Texas, March 14 - Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have risen 2.9 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.42/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has increased 3.8 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.53/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 78.8 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 46.3 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 40.5 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 74.5 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.



City of Spearman Receives \$150,000 Federal Grant for Downtown Improvements

Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples today announced the Texas Department of Agriculture has awarded \$150,000 in federal funds to the city of Spearman for infrastructure improvements through the Texas Capital Fund. The award helps fund upgrades to the safety and appearance of sidewalks in Spearman's historic downtown area.

is in doubt. Now, before Combs testified, Pitts said he filed legislation that proposes to transfer \$4.3 billion from the Rainy Day Fund into the General Revenue Fund. But even so, he said, deeper cuts to already-cut budgets will have to be considered.

Pitts pointed out that many fellow lawmakers on the present Appropriations committee also served on the committee in 2009 when the 2010-2011 budget was drawn up. "In hindsight, it's worth asking if we all should have anticipated a decline much sooner," Pitts said.

For the record, Pitts said, Texas' budget troubles stem from a nationwide economic recession and a long series of monthly doubledigit declines in sales tax revenue.

However, Rep. Mike Villarreal, D-San Antonio, interjected that the state's \$27 billion projected revenue shortfall for 2012-2013 is attributable not only to a nationwide recession, but also to the state's \$11 billion "structural deficit."



Words from Faith & Grace

IFESTYLE

We begin the Season of Lent, a time for reflection of life, self-assessment toward repentance. We imitate Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness as we prepare ourselves to experience the death and glorious resurrection of Jesus The Christ. We study Genesis 2:15-3:7, Psalm 32, Romans 5: 12-21, and Matthew 4: 1-11.

We see the "Fall of Man" in our Genesis passage. God called his creation "good"; yet, Sin can arise even within a "good" creation. Man desires to be God rather than to be God's thankful creature. Some blame Eve, and women in general, for the "fall", but a careful reading will indicate that Adam was there throughout the dialogue between the Serpent and Eve. Eve listened to the argument of the Serpent and ate of the fruit of the forbidden tree. Adam just ate it. The woman thought, the man acted, they both sinned. Notice that God still cared for Adam and Eve even though he allowed them to experience the consequence of their sin. By the sin of Adam, we all became sinners; we shall come to see by the righteousness of the man, Jesus, through faith in him, all men are restored to a right relationship with God.

The Psalmist sings a penitential psalm. Silence about sin, hiding it, leads to suffering both mental and physical. Confession of sin to God and a sincere repentance brings forgiveness and relief, both mental and physical. He sings, "Don't be a mule, without understanding, whose temper must be curbed with bit and bridle ... " The believer does not need to be forced into following, but must surrender to live God's way. In the steadfast love of God, the believer finds joy. Through faith in Jesus The Christ, all men are restored to a right relationship with God.

Paul extends his message of justification, faith and grace to the Romans. To learn this lesson we must accept that there is nothing we can do for ourselves that will allow us to escape from sin and its consequences. Paul tells the Romans that sin entered the world through the sin of one man, Adam. We are all descendants of Adam and partake of his nature. Paul then tells the Romans that through the righteousness of Jesus all who believe are justified and lead to life. Through God's grace which enables our faith in Jesus The Christ, we are forgiven!

Immediately after his baptism, Jesus goes into the wilderness. There Jesus has time to fast, pray, reflect, and prepare for his ministry. It is in this time of reflection that Satan tests Jesus. In the tests, Satan attacks Jesus' identity as the Son of God. Satan suggests that Jesus can prove his son-ship by turning the loaf-like rocks to bread. This would feed Jesus and if he did this for man-kind they would follow him as a "Bread King". Jesus replies, "One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God". Satan then suggests he perform a mighty deed by leaping from the temple's heights. Jesus replied, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test". Some would follow a wonderworker, but would demand greater and greater feats. Satan then suggested that Jesus worship him in return for the kingdoms of Earth. Jesus answered, "Worship the Lord your God, and serve only Him." Jesus found his way and through the righteousness of Jesus The Christ, we are redeemed. May the Holy Spirit allow you to fast, pray, reflect and prepare for the hope of Easter in this Season of Lent.

In the second week of Lent we learn that God works his mysterious plan of salvation through people, that our old patterns of life do not reconcile us with God, and that we must be "born again" in the sense of born from above (Spirit). We study Genesis 12: 1-9, Psalm 121, Romans 4: 1-5m 13-17, and John 3: 1-17.

God chooses the seventy-five year old, Abram, to be the instrument of his plan for human-kind. God commands Abram to "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you." God promises Abram that he will become a great nation, that God will bless Abram, that God will make Abram's name great, and that God will give a land to Abram's offspring. Abram believes God and goes.

The Psalmist sings a song of ascent, a travel song. The Psalmist sings a question, "...from where will my help come?" His answer, "My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth". To those who trust in the Lord, to those who let go of their pride and self-will, God grants his protection. God's steadfast love is forever.

Paul tells the Romans that old patterns of belief, the strict adherence to the law, does not lead us to reconciliation with God. Abraham did not gain God's favor by keeping the law (the law was not given until centuries later), Abraham did not gain God's favor by circumcision and the trappings of ritual, but by faith in the word of God. Thus, dear Christian, we learn that we cannot earn our salvation; we cannot work ourselves into the Kingdom of Heaven. Abraham is the father of all who place their faith and trust in God. It is that type of faith that was reckoned by God to be righteousness.

Jesus is meeting with Nicodemus late at night. Nicodemus is a member of the Sanhedrin, the ruling council of the Jews; Nicodemus is a powerful man, but he needs something and he comes to Jesus. The meeting was at night perhaps to avoid the crowds and to avoid political problems for Nicodemus; more likely the meeting was at night because that was the time the rabbis believed was the best time to study God's word. Jesus tells Nicodemus that he must be born again; Nicodemus hears Jesus literally and asks how a man can re-enter his mother's womb. Jesus explains that to be born again, one must be born from above, from the Spirit. Jesus tells Nicodemus that whosoever believes in the Son may not perish, but may have eternal life. God's mysterious plan of salvation is revealed to Nicodemus and to us.

May the Holy Spirit enable you to be born 'again' that





Frank Phillips College Interim President Dr. Jud Hicks received word late Wednesday, March 9, from State Representative Warren Chisum's office, that funding for four of the State's community colleges, including FPC, has been restored in the proposed House Budget. Frank Phillips College is now funded in the House and Senate Finance Bills. Dr. Hicks noted that throughout the process of restoring funding to the College, the FPC faculty and staff have maintained their focus on the day-to-day process of educating its students for which he is grateful. Hicks also expressed his appreciation to Representative Warren Chisum and Senator Kel Seliger and their staff for the help they have provided the College during this legislative process. Hicks also acknowledged the support that FPC has received from its Board of Regents, current students, alumni, business and industry representatives, and members of the community, pointing out that Board Chair Conny Moore and Dan Redd, Borger Economic Development Corporation also-traveled to Austin to visit with legislators regarding their support of the College. The Texas Legislature began its biennial budget process earlier this year with many suggestions on how to address the budget deficit. One such proposal recommended to zero-fund four community colleges, Brazosport, Frank Phillips, Odessa and Ranger. Upon hearing the news, Hicks responded, "We fully expected to address significant funding cuts; however, we had no idea we would have to justify our existence from an appropriations standpoint. That being said, we will gather the facts that led to this proposed budget as it pertains to Frank Phillips College and hope that we get a chance to present our case to the powers that be in Austin. As far as our faculty and staff, I would encourage them to continue to focus on taking care of our students within the communities that we serve." Legislators invited the State's fifty community college presidents to personally address the House Appropriations Committee regarding proposed cuts in appropriations. Dr. Hicks presented information about FPC including its recent successful completion of the reaffirmation process with The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, its accrediting agency, with no corrective actions recommended; its second time to be honored by the Washington Monthly Magazine as the 27th of the top thirty community colleges in the Nation. Hicks stressed that, "Frank Phillips College is a necessary and valuable asset to the Texas Panhandle training the future workforce and helping bridge the gap to other institutions of higher education. Frank Phillips College provides education and professional training and experience to the Texas Panhandle that would not otherwise be available to those residents."

Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1 of this year. The rendition form is available at the Hansford County Appraisal District.

WHO MUST FILE A RENDITION? You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income - such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

ARE THERE ANY ADVANTAGES TO YOU? Yes, the advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2010. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2011.

WHAT'S THE DEADLINE? The last day for filing 2011 renditions is April 15th. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 15 deadline.







Spearman Police Blotter

This month I would like to address several things of importance to all of us in Spearman. First is crime prevention. Spearman has been blessed for quite awhile with a low crime rate compared to some our neighboring cities. Gruver and Perryton have both been plagued by numerous thefts and burglaries. Due to hard work and persistence, both have made significant arrests in those cases and recovered stolen property. Spearman has had a few burglaries and thefts, but our biggest problem over last several months has been vandalism. Recently, a vacant home was entered and the person or persons kicked holes in walls, destroyed fixtures, and so forth. The windows have been broken out of two vehicles and several houses, and personal property has been torn up around town. These acts of useless destruction, thefts of property, and other crimes, including burglaries, can be reduced with simple crime prevention.

Secure your home, lock your doors and windows, and don't leave bicycles laying out by the curb over night. Tools and equipment left in pick-up beds or exposed on flat bed trucks are easy targets. Any property that is valuable to you will be valuable to some other person, who wants only to steal it and sell it somewhere else. I have driven around town many nights and noticed garage doors open and the lights on. That is an open invitation for a person who is looking to supplement his/her income by stealing and selling your property to take a quick inventory of your possessions and come back later to help themselves. Another thing that helps the criminal is a privacy fence. We all enjoy the privacy that a tall fence offers, but so does a burglar. I'm not saying you need to tear down your expensive wood or metal fence, just be aware that a privacy fence offers just as much privacy to a person intent on stealing your things. Thirdly, don't leave valuables in your car. It takes just a matter of seconds to bust a car window and take something that's lying on the seat and be gone.

Pay close attention to your surroundings while you are running errands around town. Be observant to what's going on around you. Something you could see or hear might help prevent a crime. Take a few minutes to step out on the front or back porch and take a look around. When you take out the trash to the alley, stop and look around briefly. You may not see anything suspicious, but a person looking to commit a crime just might see you and leave. Be proactive in crime prevention. It's not just a law enforcement responsibility, it's every citizen's responsibility.

The second item I want address is rabies. Since January 1st, ACO Mahaffee has captured three skunks in town. A report from The Texas Dept. Of Health Services showed that 10 skunks have been tested and showed positive with rabies since January 1st. Now before you panic, all those cases have been from the counties on the west side of the panhandle. The closest positive skunk to Hansford County was Carson County. Also in the report, it was stated that the skunk population has increased. I would concur with that statement because only three skunks were captured in Spearman during 2010. Again, prevention is the key. Vaccinate your dogs and cats and do not let them stray. If you see or think you have a skunk around, let us know so ACO Mahaffee can set out a trap.

Third item is a substance that has been introduced to our city called Salvia, or you may have heard the street name as K2. This is a leafy green substance that people are smoking instead of marijuana because it is legal. Salvia creates a high and, possibly, hallucinations. Salvia is sold legally from out of state (internet sales) or from smoke shops, tattoo shops and the like. It is in Spearman, and we have researched it to know what it look likes, it's effects, and where it comes from. Spearman ISD is aware of it as well. Parents, if you find a green leafy substance, and it doesn't smell like marijuana (it may smell fruity as fruit flavoring is sometimes added) and possibly labeled as incense, please call us. Some cities have passed city ordinances outlawing the possession of Salvia. Spearman has not enacted a city ordinance outlawing Salvia, due to the Texas Legislature considering a bill making the possession of Salvia a Class A Misdemeanor. The bill is expected to pass. Fourth item is registered sex offenders. There have been issues in the recent past over a person being a sex offender. Do not rely on or expect word of mouth to be accurate, and do not rely on or expect internet sites to have accurate information EX-CEPT for The Texas Department of Public Safety website. The TxDPS has many duties, one of which is to maintain the roster of registered sex offenders in this state. Any citizen can find out anything they need to know about registered sex offenders in our area through this website. The TxDPS Sex Offender website address is > txdps.state.tx.us<. You can search by name, zipcode, or county. You can call your local law enforcement agency as well. Corporal Kay has set up a Facebook site for the Spearman PD. Please check it out, she will be adding more information weekly, and my monthly articles will be posted as well. Please feel free to stop and visit with the Officers, come into the office and visit. The best crime prevention is observation, being proactive and a close relationship with your local law enforcement.
