Today, the 'Montreal Homeless Choir has captivated audiences worldwide and turned their lives around. And what do they feel is the greatest benefit of belonging to the group? The opportunity to give. How exactly such an unlikely group became the toast of Montreal, Toronto, Paris and New York, is in large part due to one person: Pierre Anthian, a dental technician who had been serving the disadvantaged since age 12.

Texas Department of Agriculture Honored 119 Pioneer Farms and Ranches

The Texas Department of agriculture honored 119 farms and ranches from 79 counties at the 31st annual Family Land Heritage ceremony, March 13 in Austin. The Family Land Heritage Program recognizes families who have kept their farm or ranch in continuous agricultural production by the same family for 200 years or more.

To date, more than 4,100 farms and ranches in 229 of Texas' 254 counties have been recognized by the Family Land Heritage Program. Three counties, Hudpseth, Ochiltree and Roberts, were added to the list of counties with honored farms and ranches.

"The families honored at the Family Land Heritage Ceremony have made an enormous contribution to the heritage of rural Texas and the history of Texas agriculture," Susan Combs, Texas Department of Agriculture Commissioner, said. "The dedication of these families-especially those who have kept their properties in continuous production for more that 150 years- should be an inspiration to all Texans."

This marks the fifth year that the Texas Department of Agriculture honored farms and ranches in the 150 year category. TDA recognized 15 properties that were established between 1832 and 1855.

Farms and ranches recognized for 150 years include: Guy H. Smith and Sons Ranch in Atascosa County, Claiborne Farm and Watterson-Alexander Ranch in Bastrop County, Levi Jordan Ranch in Brazoria County, Burnam ranch in Burnet county, Mercer-Leon Ranch in Comanche County, Olson-Davis Farm in Delta County, Price Ranch in Fannin County, Darwin Farm in Grayson County, 7K Cattle Company in Grimes County, Wood Ranch in Guadalupe County, New Tracks Ranch in Hays county, Lloyd P. Whittington Ranch in Liberty County, Looking Glass Ranch in Limestone County and Blalock Farm in Wood County.

The 100 year old farms recognized in our area include: Reed Farm and Ranch in Ochiltree County (Mr. A. D. Reed Jr.), Leicht/Stump Farm in Ochlitree County (Tara (Difley) and Jeff Leicht) and Venneman Ranch, 1905 in Hansford County (Mr. and Mrs. Joe T. Venneman and Mrs. Hattie (Venneman) Davis).

These farms are added to these previously recognized farm and ranch operations: D. C. Jones, W. B. Smith, X Cross X Ranch (Joel Lee Lackey), all in Hansford County and Lieb Farms in Hutchison County.

John married Frances "Fannie" Sparks, and they had three children - Joseph Thomas "Joe T.," Hattie Marie and Mary Elizabeth. After their marriage in 1941, John and Fannie purchased a lumberyard warehouse in Oklahoma and moved it to the ranch. Half of the building was used as a barn, the other half was their house. Additions and improvements were made to the home over the years, and they lived there until their deaths. The house

is still used by the family. John was one of the organizers of the Hansford County Soil Conservation District and was a director until 1956. He was given the Outstanding Conservation Farmer-Rancher Award in 1963. He installed 9,224 feet of irrigation pipeline, four farm ponds, a farmstead windbreak and livestock wells and tubs for improved pasture grazing. John and his son Joe were presented with a Range Management Award by the Texas Section Society for Range Management. John was a director for the Federal Land Bank and served on the Farm Bureau Board and also as county commissioner for Precinct 2. He was also involved with the Texas Agricultural Association. John attended many meetings and conventions in cities such as Fort Worth, Chicago and Washington,

In 1934 Clementine inherited 105.5 acres and purchased a total of 2,560 acres in 1944, 1949 and 1990. She raised wheat, corn, milo and Hereford cattle. Clementine married John Stewart, who passed away in 1944. She later married N.F. "Gus" Renner, who died in 1998. Clementine helped build the community in numerous ways. She and Gus were the founders of the Stationmaster's House Museum, and she served on the museum board until her death at age 95. museum in Hansford County. She employees use it as a residence.

also served on the Hansford County Historical Commission, receiving an award for 20 years of volunteer service. Clementine received an Award of Merit in Historic Preservation from the Texas Historical Commission in 1991. She was recognized by the American Cancer Society for 35 years of service, and she was awarded the Amarillo Diocesan Woman of the Year in 1990 for her faithful works in the church. She was recognized as Beta Sigma Phi Woman of the Year in Spearman for her community endeavors. Clementine had a great love of local history and firmly believed in preserving it. Following her death in 2003, Clementine's home in town was preserved and converted into an un-hosted bed and breakfast

called the Clementine. In 1984, 1986 and 1988 Joe T. and Hattie (Venneman) Davis inherited the land. Joe T. and his wife, Linda, purchased an additional 2,240 acres between 1975 and 1991. They raise cattle, wheat, corn, milo and sunflowers. Joe and Linda have three children - Klint Holly (Venneman) Gifford and Kim (Venneman) Cooper. Hattie is a widow and has three children -Mark, Micah and Kaley (Davis) Martens. Klint and his wife, Traci, have three daughters - Morgan, Alexx and Kennedy.

The family has laid underground water lines to existing stock tanks and installed new watering facilities throughout the ranch, built modern pipe corrals, replaced a manual cattle squeeze shoot with a hydraulic shoot and diversified ranching operations with a retail beef business and bed and breakfast. They have renovated the barn on the original homestead and made it into the ranch office and a retail meat operation, as well as maintained one of the few working wood tower windmills in the Texas Panhandle.

Klint and Traci manage and oversee the cattle operations and have a registered Angus cowherd to raise breeding stock. Klint also selects and feeds the cattle for the retail beef business. great-nephew of the founder Bernard "Ben" Vennemann was born in Baltimore, Maryland. He wanted to go west and traveled as far as New Mexico. During his return trip home he stopped in Hansford County and decided to settle there. On July 29, 1905, he purchased 1,280 acres of land from W.G. Raily, who was originally awarded the land by the State of Texas. Ben and his wife, Josephine, had one child, Bernard Herman. The family raised wheat, corn and cattle. Ben acquired the nickname "Crookneck." He loved politics and would walk 15 miles to the Hansford courthouse, stay for several days, then walk back home. Because of his love for reading, he sometimes neglected ranch work.

In 1924 and 1926 Ben's brother Joe acquired 1,120 acres of the land, and in 1929 he purchased 800 acres and raised wheat, cattle, horses and buffalo. Joe married Hattie Schwarzman, and they had two children, Clementine Catherine and John Clement. Joe dropped the last "n" from the spelling of Vennemann. Ben, the founder, kept

the original spelling and to this day all of the family back East continue to spell it Vennemann. Improving the land was a slow

process. Corn and feed were the main crops. The planting was done behind a horse, which pulled a bucket with holes in the bottom to allow grain to fall through. The land was enclosed by a two-barbed wire fence and had to be patrolled fence and clean out the crop. The



My friend Jim McLain sent me the following entitled "The Best Tips Ever." I haven't tried all of them, but some of them looked pretty good to me.

The Best Tips Ever

1. Stuff a miniature marshmallow in the bottom of a sugar cone to prevent ice cream drips.

2. Use a meat baster to "squeeze" your pancake batter onto the hot griddle and you'll get perfectly shaped pancakes every time.

3. To keep potatoes from budding, place an apple in the bag with the potatoes.

Words from Faith & Grace by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

During the Season of Pentecost, we study and prayerfully appreciate the God who has entered human history. This week we study Job 38:1-11, Psalm 107 1-3, 23-32, 2 Corinthians 6:1-13, and Mark 4:35-41.

Job questions God's justice, "Why do bad things happen to innocent people?" God answers Job by asking Job questions; thus, forcing Job to contemplate the nature of God, The Almighty. Job does not receive a modern "definitive" answer, he is reminded that God cares for and loves His creation, His people; but, Job cannot understand how/why some things are. It is not an act of faithlessness to question God, to doubt God, or to be angry at God. Our relationship with God which begins in baptism is nurtured by prayer and study, by living [abiding] in Christ Jesus. The Psalmist sings praises to God who provides for His creation, for His people in their many needs; this poem gives us a picture of God calming the waters to save desperate sailors.

Paul urges the Corinthians not to accept the grace of God in vain. Once you have experienced the Spirit of God, do not walk away from it or seek

Paul emphasizes that NOW! is the time of salvation. He justifies his ministry through the afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots and sleepless nights that he has endured for the gospel's sake. Yet, Paul has endured these things by the power of God, rejoicing and counting himself as rich, possessing everything. This is the spirit of 'hupomone" which is the ability to bear all things, all challenges in a way that transfigures them. The Holy Spirit allows us to possess this spirit of 'hupomone", empowering us to "abide" in Jesus Christ.

Mark gives us four stories of healing in his gospel. In this one, Jesus is sleeping in the back of a boat on the Sea of Galilee when a storm puts the small craft in danger. The disciples are distressed. When they remember Jesus, they wake him up. Jesus "rebukes" the wind and commands the sea to "be still" and it is so. Jesus then asks the disciples "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" This story shows us that Christ has power over nature, just as God has power over nature in the Psalms passage. Yet, the message of this passage lies in the reaction of the disciples—when they remember Christ is with them, when Christ calms the sea, they are relieved. Dear Christian, when bad things happen to you, to the ones you love, remember Christ is with you.

Christ gives us peace in the storms of sorrow, fear and anxiety. May the Holy Spirit grant you that peace which passes all understand-

Lake Level--June 19, 2006--19.80 feet (-0.28)

The hookups had only one camper this past weekend. Fishing was slow, but there were lots of lights around the Lake on Saturday night. There is no report about the

Thursday evening and night brought rain clouds and a promise of rain. The promise turned to ashes with cloud to ground lightning that kindled fires on many of the grassland sections. High praise was given to the fire departments and all the volunteers. They were assisted by an occasional shower that would sometimes douse one of the fires. One of the problems was that many of the fires rekindled from yucca roots, cedar trees, or any object that smoldered.

I heard more about the fires

north of Morse, but Jim said he was involved with fires on Brillhart and Ralston ranches out from the Park area.

Pronghorn Antelope

Last week Jim reported a band of antelope just east of the Park, and my daughter Jean Harris told of seeing three near their house on the Palo Duro north of Morse. Kitty Edwards had recently shown me the picture her husband Frank took of an antelope south of Spearman. They are evidently spreading over the county. Previously, we just knew of the antelope at Oslo.

Prior to the settling of the Plains from Canada to Mexico, the land supported millions of both antelope and buffalo. They made a good team as the bison mainly ate the grass and the antelope came behind eating the forbs (weeds) and shrubs. As buffalo are not truly buffalo but bison, the pronghorn is not truly an antelope. It has no close relatives.

Coronado, as the first European to tell of seeing the animal, called them goats. Lewis and Clark were the first citizens of the United States to report seeing them. They noted them as similar to deer when they saw them in 1804 in what became South Dakota.

Both the buffalo and the antelope came close to becoming extinct when they were slaughtered for meat and hides. Antelope were being killed for their meat to ship east in such quantities that the market became glutted and in 1860 you could buy 3 or 4 carcasses in Denver for a quarter.






