FOR THE APRIL MEETING

Executive Committee of Panhandle Stockmen's Association Plans Convention Program

For the convention at Roswell on April 16, 17 and 18, the executive committee of the Panhandle Cattle Raisers' association met here yesterday to complete plans which will make the April gathering, the largest and most useful session of the association that has ever been held.

President Thomas S. Bugbee, of Clarendon, presided over the meeting, and with him were the other members of the executive committee, W. C. Isaacs, of Canadian, vice president; E. H. Brainard, of Canadian, secretary; B. T. Ware, treasurer; C. T. Word, of Canyon, G. A. Sachse, of Hereford, W. B. Slaughter, of Dalhart and William Harrell. The meeting was held in the private office of the Western Bank & Trust Co. yesterday afternoon. Besides the members Judge O. H. Nelson and William Penn Anderson met with the committee.

Although the program is not yet completed for publication, it is known that it will present some of the strongest features that have ever been secured for the convention. The attendance is going to break records and the entertainment which Roswell is preparing for the cattlemen and their friends will be the most elaborate ever given.

Besides the regular convention, Judge Nelson, of the Western Stockyards company, has his bookings about complete for the big sale of fine cattle. One hundred and fifty head of Panhandle and Pecos valley raised Hereford cattle will be exhibited for sale, besides

some exceptionally fine offerings from the north and east.

Colonel R. E. Edmondson, of Claude and Kansas City, has called a meeting for the evening of March 18 of the Panhandle Hereford Breeders' association, of which he is president. Colonel Edmondson, who is one of the best known fine stock men in the country will be auctioneer at the big sale.

Present indications all go to show that there will be a large attendance of buyers at the convention and the spring moving of cattle will take the start from deals made at the gathering. Reduced rates which have been secured and the interest in the convention aroused by the Roswell entertainers assure an attendance of cattlemen and their friends from all over the district and from other sections of the country.—Amarillo Daily Panhandle.

And taking another long, drawn-out breath, the distinguished gentleman from the providence of Potter should have said something of the sufficiency or insufficiency of the incontestible and indisputable incontrovertibility of the prejudiced incrustation encompassing and circumscribing the ganglionic mechanism of the irresistible thinking apparatus of the anti-Bailey gang whose chronic detestations animosity creates such a labyrinthine obscurity that they see naught, hear naught and say naught but words, words, words.—Childress Post.

GOLD IN BIG CHUNKS.

Indian Chief Says Legend of Tribe Tells of It.

Chief Good of the Nanaimo tribe says there has been a legend in his tribe for several generations that about the center of Vancouver Island there is a stream with a small falls. Over the falls gold descends all the time and if a basin is thrust into the water golden grains can be caught therein. "There," says the chief, "is plenty of the stuff that the white man worships in blind adoration of all that is good and noble. At the base of the falls is almost a solid mass of gold and in earlier days many Indians cut away chunks to make bullets so that he might hunt and get his daily food."

It is a matter of history that in 1862 two Frenchmen left Victoria to hunt for the Midas stream. They returned some months later with well filled pokes, but money or persuasion could not induce them to make the trip again, and their faces blanched with terror when they spoke of this curious Eldorado. This bears out the superstition of the Indians that a terrible god holds guard over the treasure, that there is something supernatural, something dreadful about the golden river.

On this account few redskins have ever been induced to joint the white parties which from time to time have been made up to look for the source of the gold.
