safety," Lopez said. "We want Texsafety, Learn their vital signs, to understand them and to follow them."
The campaign is part of the research implementation plan for a TTI study sponsored by TxDOT. The study evaluated the effectiveness of 52 traffic control devises through surveys and focus groups involving more than 2,400 Texas
drivers.
"We're always working to im-
prove what we have," seid Lewis Rhodes, the study's Project Director at TxDOT. "We're continuously trying to make thing more helpful to the driver."
TTI Associate Research Engineer Gene Hawking and Research Scientist. Kati Womback shared responsibility for the study as coprincipal investigators.
