received Secretarial Disaster Declaration due to a natural disaster. Those eligible must also have a loan approved by an eligible lender who then will submit the completed application to the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority for approval. es in which we live, the flowers and plants we enjoy are all



I received the following story in an e-mail a while back. I just ran across it again, and, since Easter is fast approaching, I thought I would share it with you. I hope you enjoy it.

## The Painting of the Last Supper

The story behind the painting of the Last Supper is extremely interesting and instructive. Two incidents connected with this painting afford a most convincing lesson on the effects of thought in the life of a boy or girl, or of a man or woman. The Last Supper was painted by Leonardo Da Vinci, a noted Italian artist.

The time engaged for its completion was seven years.

The figures representing the twelve apostles and Christ himself were painted from living persons. The live model for the painting of the figure of Jesus was chosen first. When it was decided that Da Vinci would paint this great picture, hundreds and hundreds of young men were carefully viewed in an endeavor to find a face and personality completely devoid of dissipation caused by sin. Finally, after weeks of laborious searching a young man, nineteen years of age, was selected as the model for the portrayal of Christ. For six months Da Vinci worked on the production of this leading character of the famous painting. During the next six years Da Vinci continued his labors on his sublime work of art. One by one, fitting persons were chosen to represent each of the eleven apostles, space being left for the painting of the figure representing Judas Iscariot as the final task of this masterpiece. This was the apostle, you remember, who betrayed his Lord for thirty pieces of silver. For weeks Da Vinci searched for a man with a hard callous face, with a countenance marked by scars of avarice, deceit, who would betray his best friend.

After many discouraging experiences in searching for the type of person required to represent Judas, word came to Da Vinci that a man whose appearance fully met the requirements had been found. He was in a dungeon in Rome, sentenced to die for a life of crime and murder. Da Vinci made the trip to Rome at once, and this man was brought out from his imprisonment in the dungeon and led out into the light of the sun.

There Da Vinci saw before him a dark, swarthy 1. 1n, his long shaggy and unkempt hair sprawled over his face. A face which portrayed a character of viciousness and complete ruin. At last the painter had found the person he wanted to represent the character of Judas in his painting. By special permission from the king, this prisoner was carried to Milan where the fresco was being painted.

For six months the prisoner sat before Da Vinci, at appointed hours each day, as the gifted artist diligently continued his task of transmitting to his painting this base character in the picture representing the traitor and betrayer of the Savior.

As he finished his last stroke, he turned to the guards and said,

## Booknotes

#### by Sheri Benton, Hansford County Library Director

As always, there are changes in the wind around Hansford County Library. We are in the process of leasing a new copier for public use. Our "old" one still works, but it is getting difficult to get parts for it and the cost of the service contract has made leasing a new one more attractive as well as more cost efficient. We will be taking bids to sell our existing copier so if you are interested, please stop by the library for details.

Due to the lease of the new copier and the ever-increasing costs of supplies, we find it necessary to adjust the amount that we charge for copies. For the past seven years, we have charged only \$.10 per copy for letter or legal size and \$.25 per copy for ledger size. Effective March 14, 2001, our new prices are \$.15 per copy for letter or legal and \$.25 per copy for ledger. This also affects the price of copies printed when using our computers and printers. The first five black and white copies are free, but additional black and white copies will be \$.15 each. Color copies are \$.20 each - none are free. As with most things in our library, we are not trying to make a profit on these items, we are mere-


ly trying to do cost recovery. We do our best to provide as many services as possible at no cost to our patrons, but some require at least cost-recovery for us to stay afloat. The prices listed above for copies are self-serve. If you expect our staff to make copies for you, we must charge for staff time as well. Copies made by staff are \$.25 each for letter and legal and \$.50 each for ledger.

Due to some problems with inappropriate use of library computers, we now have a card listing our policies that each patron must sign before he or she can "check out" a computer. There is no charge to use one of our computers unless you choose to print off materials. You must have a library card and be current (no fines) to use our computers unless you are not a resident of Hansford County. Nonresidents who are just visiting may use a "guest card." All of the computers that we have received through grants are very beneficial to our patrons and our community, but they have brought about a whole new set of issues and situations for our staff and board to deal with accordingly. These rules are not made to inconvenience our patrons, but to make things as fair possible for all users. 35

This punishes all users causing fewer computers to be available and thereby more waiting time to use one. Disregarding our policies will result in loss of privileges.

that - for public use - they are not like a personal computer that you might have at home. There must be rules and each patron will be expected to abide by those rules. If everyone will cooperate and be considerate of others who may be using the same computer, it will be better for everyone.


Da Vinci, with the trained eyes of a great character student, carefully scrutinized the man upon whose face he had constantly gazed for six months and replied;




This is the true story of the painting of the Last Supper that teaches so strongly the lesson of the effects of right and wrong thinking of an individual.

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
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## Superintendent's Corner

Several months ago I spoke on KRDF about a new project that I called the undertaking "Hundred Home March." The concept behind the program is that during the next year that I will make visits to 100 homes in the community to talk to parents about their child and to communicate the good things happening at school!

What a concept; however, I can not take credit for the idea. The idea came from Cindy Blackman in her role as Community Resource Coordinator. Cindy is constantly looking for ways to increase parent and volunteer involvement in our schools in order to better promote the school district in the community. As she was researching some literature on parental involvement she came across the "100 Family March' and approached me with the idea. Although visiting 100 homes in a year (which is about 25% of our student population) seems like a lofty goal, I felt that it would be a great mechanism for me to meet people and to PR the district.

The next question was what homes and kids do we visit? In order to facilitate this issue we devised a form for teachers to submit to my office with names of students that they would like to nominate for me to visit. The form asked for the student's name and a reason for celebration. It did not matter how big or small the accomplishment but rather something positive or even just a word of encouragement that the teacher wanted to communicate to both the student and parent. The response from the staff was overwhelming and I received a stack of nominations from teachers that are enough to keep ne busy until the end of the school year.

Since all students in the district

were eligible for nomination, the next question arose - how about homes where English is not spoken? Since I do not speak Spanish this issue had to be resolved or else my visit would be limited to only a select group of the community. One of the messages of these home visits is that language will not be a barrier between the school and parents! In order to address this issue Elodia Bravo, a staff member, will accompany me to the homes where Spanish is spoken as the primary language

The next step was to start scheduling appointments. In some instances these visits were scheduled in the evening after school since both parents were not home during the day because they work outside the home. In other instances visits were scheduled at lunchtime or during the day when there was a parent at home. Cindy Blackman became my right hand, scheduling the appointments and also accompanying me on the visits.

As we started scheduling these visits we became a little apprehensive on how long do we stay? We settled on a 30-minute block and hoped that we could stretch the visits to last at least that amount of time. What we found out after we started our visits that in some instances 30 minutes was not enough time. On average the visits have lasted between 20 and 30 minutes

Currently, I have made approximately 15 home visits to homes of children from all three of our campuses. The reason for the celebrations varies from such things as a student exercising good manners in the classroom to being one of the best students a teacher has ever had! We are not just making visits to the homes of students that are making straight A's but in some instances students that are struggling and have overcome an obstacle or a challenge

My message to each home is the same. We are proud of your child and want to read to you what your child's teacher has to say about what is happening in school with your child. In one of the visits the student was home and joined the parent and me as I read the teacher's comment. The student said that she did not know the teacher thought that about her. I explained that sometimes a teacher is unable to communicate to every student how much he or she cares, Society has frowned on us giving kids hugs and telling them how much we care about them! One of the comments from a teacher was that this particular child (from a home of a recent immigrant) was one of the best students she has ever taught. The mother sat there with a big smile and tears rolling down her cheek. If ever a teacher has made a difference in the life of one of her students, this teacher did!

After we talk about the student, I ask the parents for their help in encouraging their child to do their homework and to read. I remind all parents that they are their child's first teacher and that we view them as a partner in the education process. We all want the same thing and that is to provide their child with the best educational opportunities possible. The key to success in today's society rests with a good education. Knowledge is power and education is the key to success! I also take the opportunity to tell the parents that we are proud of their child and we care about them! I am not just reciting words but with all sincerity want parents to know that we are not perfect but that we really do care! The message I leave with them is to be an encouragement to their child and to listen to them. I suggest that everyday when their child comes home from school that they sit down with them and talk to them about what happened at


school and what is going on in their lives.

0 W it is hard to describe the feeling that I have experienced after each of these home visits and the feedback from the parents has been overwhelmingly positive. course most of the parents thought the reason for the visit was because their child was in trouble. It is a shame that the only time most parents ever hear from us at school is when their child is doing something wrong. I reiterated my purpose of the visits is to open up dialogue before there are problems! I honestly believe that if we would take the time to talk with parents when things are going good that it will be easier to solicit their support when we are having problems!

These home visits have been a wonderful experience for me. I told the board of trustees at our last board meeting that of everything I have ever done in the past 25 years in the field of education that these visits have been the most rewarding! I guess these visits allow me to get away from the mounds of paperwork that dominate my job and allow me to experience the real joys and successes that are happening ever day in our classrooms. It reinforces to me the quality of teachers that we have and their genuine concern that they have for both the academic and emotional success of the students that they teach every day. We are making a difference and I thank the staff for allowing me to be the spokesman for all the good things happening in our schools!

I still have plenty of work to do and homes to visit. Once next December rolls around I hope to have made my goal of visiting 100 homes in the community. I hope to continue to spread the good news of what is happening in our schools. I hope to communicate to parents that we care about every child we have in our schools and that we are not waiting for them to come to us but rather are taking our success directly to the homes in the community.

How fortunate I am to be an educator! How fortunate that I am in a profession where I can make a difference in the life of a child. As I continue my "march" throughout the community, I will strive to communicate the positive things happening in our schools and that we have the best kids in the world right here in Spearman, Texas!


