Environmental Quality Incentive Program Signup

The Natural Resources Conservation Service has set the signup deadline for the 2008 Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP). The application deadline for the 2008 program year is November 16, 2007. Applications from individual landowners interested in participating in the EQIP during the 2008 program year received before November 16th will be ranked for program eligibility. Applications received after that deadline, as part of the EQIP continuous program sign up provisions, will be held until the 2009 program year ranking period.
Private landowners should be aware that EQIP provides technical, educational, and financial assistance to eligible farmers and ranchers to address soil, water and related natural resource concerns on their lands in an environmentally beneficial and cost effective manner. EQIP is a voluntary program and is designed to assist farmers and ranchers with placing natural resource conservation practices on their property. Cost share is provided to program participants to achieve the goals of a conservation plan designed with the assistance of local NRCS staff. Cost share practices include placement of appropriate structural or vegetative practices, such as animal waste management facilities, irrigation management equipment, vegetative buffers and wildlife habitat enhancement, to name a few. Eligible practices will depend on the location of the farm or ranch on which the practice is to be installed and the major resource concern to be addressed in that particular area. Information on eligible cost share practices and major resource concerns of an area can be secured from your local NRCS field office.

Anne says that those who have read the book all say, "It's an easy read," and she has received nothing but rave reviews. Comments she has received include, "read it cover to cover," "couldn't put it down," "related to many of the experiences you shared," "inspirational", "made me laugh and made me cry," to name some of the most common remarks. Anne says however, "the best comments I've received out of all of them are that everyone has said I managed to tell my story honestly, but without making anyone else look bad in the process and without it coming across like a 'poor me' tale. That was very important to me."

Too bad the cell phone companies don't generally give you this little bit of wonderful information.



*Speaking to a service representative at **Bell** Mobility confirmed that *77 was a direct link to state trooper info. So, now it's your turn to let your friends know about

JUDGE GRANTS ANTI-TOLL ROAD GROUP NEW HEARING

AUSTIN — The "Keep Texas Moving" advertising campaign funded by the Texas Department of Transportation continues to be challenged by Texans Uniting for Reform and Freedom (TURF).

Travis County State District Judge Orlanda Naranjo on Oct. 18 granted TURF's request for continuance and a new hearing in 90 days.

For months, the group has sought to stop TxDOT from spending state funds to promote the TransTexas Corridor, a multibillion dollar, multidecade privately funded tollroad plan.

"TxDOT is waging a one-sided political ad campaign designed to sway public opinion in favor of the policy that puts money in TxDOT's own coffers," said TURF founder and executive direc-

tor Terri Hall.

A Texas law prohibits state agencies from using public funding for political advocacy, Hall said.

But Kristina Silcocks, a transportation attorney with the Office of the Attorney General who is representing TxDOT, said the "Keep Texas Moving" campaign is permitted under another state law that allows marketing of toll projects.

Extra check may come for some

The Teacher Retirement System board of trustees will meet Nov. 9 to decide whether to give eligible annuitants an extra check in January.

The independent actuary for the TRS said a supplemental 13th check can be paid to those who are eligible without hiking the active member contribution rate.

The check amount would be equal to a normal monthly pension payment, up to a maximum of \$2,400.

The supplement was made possible by SB 1846 sponsored by Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, and Rep. Vicki Truitt, R-Keller, in the 80th Texas Legislature.

Handwashing is key to prevention

By now, Texans have gotten wind of this health issue in a variety of media, but it will not hurt to mention it here.

Handwashing is important. A particularly stubborn form of "staph" bacteria is out and about, spread through person-to-person contact or via contact with contaminated surfaces.

"Regular hand washing is the best way to prevent staph transmission," said Marilyn Felkner, a Texas Department of State Health Services epidemiologist.

"Getting back to the basics, using soap and water, or hand sanitizer, is essential in facilities where people work, live and play close together."

the post on Oct. 16. Scott had been acting as commissioner since predecessor Dr. Shirley Neeley resigned effective July 1. He served four years as chief deputy commissioner, managing daily operations for the Texas Education Agency.

Think hard before you vote

Here is one more plug for the Nov. 6 election: the subjects of all 16 proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot:

- Prop. 1: Transferring constitutional facilities funding for Angelo State University to the Texas Tech University System.
- Prop. 2: Authorizing general obligation bonds to finance student loans.
- Prop. 3: Annual 10 percent cap on increases in homestead taxable value.
- Prop. 4: General obligation bonds for state agency construction and repair projects.
- Prop. 5: Allowing a temporary property tax freeze for smaller city redevelopment.
- Prop. 6: Property tax exemption for a personal vehicle used for business activities.
- Prop. 7: Selling property acquired through eminent domain to former owner at original price.
- Prop. 8: Revisions to home equity loan provisions.
- Prop. 9: Exempting residence homesteads of totally disabled veterans from property taxation.
- Prop. 10: Deleting constitutional references to county office of inspector of hides and animals.
- Prop. 11: Requiring legislators to cast record votes on final passage.
- Prop. 12: Authorizing \$5 billion in general obligation bonds for highway improvements.
- Prop. 13: Allowing judges to deny bail in certain cases involving family violence.
- Prop. 14: Permitting judges reaching mandatory retirement age to finish their terms.
- Prop. 15: Authorizing general obligation bonds to fund cancer research.
- Prop. 16: Bonds for water and sewer services to economically distressed areas.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

The American Cancer Society supports the cancer research proposal on the ballot now in Texas, Proposition 15. We encourage voters to vote for Prop 15.

As the foremost private not-for-profit funder of cancer research, we know the importance of an additional \$300 million a year dedicated to cancer prevention and research in Texas. Nobel Prizes were awarded this month and American Cancer Society researchers won two for scientific breakthroughs, which brings to 42 the number of Nobel Prize winning scientists that have been funded by the Society. We've funded research leading to the first chemotherapy, mammography technology, bone marrow transplantation, the PSA prostate cancer test, a host of lifesaving drugs, and discoveries related to genetics and molecular biology.

Despite these advances and those of the federal government's National Cancer Institute, it's not enough. About one-third of the 95,000 Texans who will be diagnosed with cancer this year will not survive. One in two men and one in three women in Texas will develop cancer during their lifetime. No dollar value can be placed on the lives lost and the families disrupted by cancer. New research could provide new discoveries that lead to thousands of lives saved from the ravages of cancer.


A vote for Prop 15 could do more for the battle against cancer than any vote ever cast in Texas.



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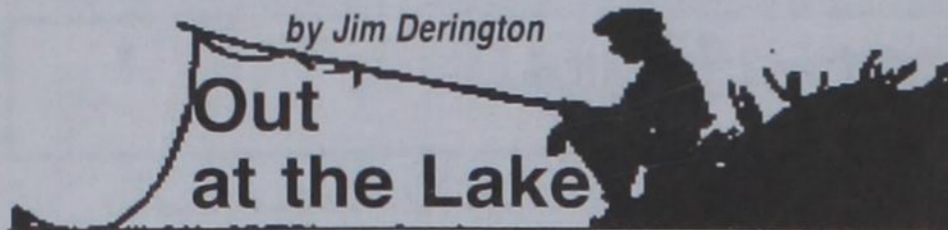
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Lake Level -- October 15, 2007 -- 21.90 feet (-0.22)

N-N Ranch

Several times in reading early Panhandle history I have come across references to the N-N Ranch. I never seemed to have the time to get it placed with the other ranches I did know about.

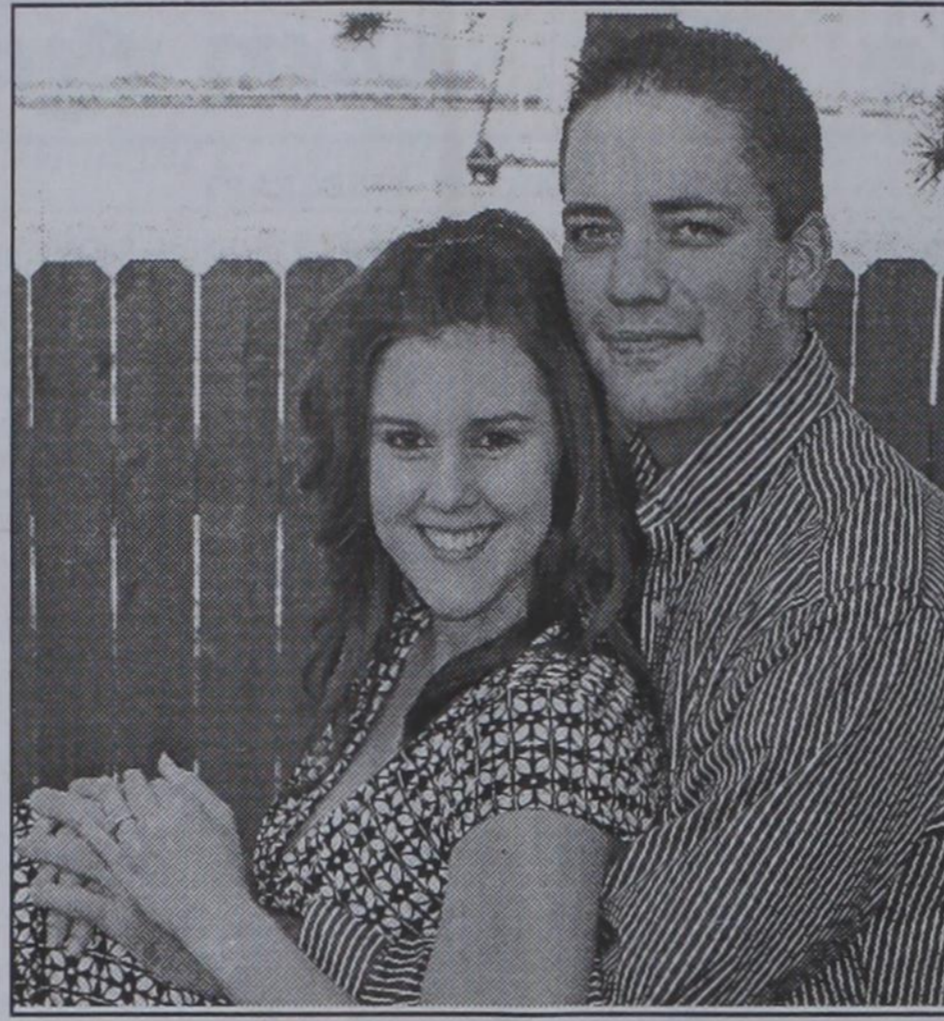
Today while I looked in the 4 Carson County history books for the details of a story about Will Harris and a hail storm, I found an article about this ranch.

Headlined Niedringhaus Brothers, I learned the family came from Westphalia, Germany in the 1850's and established a tin factory in St. Louis. They amassed a fortune when they learned a process to make granite enamel ware.

When the Francklyn Land and Cattle Company couldn't meet its notes in 1886, it reorganized into the White Deer Lands and Cattle Company. At some point the White Deer Company leased 630,000 acres to the Niedringhaus Brothers, who already owned a big ranch in Montana. In 1892, they began closing down the Panhandle ranch, and under Tom Coffee moved 10 herds of 2000 head over 5 months to Montana.

The German brothers are noted for their association with noted cowboy artist Charles Russell. Russell was born in St. Louis and began work as a cowboy for the Niedringhaus family in Montana. They had collected many of his paintings.

No, I didn't find the story of Will Harris and the hail storm.

Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

This week we celebrate the Reformation by studying Jeremiah 31:27-34, Psalm 46, Romans 3:14-28, and John 8: 31-36. We have looked at the Jeremiah passage previously, but recall that God is telling the exiles from the northern and southern kingdoms that he will restore the house of Israel and the house of Judah. God is making a new covenant with the people in which everyone will know God and his word will be on their hearts. Those of us who preach, teach or evangelize will no longer be needed in those capacities.

The Psalmist sings a song of Trust in God. He sings that the believer neither fears natural disasters nor historical disasters, because the Lord of Hosts is with us. To learn more, compare the thoughts expressed herein with those expressed in Psalm 23.

Luther was convinced by this passage in Romans that the church was on the wrong track and needed to be "Reformed" based upon sound doctrine. Our church structure today is supported by five beams. The first, "the Bible alone", which means that the scripture alone is the guide to our faith and practice; the second, "Christ alone" which means that Jesus is the Word of God and while we may have difficulty in understanding that the Holy Spirit is the spirit of Christ that is with us today, and while we cannot grasp our infinite God with our finite minds, we can come to an understanding relationship with Jesus Christ; the third, "Grace alone" which means that God's salvation is a gift, we have not deserved or earned it; the fourth, "Faith alone" which is the means of Grace. Over 300 times in the New Testament we are asked to "believe in Jesus Christ", we are asked to be "born again" only four times. Belief in Jesus Christ is an inner trust of the heart, this is to be born again. We cannot scientifically prove the existence of God, the reliability of the Bible, or life after death. This comes from Faith alone. The fifth, "To Love as Christ Loves". The Gift of Jesus Christ, his love for us, must be shared if we abide in him, this is the believer's mission.

Jesus is addressing Jewish disciples who had believed in him, but were not entirely committed to him. Jesus tells them that if they continue in his word, they will know the truth and the truth will make them free. They reply, "we're already free". The truth is that if you are in sin, you are a slave to sin. Luther once said, "Be a sinner and sin boldly, but believe and rejoice in Christ more boldly". I believe what Luther was saying is "Do something! Act! God can forgive your shortcomings!" In our time, the fear of failure keeps many from even trying. I am a sinner, yet by God's grace He has forgiven that sin and any that ensue and allows me to serve. Dear Christian even self-centeredness is a sin. By clinging to our "freedom" and our wants and desires, we become a slave to ourselves. Thanks be to God, dear Christian, you are free...Now! Today!

May the Holy Spirit light the fire of reformation in your heart that you may leave the slavery of yourself and abide in the freedom of Christ Jesus.

Consumer Alert: FCIC warns about overpaying for certified deeds

Your friends at the Federal Citizen Information Center (FCIC) want to warn you about solicitation letters that are being sent out nationwide by a private company regarding buying certified copies of deeds. The letters refer to information found in FCIC's "Managing Household Records" 2003 online consumer focus article. The company cites that article as a reason for purchasing a certified deed. FCIC wants to make sure that consumers know it is not necessary to use a private company to obtain a certified copy of the deed to your home. You can obtain one from your local Register of Deeds for free or at a low cost.

A copy of your deed is just one of the important documents that you should keep in an organized records system. Whether they're kept in a shoe box or scanned into your computer, there should be one place where you and your loved ones can quickly locate all your important documents during an emergency. In addition to your deed, you should also include your birth and mar-

riage certificates, wills, advance directives, titles of cars, and passports. It's a good idea to store the original papers in a safe deposit box, and keep copies in a secure place at your home. 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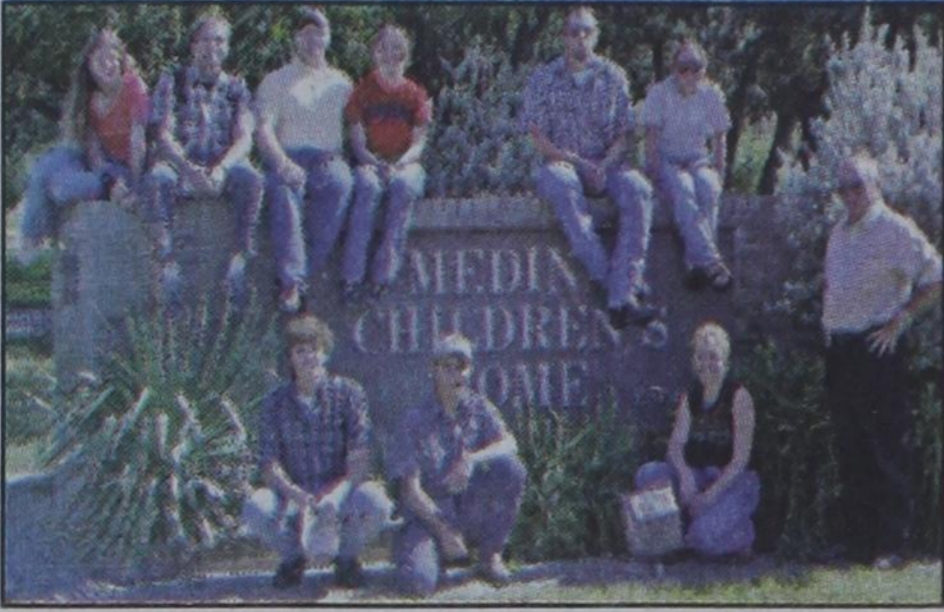

John Michael Talbot To Appear in Concert

With a 30-year musical career and a loyal following numbering in the millions, John Michael Talbot has produced original albums of virtually every musical style, from classical and orchestral to contemporary, to Gregorian chant to jazz and blues.

He is most widely known by Christian music lovers for his quieter, meditational guitar and vocal styling. Talbot has recently released his 50th recording, "Living Water" in which he has "unplugged" to return to his trademark solo acoustic concert. "I think I'm ready to 'plug back in' to the deeper meaning in the words and music that I am best known for," says Talbot. "Through quieter and more meditational music, God can touch the deeper areas of our hearts and minds."

John Michael Talbot will appear in solo concert on November 2, 2007 at the Globe News Center for the Performing Arts. The concert begins his Living Water 50th Recording Tour in which his unique acoustic guitar and meditative lyrics will be presented. Proceeds from the concert will benefit Faith City Ministries.

None of Talbot's musical successes, however, come close to what many consider his greatest accomplishment. Inspired by the life of St. Francis of Assisi, he sold everything he owned and joined a secular Franciscan order in 1978. He built a hermitage in the woods and fashioned a monk's habit from used army blankets.

"At first, I planned to live a life of quiet meditation as a hermit," he recalls, "but as I studied the history of the church, I saw that communi-

ty had always been a part of it." As a result, he founded a house of prayer called "The Little Portion" to share with others his love of Jesus.

When the Franciscan community where he had found a home outgrew its quarters and needed more space, Talbot eventually realized he had the answer. He would establish his own community on Arkansas acreage he bought during his Mason Profit days.

John Michael Talbot will be in concert in Amarillo, Texas on November 2, 2007 at 7:00pm at the Globe News Center for the Performing Arts.
