He is also editor of "Windmillers' Newsletter." He is one of the foremost authorities on windmills in the United

Dr. Baker stated that you must have a clear mission of what you want to achieve with the

windmills, have a place to undertake your efforts, have a long range plan, have volunteers and resources, and look at a realistic time frame. He said it would be a good idea to check other windmill collections to see how the towns they are in accomplished their goals of moving them to their towns. He also stated it would be a good idea to discuss upkeep and other problems with these towns.

A big factor facing the project is the fact that other places would like to have these windmills. Dumas and Texas Tech, in Lubbock, are both trying to acquire them. Hopefully, our citizens will band together to keep them here. Mr. Buchanan has many visitors who come to see the windmills, even people from other countries. This would be a definite tourist attraction and an economic plus for our county.



the United States and Japan were meeting in Tokyo as representatives of two nations interested in becoming good neighbors, the world was shocked at the betrayal of trust that came on December 7th of that year. What happened last week in Ochiltree County was a shocking revelation of what we can expect in the future in Hansford County. Don Clift of Texas Farms (Nippon Industries) has been constantly proclaiming that they were not asking for tax abatement and their intentions of being good neighbors of which everyone could be proud. The lie is that they selected the site south of Spearman because of the prevailing wind direction. The truth is they bought it because it was available and they are still searching for as many sites as they can find. They are particularly interested in absentee landowners and estates in order to avoid the negative resistance of neighbors having respect for one another. Another example of their good neighbor policy is their reply to our

told them they were not welcome here. The reply was that they were coming even though they were not welcome.

You ask what happened last week that elicits this response? Texas Farms (Nippon Industries) filed for a tax exemption as a pollution control facility. They are claiming that most of the facility is for pollution control that is not a part of or necessary for the production of pork. I called Mr. Ronald Hatlett of the Texas Natural Resource Commission, who will make the determination of what will be included, and found that he has no idea of the situation. When I mentioned the odor generated from the lagoons he informed me that they told him there was no odor because there was eighteen inches of fresh water on the surface and the effluent was piped in below that level and did not mix with the fresh. Sounds like Don has already talked to him. I asked him if there was any appeal to their decision and he said the only appeal allowed Continued on Page 5

# Let us replenish the seed of faith through... DAILY BIBLE READING, PRAYER & REGULAR CHURCH ATTENDANCE

QUESTION: The children in our neighborhood are bratty with one another and disrespectful with adults. This upsets me, but I don't know what to do about it. I don't feel I have a right to discipline the children of my neighbors. How can I deal with this?

DR. DOBSON: Parents in a neighborhood must learn to talk to each other about their kids, but that takes some doing! There is no quicker way to anger a mother than for another woman to criticize her precious cub. It is a delicate subject, indeed. That's why the typical neighborhood is like yours, providing little "feedback" to parents in regard to the behavior of their children. The kids know there are no lines of communication between adults, and they take advantage of the barrier.

What each block needs is a mother who has the courage to say, "I want to be told what my child does when he is beyond his own yard. If he is a brat with other children, I would like to know it. If he is disrespectful with adults, please mention it to me. I will not consider it tattling, and I won't resent your coming to me. I hope I can share my insights regarding your children, too. None of our sons and daughters is perfect, and we'll know better how to teach them if we can talk openly to each other as adults."

Parents who take this important first step--and it won't be an easy subject to broach--improve the chances of raising well-behaved children.



In the movie Dances with Wolves, as you may remember, an unlikely friendship is formed when "Dances with Wolves" (Kevin Costner), a soldier, stumbles onto an Indian tribe, and both the Indians and the soldier struggle through the barriers of language and culture to know each other better. A friendship is formed between "Dances with Wolves" and a warrior named "Wind in his Hair," which Costner refers to as the "fierce one." As their friendship is formed, "Wind in his Hair" tells "Dances with Wolves" that he had lost his best friend in battle, but that now he understood that "his friend had gone so that he could come." It is a poignant moment in the movie as this friendship is solidified, and a great illustration of how people move in and out of our lives. While the Indian community looked at the stranger with a guarded eye, as time passed and they saw his motives were pure, he was accepted and loved as one of their own.

think, but our ability to love. When Kyle and I found we were kindred spirits and became friends, I realized that others had gone so that he could come. Like all people God moves into and out of our lives, we knew that our time also would be limited; and although I believe it is his time to go, I am grieved.

The discussion of the swift fox as a possible endangered species aroused my curiosity about this elusive little animal. It is one that I have no memory of ever seeing, but yet it seems that I have always known that it was one of our native Hansford County

creatures. I read in The Mammals of Texas by Davis and Schmidly (put out by Texas Parks and Wildlife in 1994) that the swift and kit fox are now considered one species with just enough difference to call the two of them

Not much larger than a housecat, this smallest of the foxes has a black tipped tail, and a dark spot on either side of his nose. The body color is light gray or a buff yellow.

Although the swift foxes are mostly nocturnal, they are occasionally seen in the daylight hours. They were give the name swift because they are such

speedy little rascals. For some reason, these wild animals seem less afraid of man and are not considered as cunning as the red and gray foxes. Their worst enemies are coyotes and predacious birds (I think that must mean the great horned owls and eagles).

These animals dig their own dens or borrow from badgers or some other animal with a den. They like more than one opening. the pups, 3 to 6 in a litter, are born blind in March and April. By August they are almost full grown, and then the family unit breaks
