The Saturday evening per-formance is timed to drama-tize the moment of the crucifixion with Christ hanging from the cross between two thieves, just as the sun sets over the rugged canyon wall. This performance of the death of Christ and the despair of the world will be followed on Sunday morning by the living hope of the resurrection, as the sun rises on a great earthquake and ends with the awe-

some scene of the ascension.
The cast of the Kenton Easter Pageant is composed of farmers, ranchers, housewives, students, business and professional people from the surrounding area. Some of the cast members are third and fourth generation participants.


late registration. ACT scores are accepted by nearly all U.S. colleges and universities and are used by school grade point average and other information in admissions decisions and to help place students in appro-

Tornados Raze Elevator, Ravage Farms

Twin tornado wiped out Agco grain elevator and severely damaged at least two farm places Tuesday night, April 10, 2001

The first tornado hit Agco A, five miles south of Spearman on F.M. 760, leveling all but two tanks, which were also severely damaged.

"Agco was wiped out," said Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin. Randy Coombs, Agco assistant general manager estimates cleanup and

repair will take four to six months. 'It's a half-million bushel facility," he said. "It'll be over a half a million dollars damage not counting clean-up.'

Two people suffered bumps and bruises after the tornado turned over

their semi-truck, which was parked at the Ageo elevator. Across the field to the west from the Agco elevator, the twister drove 2X4's into the walls of Darrell West's home, shredding his barn and damaging its contents. West and his grandchildren were home at the time of

the 11 p.m. tornado, taking shelter in a closet. Three quarters of a mile from Agco and about three miles south of Spearman, the McLaughlin home place also sustained tornado damage. Joel and Haley Shields, who occupy the place, were not home when the tornado hit. The barn and garage on that place were also destroyed and

strew across the surrounding fields. The sheriff's department also reported downed powerlines on F.M.

Coombs said salvage crews were on their way to help with the Agco

At the time of publication, planes were determining the paths and exact touchdown locations of the twisters.



Other things keep me from doing drugs, but one big one is the effect of them. Statistics show that 10.2% of 8th grade students have used marijuana in 1991, and 22% of 8th grade students had used marijuana in 2000. School is one of the greatest things in my life, so I would not be willing to let go of my grades in exchange for the hallucinations that go along with drugs. Also, the depression would utterly damage my friendships and that is the last thing I want. Another effect that goes along with drug use is time distortion. This would affect my study habits, the time I spend on the computer and watching TV and the amount of work I get done. And most importantly, drug does eventually cause death.

The effects of alcohol are similar, but do vary in some ways. First are the massive hangovers that accompany the abuse of alcohol. I have been around people who have a

hangover and they are not very inviting. They are lazy, moody and they eat a lot. The hallucinations and reckless behavior that go along with alcohol abuse are similar to the effects of drug use. The most dangerous symptom through the deteriorating effect alcohol has on the liver. Slowly, the liver's filter-ing system will become contami-nated with the wastes that are not delivered to the blood system. This, over time, would cause the filtering system to break down because of the overload of wastes. This in turn would allow the wastes to be let into the blood system causing death over a period of

So, with this in mind, remember that not everyone survives drugs and alcohol and the short-term effects are not worth the long-term effects of abusing these substances. My biggest concern though is why people think that when others see them doing these things it makes them look cool, when all it is really doing is making them look bad. So, in the long run, the effect of saying no would be me getting to live my life to its fullest extent.

Blowin' In The Wind

The Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association is presently working in several different areas even though it has not erected a mill since last fall.

The first area of effort is the restoration of mills themselves. There is presently in the SPWA's barn, a Star mill, a Model L Monitor and a Samson mill that has been re-restored and will be in place on the J. B. Buchanan farm sixteen miles southwest of Spearman.

Presently, Mr. Buchanan has a ten-foot Samson mill in his barn which is awaiting a tower. The SPWA is planning to build a tower for that mill so that it can go up in the Windmill Park fairly soon.

Meanwhile, Walter Woolley,

Dwayne Mitchell and Terry Schneider went two miles south of Beaver, Oklahoma, to bring to Spearman a 6-foot Woodmanse Airmaster mill on a tower. Restoration of that mill, except for the wheel, was done by Walter Woolley. That mill was once owned by Joe McGrew of Beaver. The SPWA needs a six-foot wheel for it, and it will be ready to go up.

At the same time, in the group of mills being readied to go up is the Showtime Car Club's Challenge 27, a twelve-foot mill that came from just north of White Deer.

Texas. The wheel and tail were galvanized at Denver, and Walter Woolley, both a SPWA and Showtime Car Club member, did the bulk of the restoration of the head. The head and wheel were placed on a tower in the SPWA's vard a couple of weeks ago by Walter Woolley, Julian Villarreal, Don Reed, J. D. Wilbanks, Dwayne Mitchell, Roger Buchanan and Chris Baloglou. The Challenge 27 mill on a thirtyfoot tower will require a special ciane to put it in place because of its height and weight. The tower has to be extra heavy to carry the weight of a 12-foot wheel and head. The tower was donated to the SPWA by car club and SPWA member, Robert Novak.

The SPWA wishes to express its appreciation to Walter Woolley for the use of his roller and Five Star Equipment for use of a tractor. Five Star Equipment hauled the roller from Walter's farm to Spearman, loaned a tractor to be used to pull the roller and then returned the roller to its home. Alvin Byers of Five Star Equipment drove the truck to haul the extremely heavy roller to town. The roller considerably smoothed out the clumps of grass and soil in the park and will probably be used again at a later time.

Don Maize and Ronnie Willis

have put up a 6-foot Monitor windmill by their shop on Carson Carson Street is off Street. Highway 207 by Mark Sheets' business. Also drop by the Claude Sheets' on East Kenneth Avenue to see the addition to their display. Both of these mills are privately owned, but they will be included on SPWA's tours.

Spring not only brings flowers but also windmills, and one day soon, three or four mills will go Those mills will bring the number of mills in Spearman to over twenty, and the countdown to June, 2002, and the Windmillers' Convention will continue.

ELI WINDMILL

Mill No. 11 in the catalog of mills in Spearman is the Eli mill at Prairie Motors on Highway 107.

The Eli mill is interesting because the Kregel Windmill Company of Nebraska City, Nebraska, made it for a small geographical area of southeastern Nebraska. Mr. Kregel estimated his company produced about 2000 of the mills during its fifty years of existence. He wryly noted "we never made any money out of it" he recollected in a 1986 interview with T. Lindsay Baker. He allowed "if we'd made any more, we probably would have gone

How did the Eli get its name? The name was chosen because it seemed to the manufacturer a name easy to read painted on the vane of a mill seen from a distance. No one in the Kregel family was named Eli so the name was simply chosen for its ease in production.

Besides its name, the Eli is interesting because it has no gears; the Eli is a direct stroke, meaning that one revolution of the wind wheel produces one stroke of the pump. The Eli is remarkably simple in

As you look at the wheel of the Eli, you recognize its most striking design element. Unlike almost all other windmills manufactured in America, the blades on the Eli are mounted behind the outer wheel rims. Compare the wheel to that of the Woodmanse mill across the highway at First National Bank, and you see why the Eli has such a large blade free from openings. The wheel presents a smooth front that makes it appear larger than its actual size. It also adds to its dura-

The fishing has picked up! In addition to Max Taylor's big catfish on Saturday, Joe Olivarez of Waka caught 6 channel cats and one blue, a total of 22#s of fish. He was using minnows for bait. One keeper crappie was kept. Jim expects the crappie fishing to pick up as the water temperature has come up from 46 degrees last week to 56 degrees this morning.

Thursday Jim had an unusual experience in helping the Fish and Wildlife people stock 2,000,000 walleye in our Lake. As the Texas hatcheries do not grow walleye, they had made a trade with the fish hatchery at Lamar, CO, for these

tiny little hatchlings. There were 20 plastic bags with 100,000 in each. The fish were so small that the bags looked like they were holding muddy water. They released them out in the middle of the Lake after slowly adding lake water to the bags so there wouldn't be a shock in the change of the water temperature. Many do not survive the move.

were seven white pelicans on the Lake Saturday. Jim saw an osprey in the trees in the Lake. He is hearing turkeys on the office side now as the toms are strutting and


Testing Scheduled


