One of the Oklahoma Panhandle's favorite authors, Oklahoma born and raised Rilla Askew, is returning to No Man's Land.

On April 14th Rilla is giving a Writer's Workshop that Saturday morning and then a lecture and book signing that evening. She is lecturing on the book that is printed this April, *Harpsong*, at the Guymon Community Theater.

Last year when writing the book, Rilla came and gave a workshop in Guymon and did some research at No Man's Land Museum in Goodwell. She is also the author of a collection of stories, *Strange Business*, which won the Oklahoma Book Award in 1993, and three novels.

Her first novel, *The Mercy Seat*, was a PEN/Faulkner nominee and

earned her a second Oklahoma Book Award and the Western Heritage Award in 1998. Her second novel, *Fire in Beulah*, has been selected as the Oklahoma Reads Oklahoma Book for 2007, and also won the American Book Award and the Myers Book Award from the Gustavus Myers Center for the Study of Bigotry

and Human Rights. *Harpsong*, is set in 1930's Oklahoma.

World Day of Prayer March 2, 2007

The World Day of Prayer service will be held on Friday, March 2nd at the First United Methodist Church in Spearman. Coffee and fellowship will begin at 9:30 a.m., with the program starting at 10.

The World Day of Prayer is an ecumenical movement of informed prayer and prayerful action.

The World Day of Prayer worship service has a special annual theme. This year's theme is United Under God's Tent, and was prepared by women of Paraguay.

The selection of themes and writers is made at the quadrennial WDP International Committee Meeting. Once the themes and writers are chosen, women of the selected WDP Committee develop a common worship on the theme determined at the international meeting.

Through preparation and participation in the worship service, we can come to know how our sisters of other countries, languages and cultures understand the biblical passages in their context. We can hear their concerns and needs and can feel ourselves in solidarity with them. In this way it is possible to experience the richness of the Christian faith as it grows deeper and broader in an international, ecumenical expression.

World Day of Prayer is a worldwide movement of Christian women of many traditions who come together to observe a common day of prayer each year, and who, in many countries, have a continuing relationship in prayer and service.

- It is a movement initiated and carried out by women in more than 170 countries and regions.

- It is a movement symbolized by an annual day of celebration – the first Friday of March – to which all people are welcome.

- It is a movement which brings together women of various races, cultures and traditions in closer fellowship, understanding and action throughout the year.

- affirm their faith in Jesus Christ

- share their hopes and fears, their joys and sorrows, their opportunities and needs.

Through World Day of Prayer, women are encouraged

- to become aware of the whole world and no longer live in isolation

- to be enriched by the faith experience of Christians of other countries and cultures

- to take up the burdens of other people and pray with and for them
- to become aware of their talents and use them in the service of society.

Through World Day of Prayer, women affirm that prayer and action are inseparable and that both have immeasurable influence in the world.

Round II of the Regional Safe Room Program

With the start of the severe weather season in sight, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) today announced the start of the second round application period for the Regional Residential Safe Room Rebate Program. The Safe Room Rebate Program provides approved homeowners with a rebate to partially cover the cost of installing a safe room/tornado shelter in their home. The program is open to residents throughout the Texas Panhandle.

This program is being funded through a Federal Emergency Management Agency grant the PRPC received through the Governor's Division of Emergency Management (GDEM). To be eligible to participate, residents must own the home in which the safe room will be installed. Mobile home owners must own their home and the land on which their mobile home sits.

Homeowners can receive a rebate of up to 50% on the cost of installing a shelter in their home. The maximum amount of grant funds paid for a shelter has been capped by the State at \$2,500.

The Safe Room Program is relatively new to the State of Texas. In fact, the program was implemented first in the Texas Panhandle. The PRPC concluded its first round application cycle in November with the funding of 235 shelters. Stefan Bressler, PRPC Regional Program Coordinator, said that all things considered, the program is going very smoothly. "We've basically served as the test case for the program in Texas," said Bressler. "GDEM has been very accommodating in letting us set up a program to fit our needs in the Panhandle and that has allowed us to run the program with the minimum of red tape."

PRPC will accept Round II applications through April 27, 2007. Residents interested in applying for a rebate will find the application form and guidance on the PRPC's website at www.thepRPC.org. Residents can also obtain rebate information by contacting Stefan Bressler at (806) 372-3381. After the application deadline has passed, the PRPC will select the successful applicants using a modified lottery system. Currently, a certain number of safe rooms are set aside for each county in the region - Hansford County was been allotted 18. Five rooms and five mobile homes were awarded in Round I, with 13 still available in Round II.

Applications from the same county will be drawn at random until the allocation for that county has been filled. Any rebate allocations not used in one or more counties will be thrown into a regional pool and used to help meet the excess demand in counties where the requests received is greater than the number of rooms allocated for that county. There will be approximately 550 safe room rebates available under Round II of this regional program.

February 23, 2007	Announced Start Date of the Panhandle Regional Residential Safe Room/Storm Shelter Rebate program. This is the date on which the PRPC will officially begin accepting applications for rebates. Applicants can submit rebate requests for NSSA-certified units installed after May 23, 2006 or for units that have yet to be installed.
April 27, 2007	Deadline for submission of Residential Safe Room Rebate applications. Applications must be received by 5:00 p.m. on this date in order to be eligible for lottery participation.
May 2, 2007	PRPC will complete the lottery selections for the approximate 550 rooms currently available.

Words from Faith & Grace

As we continue to emulate Christ in the wilderness by examining our own lives and purposes, we study Genesis 15:1-18, Psalm 27, Philippians 3:14-4:1, and Luke 13:31-35. Abraham, called by God to leave his home country and move to a far off land, is in the process of obeying God when he is struck with doubt. The Lord has promised him a son, an heir. In a vision, Abraham's question of faith is answered. To seal this covenant, Abraham takes a heifer, a female goat, a ram, a turtledove and a young pigeon and sacrifices them by cutting the larger animals in half, placing each to one side or the other. He then sees a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch pass between the animal parts. He believes God, and God counts this as "righteousness". Please note that in this passage "righteousness" indicates "fidelity to a relationship". The ritual described is actually one of sealing a contract (covenant) in Abraham's age. The ritual was the "consideration" for the agreement; today we give a small amount of money, in Abraham's time, animals were ritually killed and the parties passed between the slain bodies of the animals to "seal" the deal.

These "blessings" of Abraham can also be viewed as a test. Will Abraham follow God without these blessings? Abraham was following God and God reassured Abraham by His contract/covenant.

The Psalmist, probably the young warrior David, sings a song of faith in the protection of God; yet, he also sings to be allowed to live in the house of the Lord all the days of his life; to behold the beauty of the Lord; and, to inquire of the Lord in His temple.

Paul is requesting the Philippians to "be of the same mind." Mature Christians should not be looking back on their accomplishments but continuing to run forward to achieve the goal of their call by God. Paul asks that they emulate him and those who live according to his example. The believers' citizenship is in Heaven and the Lord will transform their bodies for that heavenly glory. God performs His covenant, we must perform ours.

Jesus is warned by some of the Pharisees that Herod seeks to kill him. Jesus replies, "Go and tell that fox..." In Hebrew shu-AL, fox, means crafty, but also is used of "lesser men", worthless degenerate rulers. By His reply, Jesus has questioned Herod's moral status, his pedigree, and his leadership, all in one reply. Jesus shows his determination to go to Jerusalem; He shows himself as having authority over demons and illnesses, and shows himself as a prophet of God. Jesus compares himself to a mother hen who would gather her chicks during danger. Spreading her wings against the attacker and exposing her breast to shield her brood. The chosen "children" in Jerusalem refuse this "chick" status thus denying God and choosing to go it alone. Later we see Christ spreading His arms, baring his chest on calvary's hill for our sins because of God's covenant.

May the Holy Spirit purify your hearts that you may gather under His arms.

HOUSE 'BUSTS' SPENDING CAP WITH SENIOR CITIZEN PROPERTY TAX BREAK

AUSTIN - The Texas House of Representatives concurred with the state Senate in passing Senate Concurrent Resolution 20, a measure guaranteeing a property tax break for senior citizens by "busting" the state spending cap.

Warren Chisum, R-Pampa, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said it wouldn't be a problem to devote \$14 billion to tax relief for seniors now, before the House gets any deeper into the budgeting process.

SCR 20 passed on a vote of 95-50, drawing opposition from House members who felt it would be better to wait until:

(1) State Comptroller Susan Combs delivers a revenue estimate, and (2) the House Appropriations Committee prioritizes and funds all of the demands in the state budget.

Reps. Jim Dunning, D-Waco, and Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, said passing SCR 20 was putting the cart before the horse. Both lawmakers said the House, like a family, has to know how much money is in the bank before deciding how to spend it.

Coal plant plan slows down
Austin State District Judge Stephen Yelenosky in effect said "not so fast" to Gov. Rick Perry's executive order to speed up by six months the permit process for the building of 11 coal-fired power plants on sites across Texas.

Yelenosky instructed judges with the State Office of Administrative Hearings to ignore Perry's executive order. That office conducts the public hearings, and the input from those hearings is supposed to go into the decision-making process. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has the final say.

Groups of citizens have been protesting the construction of new coal-fired power plants, arguing that the plants pose health hazards by dumping toxins and particulate matter into the air.

Activists staged anti-coal demonstrations downtown and a small plane putted along in the sky above the Capitol dome, dragging a banner picturing a child's coal-smudged face with the words "Coal Is Dirty."

Lawmakers fight HPV order
Gov. Perry's early February executive order requiring girls entering the sixth grade to get vaccinated against Human papillomavirus raised a ruckus in the Texas Legislature.

Lawmakers are moving toward passing legislation to override Perry's executive order.

Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Lewisville, and others, criticized the chief executive for trying to legislate and for trying to seize parents' authority to make decisions concerning the health of their children.

The governor's connection to pharmaceutical giant Merck, the manufacturer of Gardasil, the vaccine for HPV, has prompted questions on his motive for issuing the executive order.

Defibrillator legislation is filed
Texas schools that don't already have Automated External Defibrillators would be required to get them under legislation sponsored by Rep. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen.

Hinojosa's Senate Bill 7 is part of Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst's sweeping "Texas Children First" package of legislation.

The devices, which cost about \$2,000, are capable of restarting a stopped heart. The need for them at school athletic functions has been widely publicized.

Co-authors of SB 7 include Sens. Jane Nelson, R-Lewisville; Leticia Van de Putte, D-San Antonio; Bob Deuell, R-Greenville; and Florence Shapiro, R-Plano.

About half of the state's 8,000 public school campuses do not have the lifesaving devices, the Texas Education Agency reported.

Bill addresses future water needs
Sen. Kip Averitt, R-Waco, on Feb. 22, filed legislation to develop, manage and preserve the state's water supply decades into the future.

Senate Bill 3 addresses flow requirements and water rights permitting and includes measures to manage existing and future water supplies.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, lauded Averitt for filing SB 3, saying, "By the year 2060 our population will have more than doubled, yet the amount of available water will remain the same."

"That means unless we take the necessary steps today, we will lack the water we need to support our fast growing population tomorrow."



MAUDIE MARIE BURROWS

CHEYENNE WELLS, CO - Maudie Marie Burrows was the first born to George Henry and Vallie (Homer) Burrows on June 1, 1914. She was born in her grandparent's home just outside Hugoton, Kansas. Maudie later welcomed home 6 siblings. Maudie was raised on the Burrows farm.

Maudie graduated from High School in Hugoton. After high school, she took her teacher's exam and became certified to teach. She taught in a one-room school-house for one year during the "dirty thirties".

Maudie married William Homer Cott on September 30, 1934 in Liberal, Kansas. Of this marriage, 5 children were born: Raymond, Robert, Irene, Leta and Louise. Raymond, Robert, and Irene were born in Southwest Kansas. Leta and Louise were not born until after the move to Eastern Colorado. While residing in Kansas, Homer and Maudie lived on the Cott homestead at Moscow for 2 years, then moved south of Hugoton where they lived the next 9 years. Homer and Maudie then purchased a farm 8 miles Southwest of Cheyenne Wells in 1948. Having arrived during a March snowstorm, they lived there two weeks before they could really get out to look over their purchase. On the farm they had a sod house, an adobe chicken house, a shop, and a wooden barn that was about two years old. The house had an exterior of unpainted stucco and had no telephone, electricity, or running water. The milk room was later turned into a bathroom and a garage was added to the house. Homer and Maudie milked cows, raised cattle and grew mostly feed crops, as well as some wheat and sudan grass. As a home maker, Maudie loved to cook, sew and oil paint. She is remembered for her homemade bread and chocolate cake. Maudie was a member of the Cheyenne Wells Christian Church. Her love of Christ was the driving force in her life. Homer and Maudie moved to town in early October 1991. Louise and her husband Don now live on the farm. It was one year later, in October 1992, that Homer passed away in the Cheyenne Wells hospital. Maudie continued to live in town until she moved to Cheyenne Manor, where she remained until her death. Her oldest son, Raymond, preceded her in death in May of 2006.

Maudie Marie Cott died February 18, at the Cheyenne Manor in Cheyenne Wells, CO. She is survived by her children, Robert and wife Betty, of Logandale, NV, Irene Baker and her husband Butch, of Spearman, TX, Leta Smalley and husband Carl of Cheyenne Wells, CO, Louise Konecne and husband Don of Cheyenne Wells, CO, 13 grandchildren and 27 great grandchildren. Two years removed from Jason's previous record, 2004's Somewhere In The Middle, this new chapter in his story is decidedly the best representation of how much he and his band have matured musically.

"This is the record we have always wanted to make," says Boland. "It is the right record at the right time and we really just let it flow."

Boland and the Stragglers' newest contribution to country music arrives at a time when memories of the 'Outlaw' movement have all but faded from the conscience of country music. With songs like, "No One Left To Blame," and "Up And Gone" this talented group of musicians has delivered a timely wake up call to those who have turned a blind eye to the ghosts of music past. The Bourbon Legend stems from a mixture of musical influences culminating in a truly modern (yet sternly vintage) country record. Each song on the record shares a com-

mon bond with its classical counterpart and proves to be a re-generation of the outlaw country of old.

The first single, "No One Left To Blame," carries with it heavy overtones of a music reminiscent of Waylon Jennings and Hank Williams Jr. while providing an edgy musical dose of a new generation's varied influences. The majority of the songs on the record were influenced by acts such as the Marshall Tucker Band, Johnny Paycheck, Merle Haggard, among others. The Bourbon Legend, produced by Grammy Award winner Pete Anderson (Dwight Yoakam, Buck Owens, Lucinda Williams) is his first collaboration with the Stragglers.

Boland hales from Harrah, Oklahoma and carries with him the reputation of being a modern day country music outlaw. Both he and his band have been leaders in

the Texas and Oklahoma music scene for several years generating such hits as, "Mexico Or Crazy," "Somewhere Down In Texas," and "Pearl Snaps." Boland, backed by his band of stellar musicians: Roger Ray (pedal steel, lead/rhythm guitar), Brad Rice (drums/backing vocals), Grant Tracy (bass), and Noah Jeffries (banjo, mandolin, and guitar), have sold over 100,000 records since 1999.

The Bourbon Legend is Boland's first record with Sustain Records, an independent Texas-based record company distributed by Universal Music & Video Distribution.



PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ holds a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision. A person who may be affected by the proposed facility is entitled to request a contested case hearing from the commission. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

ED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name; address, phone; applicant's name and permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; and the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the facility or actively; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission will only grant a contested case hearing on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised in timely filed comments that were not subsequently withdrawn.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION. The Executive Director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the Executive Director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and request to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

Memoir.

"I raised several wild colts caught from a herd of mustangs and fed them milk from a bottle and as they knew no other mother they always had a great love for me, and I loved them, never had trouble in handling them, always exercised great patience and could always talk and pet them out of the notion of bucking. My mustang Dick ran away with me one day when riding with a party of friends. Tie rope came unfastened and fell just long enough to hit his heels. He was very much afraid of rope.
