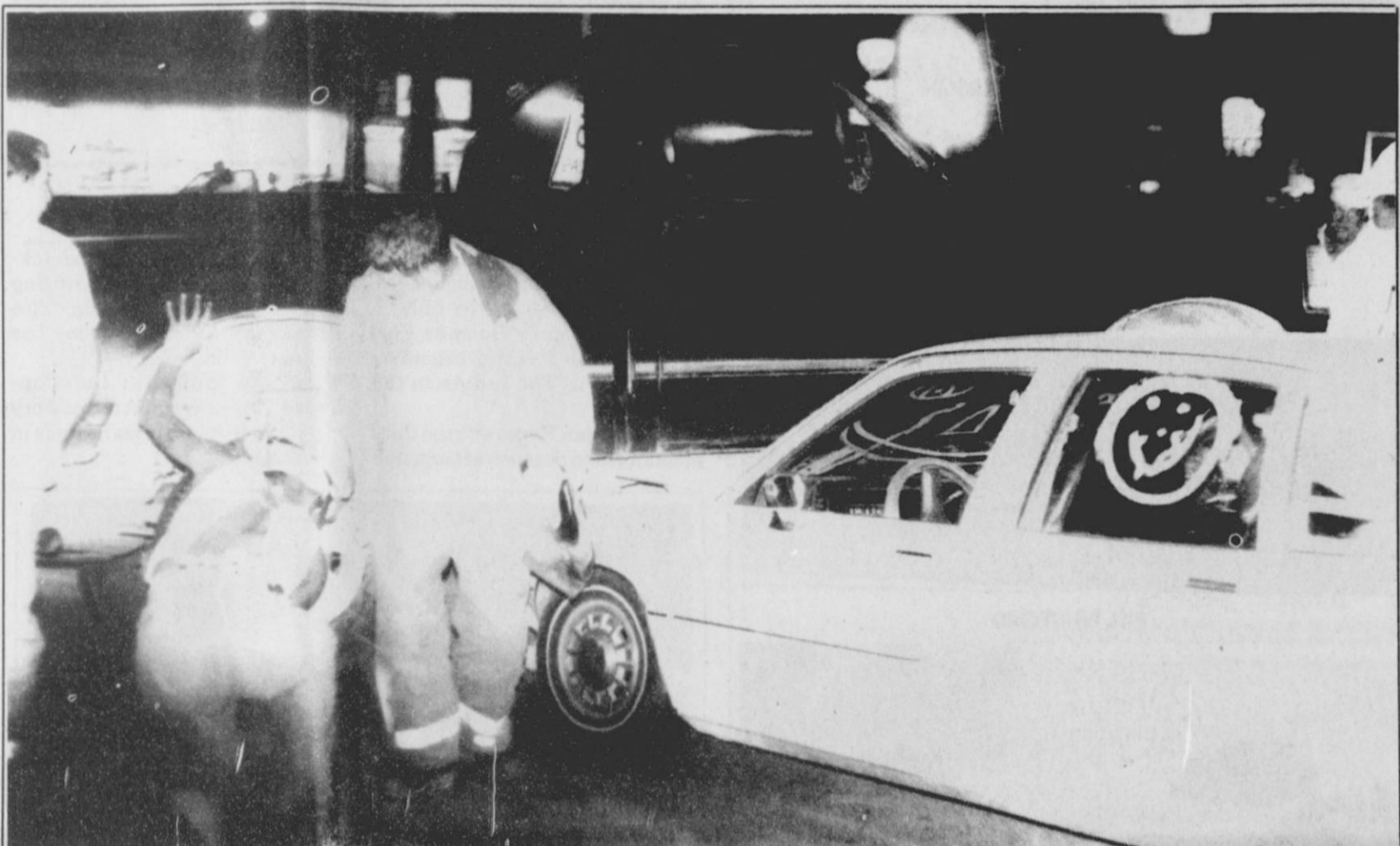

## Spearman Police Department answers the call

The Spearman Police Department and the Hansford County Sheriff's Office certainly had their hands full this past week. Both offices have dealt with major incidents that occurred in Spearman, including one wreck and one felony arrest.

On August 8th, the Spearman PD received a call at 10:00 p.m., involving a two car pile-up on Hwy. 15, next to Taylor's. Ronda Lee

Dunaway was driving her 1981 Chevy Citation north bound, when she hit a curb in front of the store. This caused her to over correct and hit the right rear tire of Martin Lane Sanders' 1992 Black Ford 150. From there, they both slid towards the curb, which caused Sanders' vehicle to almost overturn. Instead of flipping, the vehicle popped straight up and landed on the hood of Dunaway's Chevy. Citations were

given to Dunaway for the accident and to Sanders for no proof of insurance. Fortunately and unbelievably, only minor damage was caused to the vehicles and no one was hurt in the accident.

Sheriff R.L. McFarlin was called on August 7th to investigate a stolen motorcycle and parts of Lynn Garrad's motorcycle. After intensive investigation, McFarlin recovered the bike, and immediately took

in Homer Hughes as a prime suspect. Hughes has been charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, and has not been arranged at this time. In addition, Hughes has also been charged with destruction of Hansford County property, which happened at an earlier date, assault of a police officer and a death threat to the arresting officer, both of which happened at the arrest of the motorcycle incident.

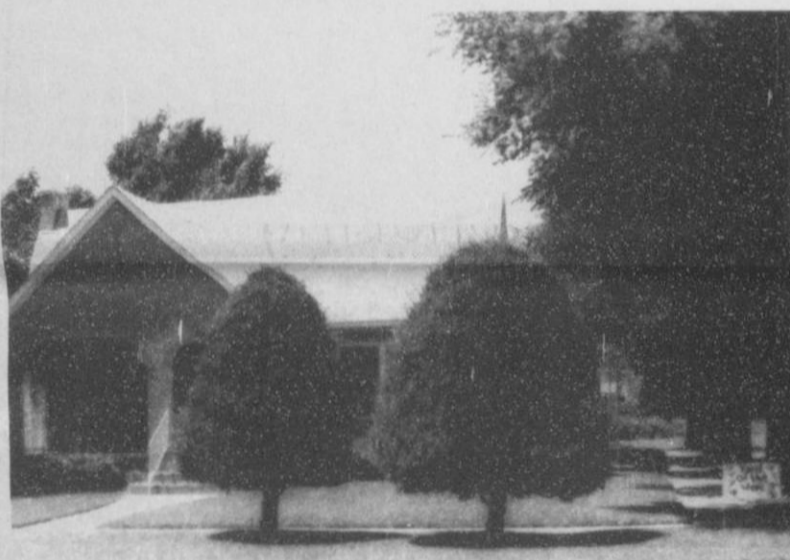

## Baylor offers tips for parents and asthma

Children are not the only ones who should prepare for a new year. Parents also need to gear up.

"Parenting is tough as a new school year starts," said Dr. James Bray of Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Many parents do not set guidelines at home, so school rules may be difficult for children. By creating home rules, parents can help.

Bray also recommends not overly pressuring children to achieve. Parents should respect individual strengths.

Other suggestions include: getting involved in children's homework; attending parent-teacher organization meetings, and arranging meetings with teachers to check on progress; teaching children social skills to help them get along with schoolmates; and praising children for work well done.

\*\*\*\*\*

Keeping asthmatic children out

of the hospital can be accomplished with family teamwork.

Parents should take the lead as "coaches" making the child the "star player" whose role is to keep the asthma treatment current, said Dr. Kristin Moore, an allergist at Baylor College of Medicine.

"Start by taking as much time as needed with the doctor so that both child and parents understand why and how drugs are to be taken," Moore said.

Then recruit other team members so the child will not feel he or she is facing asthma alone. Possible teammates: siblings, parents of friends with whom the child may spend the night, teachers, and school nurses.

"Having friends and supporters in many places can help ease the child's embarrassment about the condition or about having to interrupt school or play to take medication," Moore said.

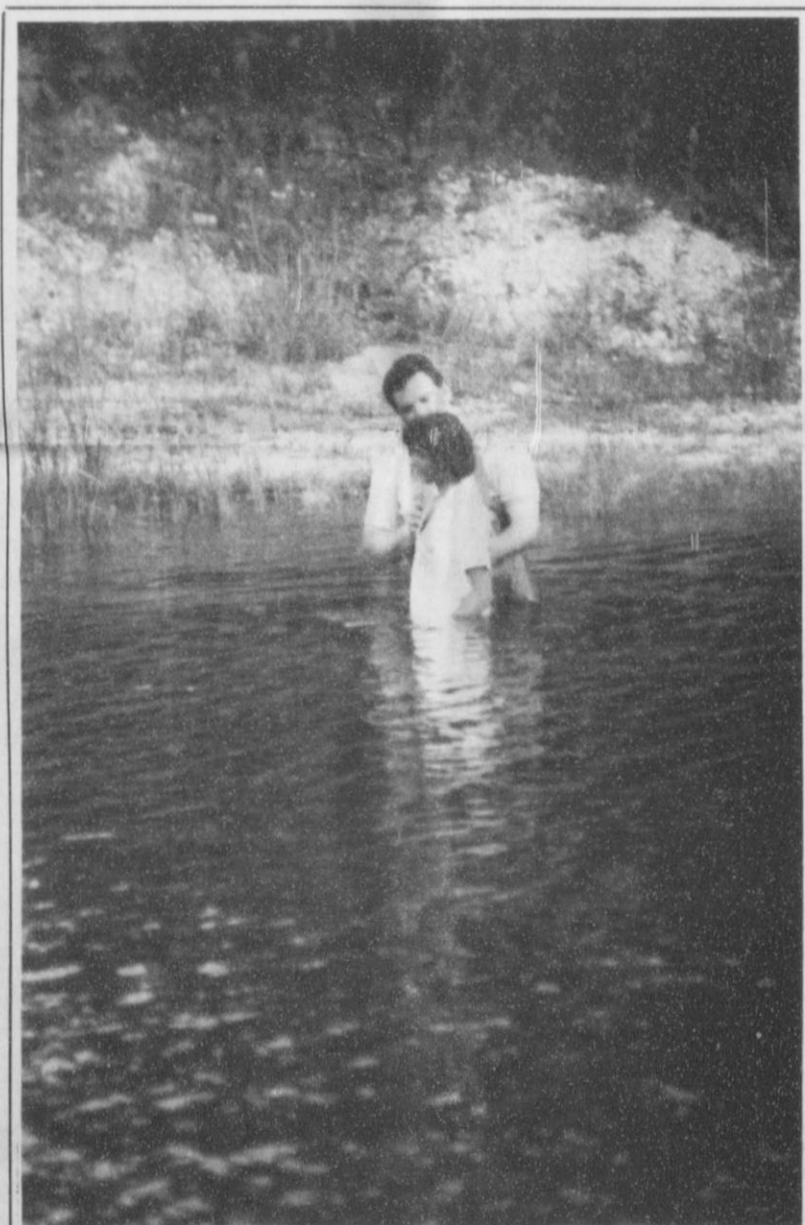
## At the movies...

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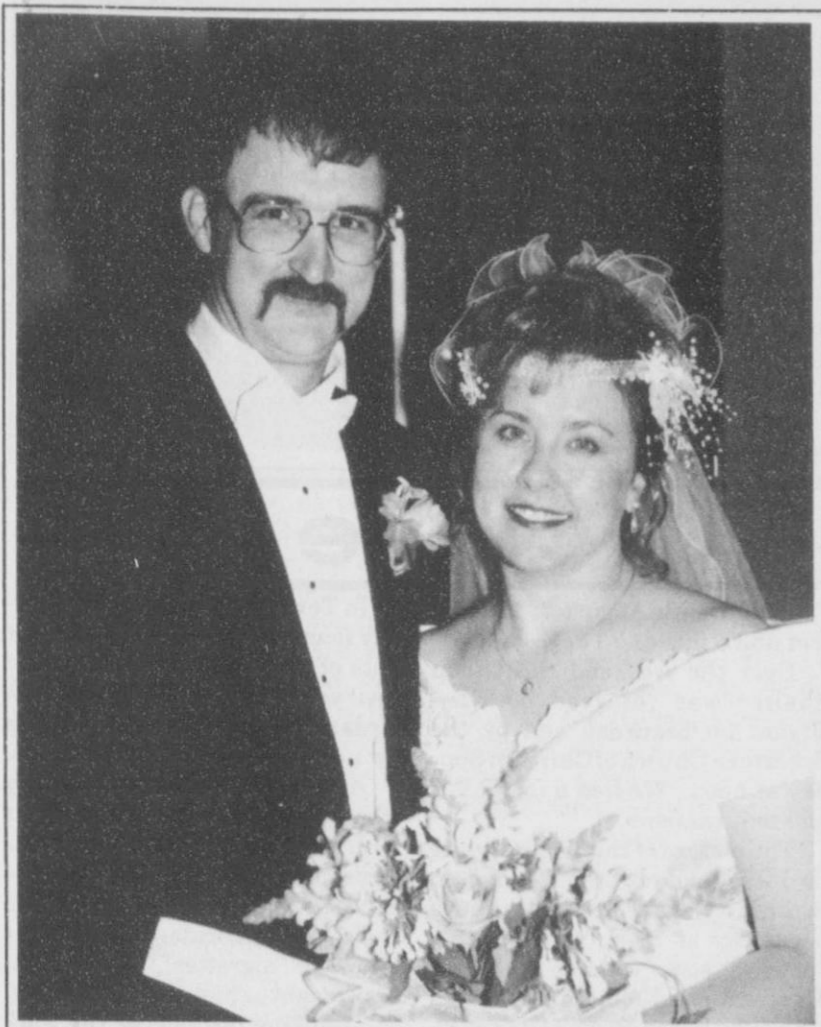

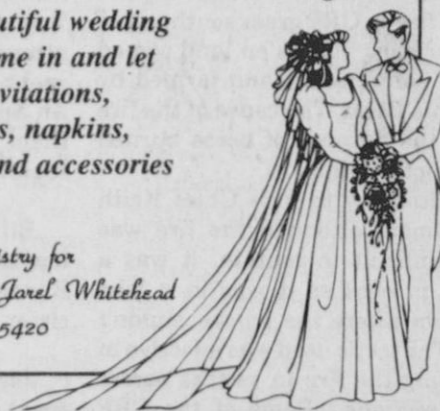

Lake Depth-August 7, 1995-29 feet and 6 inches-78 degrees.

Over the weekend the Group Shelter was reserved by Glen Bryant on Saturday and by the Spearman Church of Christ on Sunday at noon. We had a few R.V.'s and tent campers.

The picture of the elegant white bird was taken by Jim Derrington in the last days of July. There have been four of these wading birds spending some time at the Lake. Margaret and Kenneth Evans and a new book *The Birds of Texas* by John L. Tveten helped with the identification of this bird that is now known as the Great Egret, the largest of the white herons of Texas. Formerly called the common egret of the American egret, its distinguishing marks are its dagger-like yellow bill and its blackish legs.

In Texas there egrets are generally found on the marshes and salt flats of the coastal areas, but after their young are raised many of these birds travel some and even reach as far north as the Texas Panhandle.

Around the turn of the century when women decorated their hats with birds and their feathers, these birds came close to extinction because the plume hunters treasured their long, delicate back plumes known as "aigrettes". These feathers brought as high as \$32 an ounce.

Changing fashions or the work of groups of bird lovers who banded together to stop the killing of these birds in their breeding season had some effect, because by the 1930's the birds were making a comeback. The are on the decrease again as parts of their habitat is being destroyed by developments.

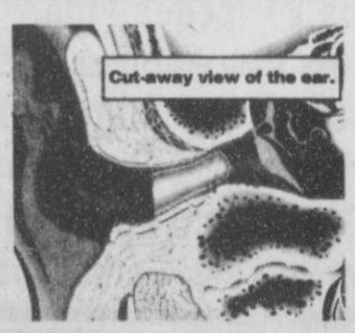

# City Lites

This week, the City Council begins discussing the budget for the 1995-96 fiscal year. This fiscal year will begin October 1, 1995 and end September 30, 1996. The City Council will review the City staff's recommended budget and make any changes the Council thinks is needed. The Council will have several workshops to discuss the budget and will adopt the final budget during the regular City Council meeting on September 19. The public is invited to attend any of the workshops or City Council meetings.

The budget that the City Council is reviewing is a particularly difficult budget. The declining economy has put a crimp on the City's revenues while federal environmental mandates have caused our expenditures to increase greatly. For instance, we expect sales tax collections to be about 14% less next year than they are this year (our monthly analysis shows that we are running a little over 13% behind last year's sales tax payments). As far as expenditures, our garbage disposal expenses will go up by more than \$46,000 over the current year's estimated expenditures. The main reason for this increase is due to closing the landfill and hauling trash to Borger. The federal mandates make hauling to Borger a

cheaper alternative to keeping the landfill open.

The proposed 1995-96 Budget will affect Spearman citizens in several ways. First, homeowners may see their tax rates increase from 65 cents to 69.5 cents per \$100 valuation. Homeowners may see their garbage bills almost double from \$10.51 per month to \$19.00 per month. Businesses may see their rates reduced to keep from subsidizing the residential rates. Finally, the city may not be able to provide the same flatbed service as we have in the past. The city crews will be spending more time hauling trash to Borger which means less time is available for other activities, namely the flatbed service.

The City Council will have some difficult choices to make during the budget discussions. As we work through the budget process, I am confident that the City Council will keep the City's best interest in mind when making their decisions. Sometimes, the City's best interest means making unpopular decisions and not giving in to short-term solutions that hurt the City in the long run. I hope that Spearman citizens will understand that raising taxes and garbage fees is not something we want to do but something we have to do to keep providing the services our citizens expect.

## Recycling Words

What is 7.5, times \$63, times 365? It is \$172,462. It is a lot of money for a town of about 3200 residents whose sales receipts are down 13% this year to date-that's what it is.

What does it represent? It is the number of tons of solid waste generated by the City of Spearman on a daily average, times the cost per ton after the landfill closes, times 365 days in a non leap year. Though these figures are for Spearman, the math can be applied to Gruver which currently landfills its waste in Spearman and will be equally affected by the landfill closure.

The landfill is closing to most materials but the city has applied for a type two permit that will allow it to accept yard and construction waste. There is a catch...There's always a catch. Where is the yard waste? Why in the dumpster of course. And who is going to sort it out? Why no one of course. And construction waste? How many of you are slipping that old fencing in the dumpster? You don't need to raise your hands. You know who you are.

Yard waste accounts for 15% of the solid waste generated in our region each year. If this material

was eliminated from the dumpster the solid waste disposal costs could be reduced by as much as 15%. The city already picks up tree limbs so please do not put them in the dumpster. As far as grass clippings go there is a selection. The choice do jour is to mulch your clips and leave them on the grass where they will fertilize the grass and leave organic matter to enhance the clay-like soil. A copy of the Texas Agricultural Extension Office's Don't Bag It brochure is available from your county extension agent or at city hall. Mulching saves about 38% of the time required to cut your grass and 95% of those who try it won't go back.

A second choice is to compost them. You can get materials on composting from the Extension office or from TNRC by dialing 1-800-64TEXAS and asking for composting information. I love compost. When the Hill Billies found black gold I thought they meant compost. A third choice is to self haul the clippings to the landfill.

Yard care professionals (People who get paid to cut grass) are strongly encouraged to take the grass they collect to the landfill. That in itself would be an enormous help.

Residents will probably not see an ordinance prohibiting the disposal of yard waste in the dumpster because ordinances can be expensive to police. I can hear it now. "Mr. A, are those your clippings in this dumpster?" "Why no officer. Why just last night, while I was a flossin' I heard the strangest sound in my alley. Maybe you could scrape up a sample of the alleged clippings and send it off to the L.A. crime lab for DNA testing." Mr. A smiles and closes the door. Another case unsolved.

In an age when virtually everything related to sports carries a corporate logo or a celebrity endorsement, there's still one thing that has no commercial affiliation. Ironically, it's the most important sports accessory of all - water.

The best weapon against heat exhaustion and dehydration, water is vital for those who exercise or work outdoors in steamy summer temperatures.

"It doesn't sound as glamorous as the advertised sports drinks, but water is fine for preventing dehydration," is the endorsement from Dr. James Muntz, an internal medicine specialist at The Methodist Hospital. Dr. Muntz is also an official team doctor of the Houston

Oilers football team and the Houston Rockets basketball franchise.

Sports drinks such as Gatorade and 10K are packed with sodium and potassium to replace those substances lost through perspiration. They also contain carbohydrates, which are starches and sugars that change into blood sugar, the fuel that powers your body.

There's nothing wrong with sports drinks, says Dr. Muntz, but he warns that too much blood sugar can actually slow you down.

"No matter what you drink, remember to drink before you get thirsty," he adds. "If you wait until you are thirsty, then you're already in trouble."

Heat exhaustion results from

water and salt loss, and from over-exposure to the sun. Excessive heat exposure causes an average of 452 deaths annually in the United States, a number easily doubled in 1995 by this summer's deadly heat wave.

Dr. Muntz suggests a few other guidelines to cut the risk of dehydration and heat exhaustion:

- Don't take salt tablets. Formerly believed to replace salt lost through sweat, salt tablets only accelerate dehydration. Sports drinks are a safer way to replace the body's lost minerals.
- Even though some activities - such as bicycling or sailing - keep

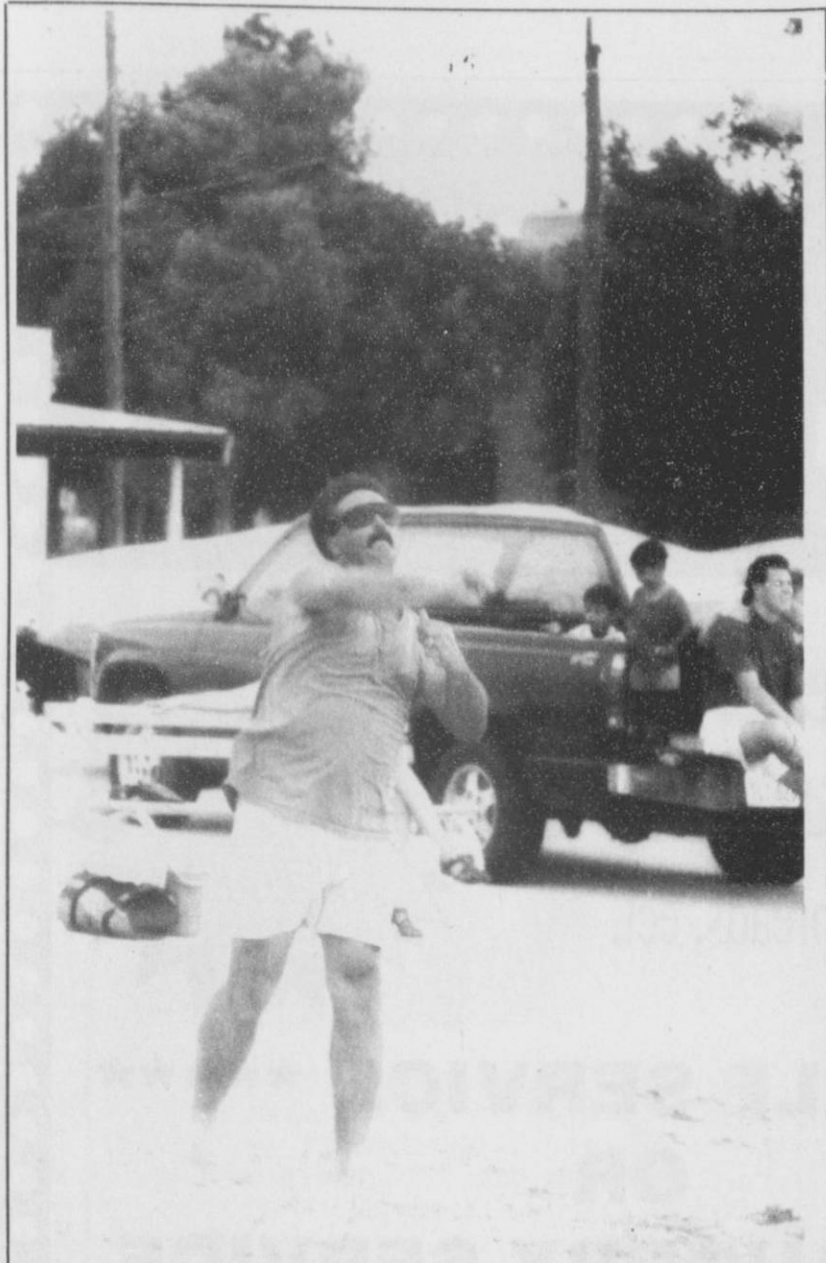

sweaty skin dry, the body still requires fluid replacement.

- Avoid alcoholic beverages. They only speed dehydration and impair judgment.

- When exercising or working outdoors, stop at the first sign of fatigue, light-headedness or dizziness.

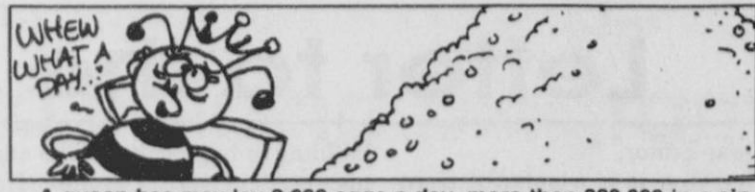
Someone suffering from heat exhaustion has pale and clammy skin. The victim could have a headache, be dizzy and weak, vomit or even faint. Treat heat exhaustion by getting the victim's skin cool; loosen clothing, and give sips of water.

"It isn't impossible to exercise or work outdoors when the temperature is in the 90's or above," says Dr. Muntz. "It just takes some care, planning and common sense."

Take a container of water with you to the tennis court, the gym or wherever you plan to have your activity. Remember to drink be-

fore, during, and after exercising.

Each generation has stayed or come back to Ochiltree County to live out their lives. We have clean air, abundance of water, fertile soil and a solid community. Our faith in God and trust in each other have brought us all through many hard times and created many good times.

There are five hog companies wanting to come to Ochiltree County. Our resources makes this very inviting. Our elected official, Mr. Teel Bivins, will not return our calls or letter. Mr. Bivins has changed the rules and regulations for permits and gotten them passed. On July 13 the new rules and regulations are doing away with public notice of permits and hearings. The first anyone is aware of hog operations is when they start construction next to you. This huge operation can come in anywhere, anytime, regardless of anyone's public rights. You will have to put up with the operation, whether you like it or not. In other words, Mr. Bivins has seen to it that our public rights are denied in this case. Our elected official is working for whom? Has he been here to talk with us? One permit issued and there will be an explosion of hogs in our county. A group of Japanese have announced they are coming to construct a hog facility. The invitation meeting only gave the adjacent land owners no information on construction of

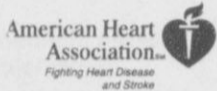
We met with a Dallas reporter about 10 days ago after touring the hog facility and he got sick.

# Reduce liability when leasing

Landowners who lease their land for hunting often obtain waivers to minimize their liability. Recent rulings by the Texas Supreme Court have clarified what a waiver should contain.

"A waiver is defined as the intentional relinquishment of a known right," says Judon Fambrough, attorney with the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University and author of *The Texas Deer Lease*.

"To be effective, the release provision must be based on an offer and acceptance where the parties

have equal bargaining power," says Fambrough. "For example, parents cannot release in advance a minor's right to recover for personal injuries caused by the negligence of another."

Likewise, the agreement for release must be based on consideration, but it need not be monetary. An agreement not to sue in exchange for hunting rights may be sufficient.

Recently, the Texas Supreme Court added three requirements for an effective waiver agreement. First, there must be a statement in

which the hunter expressly releases the landowner from any acts arising "from the landowner's negligence."

Second, the written contract must give the hunter fair notice of the release provision. The fair-notice principle focuses on the appearance and placement of the provision, not its content.

"The fair-notice requirement is not necessary if the landowner can prove the hunter had actual notice or knowledge of the provision," says

Fambrough. Third, the release provisions must be conspicuous. The element of "consciousness" is tied to the "fair-notice" requirement.

"Basically, the release provision must be conspicuous enough to give the hunter fair notice of its existence," says Fambrough. "What is conspicuous? There's no real answer.

Fambrough suggests several ways to make a provision conspicuous. These include emphasizing entire paragraphs, not just a portion; placing provisions at the be-

ginning or end of the contract on a separate sheet of paper; use of italicized headings and having hunters initial the waiver paragraph if it is part of the contract or to sign the page it is a separate sheet.
