# Boyd Rice Wins Twice at AQHA World Show

Horses ridden by Texas trainer Boyd Rice earned World Championships in Junior and Senior Cutting in back-to-back sets Wednesday, November 19, 2008 in Oklahoma City at the American Quarter Horse Association World Show. Rice, 42, Spearman, Texas, won the second and third AQHA World Championship cutting titles of his career and checks totaling \$33,857 with spectacular runs on two horses he competed well with all year.

Rice won the Junior Cutting with an initial 220 and a work-off 224 aboard 2003 mare ARC Cat Her Please (Chic Please x Moonstruck Cat x High Brow Cat). He also won the Senior Cutting with a 222 aboard 6-year-old stallion Sophisticated Catt (High Brow Cat x Shania Cee x Peppys Boy 895).

# **Gladiola Flower Club Home Tour**

Robert, Kristina and daughters Kaitlyn, Ryanne and Abby are anxious to have you come by and see their home on December 7th. The house was purchased by Martha and the late Billie Haden in 1953. They added a basement and master bedroom. In 2002, Robert and Kristina bought the house as a "fixer-upper" and began work in 2006.

"I got lucky," said Rice, also the World Champion in Junior Cutting with Seven From Heaven (Playgun x Peppys From Heaven x Peppy San Badger), a 1999 gelding, at the 2004 AQHA World Show. "I cut a bunch of good cattle and it worked out."

ARC Cat Her Please, owned by Kurt and Angie Harris, Whitesboro, Texas, and bred by Arcese Enterprise, Weatherford, Texas, earned \$15,160 by winning the Junior Cutting, which featured 58 entries and a \$75,800 total purse. Sophisticated Catt, co-owned by Keith Feister, Gainesville, Texas, and Dale Koller, Bethlehem, Pa., earned \$18,697 by winning the Senior Cutting, which featured 70 entries and a \$93,483 total purse.

The Junior Cutting included a highlight-reel battle between ARC Cat Her Please, a prior winner of \$89,27 in cutting and reined cow horse money, and Reserve World Champion Tanga Rey (Dual Rey x Cristy Merada x Freckles Merada), a 2004 mare trained and ridden by Andy Sherrerd and owned by Cowan Select Horses LLC, Havre, Mont.

Sherrerd, 33, Wayne, Okla., and Tanga Rey had competed at only one prior cutting event, The Non-Pro, also in Oklahoma City in mid-June, where they earned \$2,366 by making the Derby Open finals. They looked like a well-oiled team at the World Show.

Competing No. 14 among 17 Junior Cutting finalists, Tanga Rey and Sherrerd earned \$12,128 with their No. 2 finish by matching the 220 ARC Cat Her Please and Rice marked from the No. 9 draw. Tanga Rey and Sherrerd scored a 219 to lead off in the work-off, but ARC Cat Her Please and Rice topped them with a 224 for the win. Each rider assisted the other as a herd helper during their initial and the work-off runs.

"Boyd and I are good friends," Sherrerd said. "I help him and he helps me."

He was pleased with the strong performances by Tanga Rey, a horse that competed sparingly after an early career injury, but looks strong as she heads toward her 5year-old season.

The Senior Cutting's outcome never seemed in doubt after Sophisticated Catt and Rice marked a 222 from the No. 2 draw in a16-horse finals. The stallion, a prior career winner of \$136,291, topped \$100,00 during his 6-year-old season with a win at his last big show.

Senior Cutting Reserve World Champion Catty Starlight (Grays Starlight x Cats Bobby Sox x High Brow Cat), a 7-year-old stallion trained and ridden by Wayne

Czisny, Marieta, Okla., claimed the No. 2 spot with a solid 216 to earn \$14,957. The Senior Cutting featured cattle that just weren't nearly as workable as the Junior Cutting's had been.

Catty Starlight, owned by TCM Equine Ventures, Canton, Mich., started as a reining horse and he earned more than \$3,000 in reining as a 3year-old. He had earned





## Words from Faith & Grace

1 ce ister

We begin the Season of Advent. The season in which we prepare to celebrate the first coming, the birth of Christ, as we prepare ourselves for His Second Coming. We study Isaiah 64: 1-9, Psalm 80: 1-7, 17-19, 1 Corinthians 1: 1-9, and Mark 13: 24-37. In troubling times, we call upon our Lord, Isaiah writes a community lament imploring God to redeem His people. The presence of God is accompanied by mighty and terrifying events. All of our righteous acts are like a filthy cloth in God's presence. Yet, Isaiah calls God, "our Father", and reminds us that He is the potter and we are the clay. He asks God to not remember our iniquity and to come!

The Psalmist sings a lament. All of Judea has sinned and only God can save the people. The armies of their enemies are aligned against them, hence, a prayer of desperation. Yet note that the Psalmist uses "revelation", "power", and "salvation" as synonyms for God's presence with us.

In the introduction to 1 Corinthians, Paul uses the name of Jesus Christ no less than ten times. In difficult times, in difficult situations, we should call upon the name of Jesus Christ. Paul emphasizes that we as Christians are "consecrated" in Jesus Christ, we know that Christ died for us. He emphasizes that we are called to be God's dedicated people; we are to be "hagios", dedicated to possession by and service to God. Our "salvation" is the "charisma" of God; that is, we are redeemed by God and we have done nothing to earn, to deserve such redemption. Paul ends by assuring us that we are "clothed" in Christ so that we have nothing to fear at His coming again.

Paul chides the Gnostics, who claim to have special knowledge of God, by telling the Corinthians, "you are not lacking in any spiritual gift..." Consider that knowledge "puffs up" whereas love builds up.

Mark warns of the power and spectacle of the second coming of our Lord: "the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in heaven will be shaken". This grim picture of the "Day of the Lord" is interrupted by a prophecy of the fall of Jerusalem and the destruction of the temple in the lesson to be learned from the fig tree. Jesus tells his followers that "this generation will not pass away until these things have taken place." But as for the Day of the Lord, Jesus tells us, "but about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father". Beware Christian of the hucksters who claim to have special knowledge, to know the hour and day of His coming. Our Lord makes them liars. Yet, Jesus warns us to stay AWAKE! To WATCH!

Hence the first candle of Advent is lit to light our Hope in His Coming.

May the Holy Spirit keep you alert in Christ Jesus that you are not surprised at His coming again. Maranatha!

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

## **Gunder Stavlo**

Gunder R. Stavlo was born in Alcester, South Dakota in 1911 to Ed and Betsy Stavlo. Often called Sam, he was the fourth of their six sons who made the trip to their new home in Texas in 1917. Gunder attended his first year of school at Texhoma on the Texas side, when his mother took the boys there for school when they first came, Then for two years they did not have a school until one was built close enough the boys could ride there horseback. As a teenager, Gunder started working at various jobs to earn money, Winters he liked to trap up and down the Palo Duro Creek.

After WWII had been declared, Gunder and a younger brother Joel volunteered in January of 1942. Joel became a Navy Pilot and Gunder became a foot soldier in the 359th Regiment of the 90th Division. In WWI the Division had been formed mainly from Texans and Oklahomans and given an arm patch with TO. In WWII the nickname became "tough 'ombres" for the TO on the arm patch.

It had just been reopened for service on March 25, 1942 at Camp Barkeley near Abilene. After training some months, they were sent to England to prepare for the landings in Normandy.

Finally the day had come when Gunder was to be a part of the largest single day amphibious invasion of all time. The weather had turned bad, and it had been was buried in Plot D Row 3 postponed a day, but on Grave June 6, 1944 the operation started after midnight. Some troops were sent in by gliders He was awarded the Purple while others were parachut-ed in to secure bridges and other targets. At 6:30 A, M. Gunder became one of 130,000 troops that were landed on 5 sectors on the

coast of Normandy.

His regiment was sent in on Utah Beach where casualties were the lightest of any of the beaches with 197 out of the 23,000 that landed. The 359th had been attached to the 4th Division for the invasion, but on June 10, they were sent back to the 90th Division. During the move they were severely shelled which affected their readiness to attack the next morning. They were to free Cherbourg and eliminate the German resistance. Some of the combat for the next six weeks involved the most difficult, demanding and costly fight of the entire war.

Pfc. Gunder Stavlo, age 33, died on June 13, 1944, when the jeep he was driving for an officer in the hedgerows of France hit a land mine and both were killed. Gunder 31 Normandy Heart. A memorial service was held for him at the Gruver Methodist Church. Several members of his family have visited the gravesite.

I think Jim has seen ours that live in the Park at all times of the day. I have not heard of any bobcats being seen in the

towns of Spearman, Gruver, or Morse.

# More changes coming to Medicare in 2009

More changes are in store to Medicare in the coming year, said a Texas AgriLife Extension Service specialist. "The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services announced changes to the Medicare program for 2009,' said Andrew Crocker, AgriLife Extension gerontologist.

"These changes will take effect Jan. 1. It is important to look carefuly at all these changes and determine how they might affect you, especially changes to Medicare Part D, the prescription drug benefit."

Crocker said many people have already or soon will be receiving a copy of "Medicare and You 2009" in the mail.

"This handbook will help you navigate the services to which you are entitled under Medicare and should be kept in a place for easy reference,' he said. "If you happen to lose your copy or do not receive one, you may access it through the Medicare Web site: http://www.medicare.gov .

An overwhelming majority of Medicare beneficiaries do not have to pay a monthly premium for their Part A benefit, which is inpatient hospitalization coverage. This is because they have at least 40 quarters of Medicare-covered employment or are the spouse or surviving spouse of the beneficiary, Crocker said.

However, for those who may not have worked the required 40 quarters, Part A coverage may be obtained by paying a monthly premium, he said. For those who worked less than 30 quarters, this premium will be \$443 per month for 2009. For those who worked 30 to 39 quarters, this premium will be \$244 in 2009.

Crocker explained the annual Part A deductible in 2009 will be \$1,068, an increase of \$44. This amount is paid by the beneficiary when admitted as a hospital inpatient. The Part A deductible is the beneficiary's only cost for up to 60 days of Medicare-covered inpatient hospital care in a benefit period.

Beneficiaries must pay additional amounts for stays longer than 60 days, and these amounts will increase slightly in 2009, he said.

For the first time in a number of years, there will be no change in the monthly premium for Medicare Part B, the optional outpatient health insurance, Crocker said. The standard Medicare Part B monthly premium will be \$96.40 in 2009. Additionally, the \$135 annual deductible for services for 2009 is unchanged from 2008.

The 2009 open enrollment period for a person to enroll in or change a Medicare prescription drug plan begins on Nov. 15 and ends on Dec. 31, he said. Any and all changes made will go into effect Jan. 1.

"Each beneficiary should compare the changes in cost and drug cover-age that will take place in 2009 to their current prescription drug plan," Crocker said. "Beneficiaries should then compare this to the costs and coverage of other plans that will be offered in their community.'

He advised they check to see the costs of these plans, the medicines and services they cover, and how it works with their pharmacies and doctors.

"Each beneficiary needs to choose the best plan that meets their prescription drug needs and then enroll in this plan," Crocker said,

Conditions and costs of each plan will vary by provider and by the plan type, he said. Some plans offer additional help and some beneficiaries will qualify for extra assistance based on income. To find out the specifics for each plan, consult the plan provider directly.

In 2009, monthly premiums will average \$30 and beneficiaries must meet the \$295 annual deductible before the Part D plan begins paying, unless that particular plan has some exception, Crocker said.

Coverage will continue with the beneficiary paying just the co-payment and any residual cost for prescription drugs until the amount paid by the plan and the beneficiary reaches \$2,700. At that point, the beneficiary will be responsible for 100 percent of drug costs until \$4,350 is reached, unless the particular plan has some exceptions for coverage during this gap period, he said. Once the beneficiary has spent more than \$4,350, coverage resumes under the plan. According to Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, some Part D beneficiaries may see significant premium increases or changes - such as reduced coverage in the gap - if they stay in the same prescription drug plan in 2009. Some ways to get more information on Medicare or to review and compare Part D plans are: - Call 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227, TTY 1-877-486-2048). 24-hour help is available from trained Medicare representatives. - Visit http://www.medicare.gov. Compare costs, coverage and more. Get an estimate of out-of-pocket costs for the year. - See plan listings in the Medicare & You handbook and information sent by your plan. - Talk with local Medicare experts at your State Health Insurance Assistance Program.


