Sustained Blackout Prevented Due to Voluntary Load Curtailment my North Plains EC Members

Plains Electric Cooperative (NPEC) irrigators in the load management program and a number of large power consumers that were asked to voluntarily shed load during an XCEL transmission outage and emergency power situation.

During the morning of June 24th just after 10:15am, XCEL Energy experienced a transmission switch failure at their Pringle Interchange that caused the greater part of the Northeast Panhandle to lose transmission service. All NPEC members served through transmission lines from the XCEL Spearman Interchange experienced a power outage for approximately 1/2 hour until an alternate transmission path reenergized that station and lines feeding NPEC substations.

Due to the restricted load capacity of this alternate path, XCEL required that NPEC load not exceed 27,000 kilowatts or kW. (One kilowatt of power is approximately equal to 1.34 horsepower) Prior to the outage,

Special thanks goes to North NPEC load was at 49,000 kW or 49 megawatts. Almost half of the NPEC load had to be curtailed until XCEL could make repairs and resolve the emergency situation. NPEC employees scrambled to contact all irrigators that participate in the irrigation load management program and request that they voluntarily shut down electric irrigation wells. Also contacted were members with large loads that could quickly be shut down. These members were gas compression facilities, animal confinement facilities and one large power irrigation mem-

> Due to these voluntary member curtailments and doing so without hesitation, NPEC was able to keep power on for all residential and small commercial members during regional outage. XCEL was able to make necessary repairs very quickly and power was restored to normal at

about 12:40pm that afternoon. We also want to thank XCEL for their quick response to this emergency sit-

"We never want situations like this to happen, but under the circumstances all that were involved responded well and handled the emergency very methodically and made this a tolerable inconvenience and experience," said NPEC General Manager Randy Mahannah.

Mr. Mahannah and the NPEC Staff conveys thanks to those members that participated in the voluntary curtailment.

NPEC is a cooperative distributing electricity in Hansford, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Roberts and Wheeler counties. Formed in 1944, it serves 5900 meters and maintains 3565 miles of electrical line. It is owned and controlled by the members it serves.

The wheat harvest was nearly completed in some counties, but it was delayed in a few counties because of evening showers. Producers reported average irrigated yields and widely ranging yields for dry land. Corn and cotton were rapidly growing thanks to daytime highs in the mid to upper 90s. Rangeland and cattle were in good condition in most of region.

Keeping these records in Words from Faith & Grace

Amidst our celebration of our nation's birthday, we learn something of living the disciple life as we study Isaiah 66: 10-16, Psalm 66: 1-9, Galatians 6: 1-18, and Luke 10: 1-20.

Isaiah tells the post-exilic people to rejoice! He uses a maternal metaphor to describe the relationship of God with his restored people. Isaiah is speaking to a people who are going through internal strife as they try to match the promises of God to their 'reality'. We are reminded of God's sovereignty and of God's presence with us.

The Psalmist sings a community hymn whose them is Bless our God." Notice that in this community hymn, all of creation makes a joyful noise to God. The Psalmist reminds the people of God's awesome deeds. He sings, "God's enemies cringe before him." Who are these 'enemies' of God? Some may think these enemies are the surrounding Gentile nations, but viewed in the context of the conclusion of this section, "Bless our God, peoples, let the sound of his praise be heard, who has kept us among the living, and has not let our feet slip", perhaps the 'enemies' of God are those who refuse to believe and poignantly those believers who refuse to leave their fa-

Paul instructs the Galatians that any believer who is detected to be in sin, should be restored by those who are in the Spirit. This restoration should be done in a gentle manner. He then warns them to "take care that you yourselves are not tempted". Paul may be warning against the nemesis of many Christians, pride. If we counsel others in Christ, we should not become puffed up in our opinion of ourselves by comparing our 'spirituality' against the one we are trying to restore. In living the disciple life, we must bear each other's burdens. We must work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith.

Jesus selects seventy disciples to go forth and prepare the towns he planned to go. They are instructed in how to live their disciple life and are commissioned to cure the sick and to declare the Kingdom of God is near. Consider that seventy is the number of Elders that were chosen by Moses to assist him; seventy is the number of the Sanhedrin, the ruling body of Judaism; seventy is the number of the known nations of the world in the first century. Jesus is greater than Moses; Jesus is our King; Jesus speaks to all nations. In leading the disciple life, those sent are not to be burdened down with material things. They are to concentrate on their task and not become distracted by other things. We should not do good things for the hope of the reward we may expect to receive. Jesus finishes his statement with a declaration "I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightening." He may have meant that He was aware that the death-blow to Satan had already been struck or more likely He is warning about the sin of pride, which caused Satan's fall. Rather than being proud of their spiritual power, the disciples should be proud that their names are written in heaven.

May the Holy Spirit circumscribe your pride that you may rejoice in God as you live the disciple life.





Enjoy Peace and Nature at Lake Palo Duro

If you are needing somewhere just to get away from a busy lifestyle, just looking for somewhere to do a little bird watching, or needing somewhere to stretch out those legs on a mountain bike, Lake Palo Duro, just 10 miles north of Spearman off FM 760, just might be the spot for you to check out.

The 2400 acre lake has been providing the people in the northern panhandle a place to get out and enjoy the outdoors for almost 20

years.

For those who enjoy camping out under the stars, Lake Palo Duro offers three different campsites for those wanting to pitch a tent, as well as having 37 RV hook- ups around the lake for those that still enjoy a couple of the comforts of home.

The price for an RV hookup is \$12 a day plus the \$2 recreation entry fee, while tent camping spots are priced at \$4 per day plus entry fee.

According to Jim Derington, General Manager of the Palo Duro River Authority, Lake Palo Duro rose about 40 feet in three days due to recent rain, making the current lake level 64.9 feet (as of 6/15/2010). Water is across FM 760 at the lake (and is now closed) and the boat ramps are functioning.

Blue and channel caftish, bass, walleye, and crappie also can be easily caught at the lake throughout the year.

If you plan to bring out the kids or grandkids with you, the lake has a children's fishing pond for young anglers to cast a line out into.

The lake also provides several roads and trails for hiking to catch a glimpse at turkeys, blue heron, buzzards, pelicans and even bald eagles.

Mountain biking is an activity that has grown in popularity out at Lake Palo Duro in recent years, with the best riding trails being



J.B. Buchanan Windmill Collection

One man's passion has become one town's pride with the relocation of the windmill collection of J.B. Buchanan to the City of Spearman.

J.B. Buchanan (whose fascination with windmills at age three led him to climb the Currie windmill near his Oklahoma ranch home) began his first restoration project when he was only 14. Having found a dilapidated windmill half-buried in a creek bank, Buchanan retrieved the windmill, restored the blades, and erected it atop a pole at the entrance of his family ranch.

The cattle at the range were the first to enjoy Buchanan's handiwork. "At first, the cows would just wander up and stare at it and look around for the water trough that was supposed to be below it," Buchanan related.

Years later, Buchanan's fascination for the whirling wonders was rekindled when he surveyed the uncluttered plain of the Texas Panhandle and realized how he missed seeing the majestic windmills that had been a part of his youth, now replaced by modern immersible electric pumps. Even so, Buchanan's love may never have resulted in an actual collection and restoration had fate not stepped in.

In 1968, while browsing in a store in New Mexico, he discovered something he couldn't resist - an Eclipse Windmill still in

its original shipping crate. "The Eclipse was to windmills what a Stetson is to hats," Buchanan remarked.

After purchasing the windmill and erecting it in his back yard, the first of a collection that would become the largest in Texas, was begun.

Searching for old windmills soon added other models such as the Star mill, the Dempster Umbrella mill (a unique variation that folds its 18' blades in on themselves to protect them when the wind is too strong), and Curries, similar to the ones known in his youth.

Two of Buchanan's treasures have been given to the Smithsonian Museum in Washington, D.C., but the remainder stood in the yard of his farm house through the years.

Restoration of his finds molded Buchanan into a competent carpenter and blacksmith. In his barn that doubled as a workshop, he hammered bent metal blades flat on an anvil, shaped wheels from water-soaked oak, and cut precise grooves for the countless, wooden blades for the Dempster models.

In 1997, after climbing on one of his spinning beauties to make repairs at the age of 92, Buchanan promised his dismayed wife, Ila Mae, that he had scaled his last windmill tower. So, in early 1998, Buchanan offered his priceless collection to the City of Spearman.

The Spearman Chamber of Commerce, Buchanan's grandson, Roger, and son, Burl (former Mayor of Spearman), formed the Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association and dedicated a five-acre plot on the southern edge of the town to be used in the dis-

play of the collection. Businesses of Spearman have adopted windmills and assumed the maintenance of them. "We've gotten other windmills from around the state, and now have about 30, with **********************

my grandfather's in one spot and several others scattered throughout the stated town," Roger Buchanan.

Spearman's aspiration of becoming known as the "Windmill City" became a step closer to reality with the move of the first of the Buchanan collection on January 21, 1999. A ceremonial ground-breaking of the proposed site was also held on that day. The first windmill arrived on a horse-drawn wagon, before being erected.

News of Spearman's planned outdoor "museum" of windmills was received with great anticipation in the Panhandle region. The Big Texan Steak Ranch of Amarillo, which greets thousands tourists each year, has endorsed the collection to its guests through a special exhibition in the restauthe Buchanan windmills, a Samson Windmill, is on display in the scenic area with a large placard inviting tourists to visit the en-







This is a 12' Challenge Model 27 mill with red tips on a 25' metal tower. This mill is from Willie Urbancyx of White Deer, Texas. K&K Inc., of White Deer provided the crane needed to erect it. Car club and Enron employees helped in all the work. The wheel and tail were taken to Denver and regalvanized. Tower donated by Robert Novak. Walter Woolley restored the gear-

Location: SWPA Park; Adopter: Show Time Car Club

12' Monitor

This is a 12' Monitor Model L Vaneless wood mill. It is white with red tips. Has a cement football for a balance weight. Made by Baker Co., of Evansville, Wisconsin. Built about 1916. J.B. Buchanan had this mill up on a steel tower from Hooker, Oklahoma. Iron Wichita, from Kansas. J. D. Wilbanks did the machine work. Don Reed and Orville Latham rebuilt the wheel.

Location: SWPA Park; No Adopter

6' Samson

This is a 6' Samson open double back geared steel mill on a wood tower. This mill was made by the Stover Co. of Freeport, Illinois in 1900. Ila Mae's father put it up on the Pierce farm for her grandmother in 1916. Later it was moved to the J.B. Buchanan farm and rebuilt. It was taken down and rebuilt by the SPWA, and put back up on J.B.'s farm on July 25th, 2001. J.B. said the Samson was his pick of the windmills when he was a boy. After J.B.'s death, the family consented for the mill to be moved to the SPWA park where the J.B. Buchanan windmill collection is located.

Location: SPWA Park; painted it.

10' Samson

This is a 10' Samson steel mill. It is an open gear mill on a wood tower. This is a very sturdy mill. rugged J.B. Buchanan had it in his barn but never got it put up. Now in the SWPA

10' Aermotor

This is a 10' Model 702 Aermotor steel mill. It is on a 33' metal Aermotor metal tower. This metal mill was donated by F.W. Thomas. The metal Aermotor tower was donated by Dean and Joe Paul. It came from 5 miles Northeast of Farnsworth, Texas.

Location: Blodgett Park at 11th Avenue and Cotter Drive; No Adopter

8' Woodmanse

This is a 10' Samson steel mill. It is an open gear mill on a wood tower. Woodmanse mills were popular at one time in the area around Beaver, Oklahoma. Walter Woolley found it abandoned on a tower three miles South of Beaver. He obtained the mill from Mr. McGrew then began rebuilding the gear box and tail.

Location: North Plains Insurance Company at 715 W. 7th Avenue; Adopter: North Plains Insurance Company

8' Chandler

This is an 8' Chandler open gear steel mill.

It is on a metal tower and has red tips. Butler made this mill but sold by Chandler Company. The mill and tower came form Duckett Farm in the Oklahoma Panhandle. It was donated to the SWPA; Dwayne and Maurice Mitchell, Burl and Roger Buchanan jacked up the entire mill to get it on a trailer for the SWPA. Terry Schneider restored and

Location: Lowe's Market, 505 Plains Shopping Center; Adopter: Lowe's Market

8' Fairbury

This is an 8' Fairbury Model 7AA mill on a steel tower. It has red tips. Clowe & Cowan were distributors. Dwayne Mitchell and Walter Woolley bought this mill at an Oklahoma. Walter Woolley assembled the mill, painted, and put the mill on the tower. Parts were also used from Dennis Nelson's donated Fairbury mill.

Location: R&R RV Park on 7th Street West of the Dairy Queen.; Adopter: R&R RV Park

10' Dempster

This is a 10' Dempster Model 14 wood mill on a steel tower. It is white with red tips. This is an umbrella or vaneless mill with a short tail horse and box for weight. It is at the intersection of Roland and 11th Avenue.

Location: Pittman Sheildknight Building, 511 SW 11th Avenue; Adopter: Jimmy Sheildknight

8' New Elgin

This is a 8' New Elgin metal mill with blue tips on a steel tower. This mill was donated by Raymond Halliburton of Slapout, Oklahoma. Walter Woolley and Julian Villarreal restored and assembled it. It is beside Hi-Plains Auto with the old John Deere tractor.

10' Duplex

This is a 10' Duplex vaneless mill. It is a yellow mill with green tips on a white wood tower. This is a very colorful yellow and green mill. Terry Schneider restored and painted it. It was destroyed by a windstorm right after being put up. Now it has been restored and put up

Location: Spread Sales, 414 Hwy 207 South; Adopter: Golden Spread Sales Company

10' Perkins

This is a 10' Perkins wood mill. It is white with red tips on a white tower. A mill like this was in the yard of the hotel at Old Hansford. Very ornate with auction at Boise City, a 10' blue and white wooden tail and a large tail sheet that is striking. Dwayne Mitchell, J.B., and Burl Buchanan got this mill from Marvin Stinson of Leedy, Oklahoma.

Location: Hansford Courthouse; County Adopter: Hansford County

8' Easy

This is an 8' Easy mill with a red gearbox on a three legged steel tower. This mill was made by the Cushman Company of David City, Nebraska. They later moved to Lincoln, Nebraska and made scooters. Very few of the original Easy mills are in existence. It was obtained

from Marvin Stinson. Location: Nursanickle Motel, Highway 207 South; Adopter: Nursanickle Motel

6' Star Zephyr

This is a Short Tail metal 6' Star Zephyr mill. This mill was donated by Darrell Richards of Hardesty, Oklahoma. Bryan Jones located it and many other parts and pieces of mills. Walter Woolley put a new tail and blades on it and rebuilt the gear box. Also a new shaft and bearings.

8' Star

This is an 8' Model # 24 metal Star Mill with red tips and a green gear box. It has 1924 painted on the tail. This mill was obtained from Windmill Traders of Denver, Colorado. Don Reed and Burl Buchanan picked up this one on one of their many trips to Denver to buy or trade mills, towers, and parts.

Location: Five-Star Equipment, Hwy. 15 West; Adopter: Five Star Equip-

10.5' Original Star

This is a 10.5' wood Original Star Mill. It is a direct stroke white mill with red tips. This mill was made by Flint & Walling Company of Kendelville, Indiana in 1878. It has a big and little tail. J.B. Buchanan bought it from a homestead near Sedan, New Mexico. They had bought it in 1915. J.B. put it up on a redwood tower from Frank Allen. Orville Latham and Don Reed cut and rebuilt a new wheel and tails.

Location: SWPA Park; No Adopter

12' Eclipse

This is a 12' wood Eclipse on a wood tower. It is olive green with red tips. Fairbanks Morse of Beloit, Wisconsin made these mills. It is one of the first solid wheel mills made. It has a half-moon weight to hold it in the wind. Smith-Hansford sonian paid Johna Laub-

Golden County Vet Hospital, han to make a replica of the Eclipse that J.B. donated to the Smithsonian for J.B. to put on his farm. This mill has a new wheel and tails made by the SPWA workers. This mill was raised on June 6, 2002 at the SPWA Park during the International Windmill Tradefair 2002 held in Spearman. J.D. Wilbanks used his steam engine to raise the mill.

Location: SPWA Park; No Adopter

8' Butler

This is an 8' Butler steel mill with red tips with a green gear box. It is a double open gear mill on a white tower. This mill is from Dorothy Woolley's farm where parents' Dorothy grew up. The tail was sticking up out of the fence row. The original blades were saved. During its life it had to be hand

Location: SPWA Park; No Adopter

6' Monitor

This is a 6' Monitor steel mill on a steel tower. Don and Lynanne Maize went to Denver, Colorado in October of 2001 to get this mill. After obtaining some necessary parts and pieces, it was raised at Don Maize's and Ronnie Willis' shop at the corner of Hancock and Carson Streets.



This is a 6' metal Aermotor mill on a 35' Aermotor steel tower This mill is displayed at the Stationmaster's House Museum in front of the other museum buildings. The mill was donated to the museum by Sy McCloy of Morse, Texas and the tower was donated by Phil Sanders of Spearman, Texas. The tower came from the Power's Place on the Palo Duro Creek north of Spearman, J.D. Wilbanks restored the mill and tower.

6' Aermotor

This is a 6' Aermotor steel mill on an unpainted wood tower. It is displayed with a wood tank also on unpainted tower. Claude Sheets Jr., started out with an ornamental mill. After it was damaged he went to San Angelo, Texas and purchased a new Aermotor which he now has displayed with a wood water tank.

Location: Claude Sheets residence, 610 E. Kenneth Avenue; Privately owned by the Sheets Family

6' Baker

This is a 6' Baker mill on a trailer well house. The well house is from the Omar Cotter farm. This is a working mill and will Texas A&M logo was pump water. Clarence added in honor of James' Mitchell and Fred Mayfield put this mill on a trailer so that it could be taken to parades and other events. It is from Clarendon, Texas. It had been down for about 20 years when they got it. This mill was only made from 1920 to 1933

8' Aermotor

This is an 8' steel Aermotor on a 30' steel tower. This mill was bought one mile East of Stinnett, Texas. Clarence Mitchell rebuilt it. The tower is from the Turkey Track Ranch.

14' American West

This is a 14' steel American West mill on a 35" American West steel tower. H&H Water Well Service raised this mill and with Global (American West Co.) donated an American West Display to be auctioned off during the Trade Fair with proceeds going to the Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Associ-

Location: H&H Water Well Service, Hwy 15 West; Privately owned by

8' Aermotor

This is an 8' Aermotor on a 40' steel Aermotor tower. This mill is one the Burch Contract Pumping property. This was originally owned by Merle Beck who put it up to pump water. The water well has long been aban-

Location: Hwy 15 West and County Road #24; Privately owned by Burch Contract Pumping Com-

8' Aermotor

This is an 8' steel Aermotor on an unpainted wood tower. Perry Sheets owns this mill. It was brought in from the home place on the Palo Duro Creek. Originally bought from the old Womble Hardware of Spearman. Several parts had to be replaced before it could be

Location: County Road #24 South of Hansford Vet Clinic; Privately owned by Perry Sheets

8' Aermotor

This is an 8' Aermotor mill on a 32' Aermotor tower. This mill was moved from the Bob Driscoll homestead land 6 and 1/2 miles SE of Hardesty, Oklahoma. It was purchased and raised in 1919. It was restored by Louis Schnell for his son James. It is now on the James Schnell farm. The Texas A&M alma mater.

Location: 1 and 1/2 miles North of Spearman on FM Road 759; Privately owned by the James Schnell Family

8' Aermotor

This is an 8' steel Aermotor on a 20' steel Aermotor tower. This mill came from H.L. Wilbanks' pasture North of Old Hansford. Donated to J.D. Wilbanks by Ray Phelps. J.D. rebuilt the mill and put it up on April 7, 1990. J.D. developed the concept of the 2" pipe base hinged to pipe legs set in concrete. This was used on the museum mill, and later adopted by the SWPA for use on their steel towers. It has recently been modified to use on wood towers also. This mill has a recirculating pump that pumps water into a 4' tank when the mill is running.

Location: 3 and 1/2 miles East of Spearman on Farm Road #759; Privately owned by J.D. and Rubyjo Wilbanks

8' Challenge

This is an 8' Challenge mill on a steel tower. This windmill came from the Clayton Born Family a few miles Southeast of Follett, Texas. It was restored and installed by Walter Woolley.

Location: J&M Service

Center, 415 Collard Street; Privately owned by J&M Service Center of Spearman, Texas

10' Western

This is a 10' Western steel mill on a wood tower. This is a geared gearless mill in that it uses cams to pump water. Two revolutions of the wheel is required for one pump stroke. This mill came from Colorado, and is one of a kind for this size mill. It has been completely rebuilt and painted by J.D. Wilbanks. It has been put up on an unpainted tower in the SPWA Park.

Location: SPWA Park; No Adopter

10' Leader

This is a 10' Leader wood mill. It is white with red tips on a wood tower. Made by Flint & Walling, Kendallville, Indiana. J.B. Buchanan had this mill but never put it up. The metal work (done by J.D. Wilbanks) included pouring new babbitt bearings and making the shaft. The tower came from Frank and Debbie Thomas of Channing, Texas:

Location: SWPA Park; No Adopter

6' Clipper

This is a 6' Clipper single back geared steel mill on a wood tower. This mill was obtained in Colorado. Nothing is known about its history except it was well used. It required extensive restoration. All new bearings were poured and a complete steel stub tower was fabricated. 4 x 4" wood tower legs were used instead of the conventional 5 x 5" tower legs, New wheel blades on a restored wheel came with the tower. The vane also had the lettering done.

Location: SPWA Park; No adopter

12' Aermotor This is a 12' Model 502 Aermotor mill on a 32' Aermotor steel tower. This is a working water pumping windmill. There is a water well located under this mill connected to the mill. This mill is a very rare Aermoter windmill. It was manufactured only one year in 1915. The mill was discontinued due to lubrication problems. Later a kit was made available to overcome this problem. During the restoration of this mill, this kit was installed. Little is known of the history except it came from Nebraska and was restored in Denver, Colorado. The tower came from Rocky Ford, Colorado, and was also obtained along with the mill from an individual in Denver. The wheel needed some repairs and this was done by Orville Latham, Don Reed, and J.D. Wilbanks here in Spearman. Orville Latham restored the platforms on the tower, J.D. Wilbanks made the base for the

tower, and Don Reed

stored by J.D. Wilbanks which consisted of some machine work and painting. The tail was lettered by Wanda Reed. The trailer was donated to the SPWA by O.E. and Sandra Drake of Waka, Texas. It was originally used to haul a motorcycle on. The SPWA modified it to put this mill and sign on. The sign and painting of the trailer was donated by Terry Schneider of Spear-man, Texas. The mill and trailer is available to be exhibited or shown at any kind of show

or parade. When not being used it is stored in Dwayne Mitchell's barn.

Well Drilling Machine

This is a homemade cable tool well drilling machine (spudder). Henry Buschman built this well drilling machine in 1924. He obtained a patent on the concept of this rig. It was last used in 1939. The family has kept it on the family farm North of Waka, Texas. It is on loan to the SPWA from the Bushman family. J.D. Wilbanks arranged for the loan of the rig, moved, restored, and painted it.

Location: SPWA Park; Privately owned by the **Buschman Family**

18' Jacob Wind Plant This is an 18' Jacobs 110 volt wind plant on a three legged steel tower. This Jacobs Wind Plant was originally purchased by Wallace A. Stanberry directly from Marcellus Jacobs in 1975. Mr. Stanberry generously donated the wind plant to the Windmill Park Collection. The City of Spearman, in conjunction with Texas Parks and Wildlife, provided funds for the wind plant's refurbishment and

Location: Blodgett Park; Privately owned by Transpetco

installation.

8' John Deere

This is an 8' John Deere open single back geared steel windmill on a wooden tower. Very little is known about this windmill other than it came from Colorado. Evidently it had been used very little as it showed very little wear on the gears and other parts. The Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association workers had quite a bit of a problem putting it together as they had no information on the mill. Some parts had to be fabricated during the assembly of the mill to make it complete.

Location: Hansford Implement Company, Highway 207 S; Adopter: Hansford Implement Company

8' Wonder Elgin This is an 8' Model B

Elgin Wonder windmill on a steel Elgin tower. This windmill was donated to the SPWA by Guy and Roma Harvey of Laverne, Oklahoma. The mill came from their home southeast of Slapout, Oklahoma. The tower was donated by the Delon Kirk estate to the association. Burl Buchanan, Dwayne Mitchell, Walter Woolley, and Roger Buchanan took the mill down from the tower to bring to Spearman. Walter Woolley rebuilt the mill and Terry Schneider did the lettering on the tail. The association did the modification on the

Location: SPWA Park; No adopter

10' Star

This is a 10' Star Model 12 open double back geared steel windmill on a modified Elgin steel tower. This windmill was originally installed about 1914 on a farm near Boise City, Oklahoma. It was taken down about 1947 and put up on the J.B. Buchanan farm in his collection in June of 1986. It has gone through extensive restoration, including straightening blades and tail, rebabbiting bearings, machining new shafting, painting and lettering the tail. This work has been City of Spearman for the done by the following: Terry Schneider, J.D. Wilbanks, Don Reed, and Dwayne Mitchell. This is the only windmill in the SPWA collection that was raised then lowered for a slight modification and then raised for a second time on the same day.

Location: SPWA park; No Adopter

20 foot Aermotor

This is a 20 foot Aermotor on an Aermotor tower located at back of the JB Buchanan Windmill Park. This mill was obtained by Walter Woolley on a ranch in New Mexico. Walter and Don Reed brought the mill to Spearman where Walter did machine work on the gear box. The tower was obtained in New Mexico and the completion of the entire mill and erection was done by SPWA volunteers.






