Hartgraves' association with hospitals came in his undergraduate years at Tarleton State University where he served in the admissions, finance, and human resources departments of Harris Methodist Erath County Hospital in Stephenville, Texas.

After graduating with a Bachelors degree in Marketing, he was recruited to serve as a program development assistant in the Strategic Planning Department at the Harris Methodist Health System corporate offices in Fort Worth.

the Harris Methodist Hospital System but also was instrumental in the direction his career would take.

When asked to return to Stephenville to serve as Business Development and Marketing Coordinator of the Harris Methodist Hospital, Hartgraves began work on his Master of Business Administration Degree.

With the completion of this MBA, Hartgraves was promoted to the Director of Marketing and Off-Campus Services where he had operations accountability of several of the hospital's ancillary services.

It was in this position that Hartgraves decided to pursue his Masters in Hospital Administration. Since many of the hospital executives with whom he worked were graduates of the prestigious University of Minnesota program which is ranked in the top five in preparation of hospital administrators. by the US News and World Report, Hartgraves applied and was accepted by the school.

In choosing Hansford County Hospital District as the place to begin his role as administrator, Hartgraves hopes to grow professionally by taking advantage of the opportunity the position offers to make the difference in the lives of others.

Although only his second day as administrator, Hartgraves has definite personal goals for the future of Hansford County Hospital, he will work with the District's Board to establish a clear and strategic direction for the hospital's future.

"Our overall goal, of course, is to serve our mission and improve the health of the people of the community," Hartgraves said.

In addition, being the home to a pleased and content medical staff is important to Hartgraves, as well as maintaining communication with employees of the district.

"I want to make everyone aware of the big picture goals of the hospital and their contribution to achieving those goals," Hartgraves said.

He also hopes to keep the hospital board well-informed and to establish rapport with the tax payers and people of the community. Recognizing the importance of the auxiliary hospital personnel.

"They are our conduit to the community," Hartgraves said.

Burl and Nellie have gone about their lives quietly accomplishing many things. Starting out as a mechanic's helper with Cactus Petroleum, Burl stayed on until being called into the Army service during the Berlin Wall crisis. In June of '62 Burl was released from Army service and resumed his job with Cactus, only this time the job was in Midland, Texas. Burl has now retired from some of these arduous jobs but is tirelessly involved with the Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association and in getting mills ready for the Windmill Trade Fair to be held in Spearman this weekend. Burl is still very much involved in the insurance agency, farming and ranching.

Burl and Nellie are members of the First United Methodist Church and both have taught Sunday School and have led Senior Hi Youth. Burl has also served as chairman of the Church Board.

She concluded her speech by courageously singing "The Rose."


She challenged each of us to study the lyrics and live them out in our daily lives.


At the years end Rose finished the college degree she had begun all those years ago.
