The maximum amount received by a household was over \$8,100, and the minimum amount was about

"One individual even sent each household a \$1,000 check before any of this got started," Brown said. "We decided not to take that into account as we distributed the money, since everyone had received the same amount."

The decision on how much money each household would receive, Brown said, was based on such factors as employment, number of family members, amount of property damage, amount of assistance needed, insurance, and the amount of income received.

Brown said that the city of Stinnett had rented a warehouse to store donations of such items as furniture, clothing, food and other goods that were made in addition to cash dona-

"That warehouse is a large one, and it is just packed with food and things," he said. "A portion of the food in storage will probably be donated to the High Plains Food Bank in Amarillo, since Hutchinson County uses that food bank," he add-

Voters in Hansford County will go to the polls Saturday, May 4 for city and school board elections. But voters who suspect they may be unable to vote that day, or who want to vote early, can cast absentee ballots Monday, April 15 through Wednesday, April 30.

missioners on Monday included discussion of the air conditioning system at the Hansford County Courthouse, discussion of the Justice of the Peace salary, and explanation of rules for use of the Spearman County

Brown said the courthouse has no air conditioning system on the main floor. The second floor offices, he said, have their own independent air conditioning systems. A request had been made for an engineer's proposal involving installation of a heating and air conditioning system for the whole building.

The cost involved in installing that type of system would be very high, said Brown, so the engineer was asked to come up with a proposal for a system for the main floor only.

Hansford County Justice of the Peace Michele Davis met with commissioners to discuss her salary and to request an increase. Brown noted

that according to law, the commissioners' court cannot consider salary changes, whether increases or decreases. after the start of a fiscal year. Salaries can only be set at the beginning of a fiscal year when a budget is being set up, he explained.

The commissioners' court met with several primary users of the Spearman County Barn and discussed the newly written set of rules for the barn's use. The group went over the rules and discussed the necessity of a refundable deposit for using the building. In addition, commissioners authorized hiring a part-time employee for maintenance at that building and around the courthouse.

Road easements were granted to Phillips 66 Natural Gas Co. and to North Plains Electric Cooperative. Regular business for commissioners included approval of the minutes of the last meeting; approving the treasurer's report and investments; and payment of claims.

Appraisal lowers tax

Your agricultural land may be eligible for property tax relief. For more information, contact Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Hansford

County Appraisal District.
According to Peddy, qualified farmers and ranchers can apply for a special, lower appraisal of their land, based on what it will produce rather than what it would sell for in the open

The basis for both types of special appraisal is found in the Texas Constitution, Peddy said. Article 8, Sec. 1-d-1 addresses what is often known as open-space land appraisal, and Article 8, Sec. 1-d addresses agricultural-use or "ag-use" ap-

Landowners must file completed, signed applications for special appraisal at the appraisal district office by April 30. Those who must file this year include owners of land under 1-d appraisal and landowners whose property did not previously receive 1-d-1 appraisal. Late-filed 1-d-1 appraisal applications will be considered until the day before the 1991 appraisal records are approved, but will draw

The requirements for application and for qualification of both the land and the owner are different for the two types of appraisal," Peddy said.

Most property owners apply for 1-d-1 appraisal. To qualify, the land must be used for agriculture, timber growth, or as an ecological laboratory. This form of appraisal does not restrict ownership to individuals and does not require agriculture to be the owner's primary business.

However, this form of special appraisal requires that the land is used for a qualifying agricultural or timber purpose to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area. The chief appraiser, who is responsi-ble for approving the application, must determine that the land has been devoted principally to a qualify-

ing use for at least five of the preceding years.

A 1-d appraisal requires annual application; ownership by an in-dividual, not a corporation, partnership, agency, or organization; agricultural use of the land for at least three years prior to the year of application; and that the owner's primary occupation and source of income is the land's agricultural

"In addition, landowners need to be aware," Peddy said, "that the law provides specific penalties for taking qualified land out of agricultural or timber production."

A "rollback" tax will be assessed against the landowner who has 1-d appraisal if the land is sold or its use changed. The rollback extends back for the three tax years before the year in which the change or sale oc-

Under 1-d-1, a rollback is triggered only by changing the land's use to one that would not qualify for productivity appraisal. The additional taxes are levied for the five tax years preceding the year of the change.

The rollback tax is measured by the difference between taxes paid under productivity appraisal provisions and the taxes that would have been paid if the land had been put on the tax roll at market value, Peddy said. The law also requires that an interest charge be levied.

Landowners also need to be aware that they must apply for productivity valuation with each appraisal district in which they have land. Failure to do so could result in taxing units assessing taxes on the land's full market value.

Additional information and application forms are available from the local appraisal district office. The staff will be able to assist landowners with the information necessary to determine if their property qualifies for the special appraisal.

The Association of Texas Professional Educators (ATPE) awarded a certificate to the Spearman group at its annual convention in Austin on

"We were recognized for having had the highest growth in membership for the region," reported Brenda Winegarner, second grade teacher at Spearman Elementary School. She attended the ATPE meeting with her husband, Verlan, a delegate for the

Spearman's Classroom Teachers Association (CTA) has 22 ATPE members, according to CTA's president, Linda Rowland. There are 65 classroom teachers in the Spearman school system, of whom 61 are also CTA members.

The ATPE is a statewide organization boasting 52,000 members whose main function is to serve as a voice in Austin on school-related issues, Rowland said.

"The ATPE is for the betterment of teachers and teaching," she added, 'For those of us who are members, it's a way for us to make our voices here (in the Panhandle) heard down in Austin at the State Legislature.'

While Verlan and Brenda Winegarner were at the ATPE convention, the organization voted on over 30 resolutions, ranging from salary "capping" to career ladder guidelines

Mrs. Winegarner also attended a special workshop about planning for teacher retirement, which she said she found "very useful," and the Winegarners heard motivational speakers and attended other seminars as well.

The topic on everyone's mind, however, was the current school fun-ding crisis, Mrs. Winegarner reported. The ATPE has developed a funding plan that will be presented to the legislature at a future time. Mrs. Winegarner said it was "enlightening" to attend the ATPE

convention. "I had never been to anything even remotely political, so it was a learning experience for me, and a very positive one!" she com-

The Spearman CTA elected to join the ATPE last year after teachers heard presentations from three Texas teacher organizations. The ATPE was chosen by teacher vote after the presentations were made.
"We liked the ATPE the best

because the group's philosophy is nonadversarial. They believe in working out problems at the lowest level first," Rowland explained. "The group is also open to ad-ministrators, which appealed to us, and it is the fastest-growing education organization in Texas right

now." She said the dues for ATPE are also very reasonable

Spearman's new ATPE memberships won the local group two awards: one for the highest growth in the state and another for the highest growth in the region.

Spearman's CTA paid for delegate Verlan Winegarner, a fifth grade teacher, and Brenda Winegarner to travel to the ATPE convention last month. Superintendent Larry Butler approved the Winegamers' absence from the classroom on March 22 so they could get paid substitute

Next year's ATPE convention will be in Fort Worth, Rowland reported, and she said it is hoped several Spearman teachers can attend.





On The Go With Joy

We have been given permission to speed from Pampa and arrived in use a recipe "Crispy Herbed Chicken" from The American Cancer Society Cookbook by Anne Lindsay (Copyright (c) 1989 by Anne Lindsay). Reprinted by permission of William Morrow and Co.

6 chicken pieces (about 2 pounds, bone in)

2 tablespoons Herb-Seasoned Flour*

1/3 cup (approximate) warm water

Remove skin from chicken; rinse chicken under cold water and pat dry with paper towels. Place chicken in single layer in lightly shallow roasting pan or baking dish. Use small sieve or spoon to sprinkle herbseasoned flour over chicken. Bake, uncovered, in 375 degree oven for 40-50 minutes or until chicken is no longer pink inside, basting occasionally with liquid in pan to brown top of chicken. Add more water if there's not enough liquid in pan for basting. Makes 6 servings. 200 calories per serving 3.2 grams fat per serving. Excellent niacin.

* In small jar with lid, combine 1/2 cup all-purpose flour; 2 tsp. each of salt, dried basil, and tyme; 1 tsp. each of dried oregano, tarragon, and paprika; and ½ tsp. pepper. Cover and shake to mix; store at room temperature. Makes about 2/3 cup. To make only enough for one meal, combine 2 tbs. flour with 2 tsp. dried herbs, salt and pepper.

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
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drug abuse program



Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed two separate applications with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to introduce two new optional directory services. One service is Directory Assistance Call Completion (DACC) and the other service is Multiple List Directory Assistance (MLDA).

DACC is an optional service that provides customers the option of having their Directory Assistance call completed to the requested number (when they call Directory Assistance for a number) by either the Directory Assistance operator or a mechanized audio response system.


The proposed rates* for fully-automated DACC calls are: \$.30 if the call is sent paid or billed to a calling card, \$1.00 if the call is collect or billed to a third number and \$.25 from a coin

The proposed rates* for semi-automated (operator assisted) DACC calls are: \$.85 for calls that are sent paid or billed to a calling card, \$1.20 if the call is collect or billed to a third number and \$2.60 for a person-to-person call.

Multiple List Directory Assistance (MLDA) allows the customer to request more than two listing requests per call to Directory Assistance. Customers can either call on "demand" and receive up to 10 listings, or schedule an "appointment" and receive the assistance of a Directory Assistance operator for as long as required. The rates for "demand" MLDA are \$.30 per listing request (after applicable allowances), with a maximum of 10 listing requests per call. The rates for "appointment" MLDA are \$1.00 per minute, with a 15-minute minimum.

The optional services DACC and MLDA are intended for use by both residence and business customers. Those persons who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps will be able to use DACC and "demand" MLDA free of charge. If approved by the commission, DACC and MLDA will be available beginning May 13, 1991. Firstyear projected revenues for DACC are approximately \$9.6 million. First-year projected revenues for MLDA are approximately \$1.7 million

Sunlight overexposure harmful to skin

HOUSTON-"Catching rays" may not be much fun for careless sun worshipers this spring break. They could return to school with a painful case of

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sunburn that can be costly in terms of looks and health.

Students should have fun during the spring break but protect against sunlight exposure to avoid premature wrinkling and aging, said Dr. John E. Wolf Jr., chairman of dermatology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. He suggests students consider the dangers of sun exposure.

While you're enjoying yourself on the beach, you may experience damage that several years down the line could lead to skin cancer," Wolf

Malignant melanoma, a skin cancer affecting approximately 25,000 people and causing an estimated 8,000 deaths each year in

the U.S., has been linked to severe sunburn. Melanoma growth may begin in normal skin or an existing mole which may enlarge, bleed and become scabby and itchy. Most cases are diagnosed in middle-aged and elderly people with pale skin who have been exposed to intense sunlight for many years.

Sunburn, inflammation of the skin caused by overexposure of the sun's ultraviolet rays, destroys cells in the skin's outer layer and in blood vessels beneath the skin. The skin may become red and tender and, in severe cases, blister.

The length of time a person can spend in the sun varies considerably with the color of the skin. Fair-

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skinned people are particularly at risk since their skin produces small amounts of the protective pigment

"The beach is a high-risk place for sunburns because of the humidity, heat and frequent blowing wind, increasing the chances of skin damage," Wolf said.

Wolf cautions beach-goers to cover up if they notice skin discoloration. It could be the first symptom of a first degree burn. Such burns can be easily avoided by taking a few precautionary measures.

A sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 should be used before exposing the skin to the sun. The sunscreen should be applied regularly, particularly when surfing or swimming. A long-sleeved shirt and hat can provide additional defense.

If the skin has been damaged by the sun, place a cool, wet compress on the skin followed by a moisturizing lotion to soothe the skin and relieve the discomfort. Aspirin can relieve some of the pain and the redness. For severe sunburn, a physician may prescribe corticosteroid medication to combat burned skin



An appliance thermometer can be used. The refrigerator temperature needs to be between 34 degrees and 40 degrees Fahrenheit. The temperature will vary somewhat in different parts of the refrigerator so check for the coldest places to store most perishable foods like meats, dairy products and eggs. The freezer should register 0 degrees F. or lower. Keeping the refrigerator and freezer clean will help maintain safe temperatures. Clean and defrost insides, and clean lint and dust from the motor and refrigerating unit.

Check door gaskets for tightness.

Any spoiled foods or those which have an expired "use-by" date should be discarded. Mold on any meats, soft or semi-soft cheese, fermented dairy products such as sour cream or yogurt signals the need to discard these products. If hard cheese has a small mold growth, substantial trimming of the mold from the cheese can save it. Heavy mold growth on a small portion of cheese may not be worth the risk. Throw it away. Also, clean up any spills in the refrigerator. These

encourage bacteria growth.
Check freezer foods. While frozen food stays safe for extended periods, the texture and flavor will suffer. Rotate frozen foods and, in general, use within six months to a year. Date all items so rotation will be easier. Packages with frost inside or with freezer burn will probably show loss

Check the cabinets and pantry. Ideally, foods should be stored in the coolest cabinets in the kitchen. Heat speeds up deterioration of foods.

Avoid storing foods near sources of heat such as the range, oven, dishwasher or hot water heater. Also, don't store foods under the kitchen sink where water and pipe connections encourage pest and rodent en-

Check pantry items such as flour, spices, cereals and grains for signs of insect infestation. If you see little black bugs, throw the infested products away. Clean the storage area

> Check cans and jars for rust, dents, cracks, leaks and bulges. Don't taste any suspicious foods. Throw them away. Again check "use-by" dates. Set up a system of "first-in" to ensure the use of oldest foods first. Generally, it's best to use canned goods within one year, especially home-canned items. Check for signs of pests or rodents and take proper measures of control.

> Check appliances for cleanliness and proper operation. Now may be the time to replace those appliance parts or repair those you have been putting off. Cleanliness for appliances such as can openers, processors, slicers, blenders, etc. is important to help prevent cross-contamination of foods with diseasecausing bacteria. Be sure you have a good supply of clean dish rags and sponges. These items harbor bacteria very well.

> Spring may be a good time to do a thorough kitchen search and clean-ing, but habits established on a regular basis to keep foods and the kitchen safe are one good way to maintain food quality and safety, and get the most from the food

> Lead Exposure From Bread Bags Turning used bread bags inside out to hold other foods may be a risky practice. A recent study of bread packages showed that 87 percent of plastic bags surveyed were coated with lead inks. The Environmental and Health Sciences Institute recommends that bags, turned inside out, for food storage be discontinued because lead containing paint might flake off onto the food.



Anglers of all ages appreciate fair and honest fishing tournaments that offer an excellent payback, a very reasonable entry fee, and a three hour evening contest that a working angler can attend. A polygraph test is given at each Fun Tournament just to ensure fair competition. just to ensure fair competition.

The first Fun Tournament at White River will be April 11.

Fun Tournaments at Lake White River east of Lubbock will take place on the second Thursday evening of each month at the marina

The first Fun Tournament at Lake Meredith will be April 18.

In 1991, Fun Tournaments at Lake Meredith are scheduled for the first and third Thursday evenings at Cedar Canyon near the marina.

Registration for all contests will start at 3:00 p.m. Fishing begins at 6:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. The 1991 schedule waited until the start of daylight savings time in order to

Anglers at Meredith can enter

Bass, Walleye or both categories with an entry fee of \$20 per category. White River will have only the bass category. Smallmouth and largemouth both fall in the bass category. All fun tournaments are the best three legal fish.

Fun Tournaments are designed to be fun. Anglers may use live bait, troll or even fish from the bank. The angler who finishes down in 10th place will win \$100, and every fisher-man with or without fish is eligible for the \$50 Luck-of-Draw that is the final event at each weigh-in ceremony. As an old cliche says, "It doesn't get much better than that."


