



CONSUMER ALERT: New Federal Trade Commission Rule Will Let Telephone Customers Avoid Prerecorded Telemarketing Calls

Federal The Commission (FTC) has announced a new rule governing telemarketing calls that feature prerecorded messages. Beginning Sept. 1, 2009, telemarketing companies must obtain call recipients' written permission before contacting them with a prerecorded message. More immediately, effective Dec. 1, 2008, prerecorded telephone marketing calls must have an opt-out mechanism so that recipients can elect not to receive those unsolicited calls in the future.

Telemarketers with preexisting customer relationships will be allowed to continue using prerecorded messages to contact those customers only for one year after the rule is published in market products or services

Trade the Federal Register. At that to the recipient. Healthcaretime, telemarketing companies will need their customer's written permission before calling anyone with a prerecorded message.

Under the new regulations, charitable organizations can continue contacting their members or previous donors, but will need to offer an opt-out mechanism once the new rule goes into effect.


The FTC's new rule will not prohibit customers from receiving certain prerecorded informational calls, such as those which announce flight delay notifications, upcoming appointments, or similarly helpful information. These phone calls are unaffected by the new rule because they are not used to related phone calls also are exempt from the new regulations.

Under the new rule, the prerecorded telemarketing calls must:

· allow the telephone to ring for at least 15 seconds or four rings before an unanswered call is disconnected; begin the prerecorded message within two seconds of a completed greeting by the recipient;

 disclose at the outset of the call that the recipient may ask to be placed on the company's do-not-call list at any time during the message;

 in cases where the call is answered by a person, make an automated interactive voice and/or keypress-activated opt-out mechanism available during the message that adds the recipient's telephone number to the company's do-not-call list and then immediately ends the call;







This week we learn that the Christian's life of faith is not idle as we study Jeremiah 15:15-21, Psalm 26:1-8, Romans 12:9-21, and Matthew 16:21-28. Jeremiah cries to the Lord in a lament. Jeremiah loves God and God's word, but the more he speaks the word of the Lord, the more the people hate him. Jeremiah confesses that he thinks God has deceived him, as a thirsty man finds only dust in a dry Palestinian river bed. God tells Jeremiah that if he will repent of his anger with the Lord, God will allow him to continue as a prophet. God further promises Jeremiah that He will strengthen him and redeem him from the hand of the wicked. God never promises us followers an easy life; he promises us strength to live life.

The Psalmist sings a song asking God to "Try me". The Psalmist loves God, and lives by God's law. The Psalmist is faithful. The Psalmist prays for God's continuing redemption. The "faith-full" life is a life lived boldly for the Lord.

Paul writes a series of "one-liners" that tell us how to live a Christian life for example, "Let love be genuine". "Hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good." "Love one another with mutual affection." "Bless those who persecute you". Paul shows us how we can be a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God. Paul tells us that vengeance is the Lord's. We are told to feed our enemies if they are hungry, provide water for them if they are thirsty.


We are shown that "forgiveness" is not fair, it is Christlike. Christ said to those who crucified Him, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do". In short, do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

Jesus explains that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering and be killed. Peter concerned says, 'God forbid it Lord! This must never happen to you!" Jesus replied, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

In literal translation, Jesus is telling Peter that his place is behind Jesus, following. He then tells the disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." Jesus shows us that discipleship is the obedient giving of self for our neighbor; and, that the only way for us to accept this is through the transforming power of God.

We may reasonably ask, "Why would anyone want to be part of a group that is being persecuted, jailed, and even killed?" The answer for me is that in following Jesus we find true life and not a mere animal existence.

May the Holy Spirit grant you the power to live boldly for Christ.







> In 1897, the Zollars moved to Higgins. Mr. Zollars became bookkeeper and clerk in Mr. W. F. Peugh's general merchandise store. Harry was trained by Mr. Cap Mitchell in publishing a country newspaper, The Higgins News, and was its editor until it was sold.

In October, 1960, Harry wrote a letter to the editor of the Lipscomb County News which was published by the paper as an article entitled Old Timer Recalls and Early Day Writes of Baptism."

Harry wrote that he and his father, with other members of the Baptist church, built the first church in Higgins, working nights, as there were no "weekends" and Saturdays off in those stopping with a drop-off the clear water of the pool! It about thirty feet from the shore to ten or twelve feet. The point at which he was to stop with the candidate was marked with two fishing poles stuck in the sand and held with rocks, The baptizing was to be held on the next day, Sunday afternoon. All had a good swim and a fine trip home.

"But the Devil of Mischief tempted the boys and they got together and planned what they thought would be a great joke. They walked back to the swimming hole, tied another fishing pole to each of the shorter ones and moved them to the edge of the drop-off and secured them there with their little white flags fluttering a signal that this was the place to

stop. "Sunday afternoon was a most lovely one and a large crowd was on hand to witness the solemn ceremonies. There were tents for the men and women to use for dressing. The members of the church were assisting and aiding, the singers were humming the tunes to be sung and the first candidate, a man of about 50, was standing with the minister in the shallow water at the pool's edge. With those present singing that good old hymn 'Shall we gather at the River' the preacher led the candidate toward the poles and flags, little realizing they had been moved further out. As he waded and led the man, he was explaining the significance of immersion and of following in Christ's steps in being baptized, when both he and the candi-

the interstate and major him a fine place, sandy and date disappeared beneath was indeed a shock to all concerned! But when the preacher, who was a good swimmer, reached the shallower portion at the edge of the drop-off the other man had not appeared! Soon he came up, gurgled "Help" and sank again! Then it began to dawn upon the four culprits that their practical joke had kicked back and a man might lose his life because of it.

> A level-headed cowboy, who had ridden in to see the baptizing, realized the seriousness of the situation, ran to his horse, jerked his lariat from his saddle and when the drowning man appeared again expertly threw the rope to him, which was grasped and the fellow pulled to safety. What a sigh of relief those four guilty fellows heaved as he was found to be able to receive the service of baptism a little later, with the preacher keeping quite some distance from the poles the remainder of the ceremony!

"Strict secrecy was sworn by the four over crossed cottonwood branches, and I believe it was never told to anyone up there all the fellows in this escapade but me. I have gone on the long trail, but the memory is so vivid in my mind that all I have to do is close my eyes and see it all again in every detail. What our dads would have done to us if they had known is an unsolved problem, but it would have been plenty!"

A tale that I am sure is not in the church's record.



After being born and raised in Hansford County, I moved to California when I graduated from Gruver High School in 1938. I was living in San Francisco when Pearl Harbor was attacked. I remember the guard at the magnesium plant where I worked rushing in to tell us about the bombing. He had just heard it on the radio (there was no TV at that time).

A few months later I returned to Gruver to check on my draft status. I found out that I was going to be drafted in about two months. Because I didn't want to go into the Army, I returned to San Francisco with plans to

join the Navy. I joined the Coast Guard instead.

First came boot camp at the Government Island base in Alameda, California. After boot camp I was stationed in San Francisco for a short time and then transferred to the Farallon Islands off the San Francisco Bay. After several months there I was assigned to the USS Sea Wolf, and then to the USS Amethyst.

Our duties were sea rescue, weather reporting, and operation of a Radio Direction Finding station for air traffic between the mainland and Hawaii. There were three stations: 500, 1000, and 1500 miles from San Francisco. Each station was a five-mile square that we had to stay in. We were usually on the 1000-mile station for one month and then we would spend two weeks at Treasure Island, our base in San Francisco Bay. After that we would return for another month.

We took part in the rescue of a B-29 crew who had to ditch because of engine failure.

Homeward bound from Saipan after 10 missions over Japan, the Superfortress Mishap II had two engines fail simultaneously. By the time they could locate the closest station ship, the third motor had also gone. The pilot brought the plane down from 19,000 feet to 2500 and gave the order to bail. The plane exploded as it hit the water, and all would have been killed instantly if they had stayed with the plane.


Fifteen of the twenty airmen who parachuted were saved. A few were in the water 6 hours before we could reach them. Three bodies of the missing five were also rescued.

In January 1946, we returned the Amethyst to its home district in Long Beach, California. On February 14, 1946, after 3 years, 5 months, and 6 days of military service. I was discharged at the Terminal Island Separation Center. Once my Coast Guard days were over I came back to

Gruver. While home, I met and married Henny Wiehink from the Netherlands. We had two children, Gene and Mamie. Gene and his wife, Chris and their two children, Sterling and Dana live in Pensacola, Florida. Mamie lives in Arlington, Virginia.

I received a BS and MS degree from Oklahoma State University, finishing in 1953. After working for Continental Oil Company for 13 years in the geophysical exploration department, I then went to work at Louisiana State University's Rice Research Station in Crowley, Louisiana. I retired in November 1991 after being a Cajun for 26 years.

We returned to Gruver in November of 1991. Henny died December 17, 1991. I have kept our home in Gruver. Much of my time is spent at my computer and in great trips with my daughter Mamie.



2. Who can get free or reduced-price meals? Children in households receiving Food Stamps or TANF can get free meals regardless of household income. Also, if your household income is within the limits of the Federal Income Guidelines.

3. Can homeless, runaway and migrant children get free meals? Please call school counselor at 733-5111 or Mr. David Teal at 733-2001 to see if your child(ren) qualify, if you have not been informed that they will get free meals.

4. Who can get reduced price meals? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reducedprice limits on the Federal Income Chart.

5. Should I fill out an application if I got a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free or reduced-price meals? Please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at 733-2032 if you have questions.

6. I get WIC. Can my child(ren) get free meals? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Please fill out an application.

7. Will my information be checked? Yes. We may ask you to send written proof.

8. If I don't qualify now, may I apply again later? Yes. You may apply at any time during the school year if your household size goes up, income goes down, or if you start receiving Food Stamps, TANF, or other benefits. If you lose your job, your children may be able to receive free or reduced-lunch meals.

9. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to a school official. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: David Teal at 405 Garrett, Gruver, TX 79040, or call 733-2001.

10. May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be a U.S. citizen to qualify for free or reducedprice meals. 11. Who should I include as members of my household? You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives or friends). You must include yourself and all children who live with you. 12. What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally get. For example, if you get \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only got \$900, put down that you get \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but not if you get it only sometimes. 13. We are in the military, do we include our housing allowance as income? If your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. All other allowances must be included in your gross income.
