Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: Crops in some areas were damaged by hail. Producers were busy planting, fertilizing, applying herbicides and irrigating. The corn crop, which had gotten off to a great start with early plantings, was at the fourto-five leaf stage. Dairies were still harvesting winter forage crops and preparing to plant summer forages such as sorghum-Sudan. The winter wheat crop was in fair condition, with drought and some disease issues affecting potential yields. The wheat harvest could begin in some fields within a week. The status of cotton varied with some very early plantings just now emerging. Some cotton acreage remained to be planted; some will be replanted because of heavy rains or hail. Peanut growers neared finishing planting. Only a few dryland fields were left to plant. Rangeland and pastures greened up and continued to improve. Cattle were in excellent condition.

Hansford County's Texas Plains Trail Stamp Cancellation

Post office officials will reveal Hansford County's own stamp cancellation at 11 a.m. Wednesday, June 16, 2010 at the Spearman Post Office.

The Texas Plains Trail Region and the United States Postal Service are partnering for a special year-long stamp cancellation project. Each of the 52 counties in the Texas Plains Trail Region will be featured on a stamp cancellation this year.

Each Wednesday a new county stamp cancellation in alphabetical order - will be revealed at the county seat post office. A complete list of the Texas Plains Trail counties and their respective stamp cancellation date can be found on the Texas Plains Trail Web site, www.texasplainstrail.com.

The project is the effort of Texas photographer Rick Vanderpool to connect the communities of the Panhandle. Vanderpool asked students in the Texas Plains Trail Region to draw a simple picture representing the Panhandle for use on an envelope cachet - a graphic that usually appears in the bottom left corner of the enve-

The Plainview Daily Herald coordinated a contest for the artwork and judged the cachet entries, selecting a piece by 17-year-old Jaime Vaquera, a senior at Plainview High School, to appear on envelopes sold at each post office in the Texas Plains Trail Region.

Vanderpool also invites each community to spotlight

its youth's artwork by creating its own cachet.

"I want to see people in the region come up with as many opportunities to connect and form partnerships as they can," Vanderpool said. "I want youngsters to learn and grow from that experience. They know it's a big country out here, and sometimes they wonder who's over that next hill."

Texas Plains Trail officials will also be available to speak about the region's history and heritage with local fourth-and seventh-grade students or other local organ-

Pak Mail, Plainview's premier packing, crating, freighting, shipping and mailing center, is sponsoring a schedule of events for the stamp cancellation project each week in the Plainview Daily Herald.

The Texas Plains Trail Region is made up of 52 counties in the Texas Panhandle, stretching from the Oklahoma and New Mexico state lines and south to Big Spring. The Texas Historical Commission has also des-

ignated nine other heritage trail regions in Texas.

Holland will relinquish her post as band director on May 27th and officially retire after 42 years of service in the public school systems of four states. Holland directed bands in Elkhart, Kansas; Albuquerque, New Mexico; and Guymon and Hardesty, Oklahoma. She directed bands in Texas at Booker, College Station, Leander, Orange Hargrave, Spearman, and Pringle-Morse.

Holland was raised eight miles west and 2 miles north of Hooker, Oklahoma. She grew up on the farm that her Holland grandparents homesteaded in 1903. Her Ralstin grandparents also homesteaded near Hooker in 1907. Holland had six brothers and sisters. Holland graduated from Hooker High School in 1957.

The Pringle-Morse bands were the smallest bands that she directed in her career. "I discovered a terrific faculty and staff who support music 100 percent. The kids are friendly and polite and say yes ma'am and no ma'am. The parents also back the school and music program. We progressed from "Mary had a Little Lamb" to jazz and the classics. The most fun I had was at Pringle-Morse and Booker, and I accomplished the most at College Station and Leander," said Hol-

Holland's advice to new teachers, "If you don't like large numbers of students you should be somewhere else. I was accused of teaching all the fun classes. That was true, because I had made good choices. Always stay in a job where you are having fun.

tary tidbits: 1. In 1856, a shipload of camels arrived at the Texas port of Indianola. Secretary of War Jefferson Davis had urged Congress to bring the animals from North Africa to help the army in its Indian operations. On June 4th, Wayne set off with his caravan for the frontier posts. The expedition stopped at Victoria where the animals were clipped and Mrs. Mary A. Shirkey made camel-hair socks for the president of the United States. At Camp Verde experiments were conducted to test the camels' utility in chasing Indians and transporting supplies. The experiments failed with the handlers finding the animals smelly,

obnoxious, and hard to control. Escaped camels roamed the desert for years and got into the folklore of the region.

passengers The state law requiring everyone in a vehicle to be secured by an approved safety belt took effect on Sept. 1, 2009, and until June 6, the Texas Highway Patrol and law enforcement officers across the state will be on the lookout for violators during the ninth "Click It or Ticket" enforcement mobilization.

"This year's Click It or Ticket campaign reminds drivers and passengers that no matter how old you are or where in the vehicle you are sitting, you must buckle up," said Texas Highway Patrol Assistant Director David Baker.

"Backseat passengers no longer have an excuse for not wearing a safety belt, and we will be issuing tickets to those who are not complying with the law."

Baker said that during the Memorial Day holiday last year, DPS troopers arrested 622 drunken drivers. wrote nearly 8,511 speeding tickets and issued 1,937 seat belt and 521 child restraint citations.

The U.S. Department of Justice on May 25 cleared the way for the Texas commissioner of education to consolidate the Kendleton Independent School District with neighboring Lamar Consolidated ISD, effective July 1.

Commissioner of Education Robert Scott in March announced his intention to close Kendleton, a small, one-campus district in Fort Bend County, because of chronic academic problems.



"D.A.R.E."

I have learned in D.A.R.E. about drugs and alcohol and the negative effects they each can have on your life. Many people die each year from tobacco and drug related causes. Over 400,000 people die each year from tobacco related illnesses. Smoking can cause cancer, upper respiratory problems, shortness of breath, yellow teeth, smelly breath and dizziness. Cigarette tobacco contains nicotine, which is a very addictive drug. Smoking is the #1 cause of lung cancer. Tobacco contains over 200 known poisons. More than 3,000 non smokers die each year from second hand smoke. Chewing tobacco can cause dehydration and also oral cancer and tooth loss. Tobacco used affects your body's development and appearance negatively. It is illegal to sell tobacco products to anyone under the age of 18 years old. Drinking

Do not let peer pressure influence your decision making about tobacco and alcohol. Stay busy with sports or other activities. Tobacco and alcohol are not cool.

My pledge is that if I ever even think about smoking or drinking, I will think of the D.A.R.E. program and how it taught me to resist drugs and alcohol.

horse herd of 500 animals

according to one source. We can see that in the 125 years from the Revolt, horses had done well in this country. Since wild horses lived here in Hansford County when the buffalo hunters came in 1873, I began looking for information on them, and the men that hunted them. 
