not receive the normally afforded due process, meaning scrutiny by citizens and the press followed by open public debate by lawmakers. 





As we prepare to celebrate Pentecost, we study Acts 2: -21, Psalm 104: 24-35, 1 Corinthians 12: 3b-13, and John 20: 19-23.

Pentecost was a time of celebration of the Giving of the Law to Moses and celebration of the barley harvest in Israel. Christians celebrate Pentecost as the giving of the Holy Spirit. The beginning of Jesus' ministry starts with the indwelling of the Holy Spirit at Jesus' baptism for the sake of the world; the Church's ministry begins with the gift of the Holy Spirit for the sake of the world. Jesus explained his ministry through the prophet Isaiah and Peter explains the event at Pentecost through the prophet Joel. The disciples, after receiving the Holy Spirit, rush out into the streets of Jerusalem to proclaim the good news of the gospel. All present, regardless of language and nationality, understand these excited disciples. Some think that the disciples had been drinking which allows Peter to preach the first Christian sermon

The Psalmist is singing a song of praise to God for the greatness of his works. He sings that God controls even the unruly sea and Leviathan which lives in the sea. God provides all that have breath with food in due season When God's spirit goes forth, the ground is renewed The Psalmist vows to sing to the Lord for as long as he lives. God controls even chaos. Therefore, cast the anxieties that you have upon God who cares for you. Do not fear the daily news or the bumps we all experience on the road to life.

Paul is answering questions for the Corinthians, who have received the Holy Spirit, but have fallen into jealousy, striving, arrogance and a propensity to measure their own worth through comparisons with other people. Paul's purpose in writing is to heal the divisions in the Church and encourage the Corinthians to more fully manifest Christ. Paul does this by saying that the Holy Spirit is what enables us to say, "Jesus is Lord!" The Holy Spirit gives a variety of gifts for the common good of the believers. And so, if one has the gift of healing, another the gift of prophecy, another the gift of various tongues, these are all gifts by the same Holy Spirit. The gifts of the Holy Spirit are to be used for the benefit of all. So just as the body is one and has many members, yet all are one body, so is the Church one body united by the Holy Spirit. The gifts of the spirit are given not for self-aggrandizement, but for service. John's version of the giving of the Holy Spirit is less busy than Luke's. Jesus appears again where the disciples are gathered and says, "Peace be with you." He then displays his hands and side and repeats, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me so I send you." Jesus then breathes on them and says, "Receive the Holy Spirit." The ministry of Jesus is complete, the ministry of the Church has begun.
