

The goal of the campaign is to make Texas' roads and highways safer by providing information to motorist on the meaning of the various traffic signs, signals and lane markings they encounter while driving.

We call it Vital Signs because that is exactly what traffic signs are, signs that are vital to your safety," Lopez said. "We want Texans to learn their vital signs, to understand them and to follow them.'

The campaign is part of the research implementation plan for a TTI study sponsored by TxDOT. The study evaluated the effectiveness of 52 traffic control devises through surveys and focus groups involving more than 2,400 Texas drivers.

"We're always working to improve what we have," said Lewis Rhodes, the study's Project Director at TxDOT. "We're continuously trying to make thing more helpful to the driver."

TTI Associate Research Engineer Gene Hawking and Research Scientist. Kati Womback shared responsibility for the study as coprincipal investigators.


Barkley wins big at National Dance Pageant



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

Among the Neighbors

Ed and Alva Garner returned Mr. Garner, who would not be here Sunday evening from Wichita Falls where they attended the 51st reunion of the "Lost Battalion".

Many local readers of the account in the Sunday News-Globe may not be aware that one of the survivors of that atrocity is Spearman's Ed Garner.

He was a member of the group from Jack County, Texas that were in the 36th National Guard division of Texas. They served with Battery F, 2nd Battalion, 131st Field Artillery Regiment.

In the fall of 1942, the regiment was on a ship enroute to the Philippines when it was forced to alter and try for Australia due to the Japanese presence in the Pacific. They couldn't get to Australia and were diverted to the Dutch owned island of Java.

After hard fighting with little ammunition or supplies, they were forced to surrender and 539 were taken prisoner. The Japanese never let it be known they were prisoners, therefore the name "Lost Battalion"

Most of the 539 were taken to Burma to work on the railroad, but Mr. Garner was one of 29 soldiers and 30 sailors who were taken to Japan to work in the iron ore mines. The ship on which they were taken, after stops at Singapore and Saigon, made port on Honshu Island. They went by train to O'Hase where the mines were, and they stayed for three years until the fall of 1945 after the atomic bomb was dropped in August, bringing the surrender.

The group was reunited soon after which was their first reunion, and they have held one annually since

Lately, since this year is the 50th anniversary of the dropping of the bomb, the national media has emphasized statements from those people who are not knowledgeable of the circumstances, expressing regret, and of course the usual moaning by the liberals. Somehow no mention is made of those, like

and the many, possibly millions, more young men had it not been used.

Those here who know Mr. Garner, and know of the dreadful brutality of that imprisonment are amazed at his upbeat, optimistic outlook and wholesome attitude, but not amazed at his deep sense of patriotism.

Daniel has been living in Amarillo where he is employed by the Coca-Cola Bottling Co. Paul and Adela live in Crosbyton as he is the manager of Lowe's Market there.

They were fortunate to be able to attend two grand operas "Girl of the Golden West" and the "Marriage of Figuairo". The Santa Fe Opera Company is known world-wide and both performances were completely sold out.

At June 30, 1995, the agricultural lending cooperative showed a \$9.6 million decline in total high risk loans from their year-end 1994 level. Nonaccrual loans have been reduced by 6.5 percent during that period, and other property owned totalled \$18.5 million, down by nearly half from a year earlier.

Despite crop and weather-related concerns in some areas of the district, demand for both production and mortgage loans edged upward during the period. The production lending portfolio experienced an \$8.9 million increase in total loans, and the mortgage lending portfolio posted a \$3.2 million increase during the first half of the

The Tenth Farm Credit District year. Total loan volume at June 30, 1995, was \$3.68 billion.

District net income for the first six months of 1995 was \$41.5 million, and increase of 41.1 percent over the same period last year. District capital totalled \$880.8 million at mid-year, up 4.8 percent from year end.

The Tenth Farm Credit District is composed of the Austin-based Farm Credit Bank of Texas; 48 Federal Land Bank Associations in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas which make long-term land and rural housing loans; and 17 Production Credit Associations in Louisiana, New Mexico, and Texas which make short-tern and intermediate-term operating loans. Jr. High kids go through changes

The middle school years can be tough for even the best of students.

"Not only are children going through adolescence and puberty, but they are experiencing changes at school," said Dr. Lou Ann Todd Mock, a psychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

The nurturing environment of elementary school is a dramatic contrast to the middle school, or junior high, world of class changes, increased disciplines, larger student bodies and fewer personal relationships with teachers.

All this change tends to intensify any existing behavior problems.

"Conduct problems may increase, and the larger school often makes it easier to skip class," Monk said. "Children who have been depressed or withdrawn may become facing. more so.

Parental involvement at school can be a positive influence, as can a activities.

"Be supportive of any interest your child shows in developing a talent or skill," Mock said. "These activities provide your child with a supportive and positive peer group."

Focusing on the positives is another key to surviving this often confusing time.

"Work toward an encouraging environment at home," Monk said. When discussing some needed change, let your children know that you still think they are wonderful. Even as they try their wings, your approval and support remain important.

Pringle-Morse releases free lunch policy

nounced its policy for providing free and reduced price meals for children served under the National School Breakfast Program. The school has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The households size and income criteria identified in any previous charts will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free reduced meals. Foster children that are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office. To apply for free and reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits, households receiving food stamps or AFDC only have to list their child's name, food stamp of AFDC case number and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number must list the names of all household member, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, how often the person received it and the social security number of either the primary wage earner responsible for

If neither household member has a Social Security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available. The application must be signed by an adult household member.

It is a misconception that the Booster Club is just about football. There could be nothing farther from truth. The club not only deals with football activities, but they cover homecoming activities.



The Lynx-Hounds gridiron matchup is set for this year on October 27, at Greyhound Stadium. It may decide which team makes the playoffs, and which doesn't.

In the first 11 games versus the Lynx since 1954, the Hounds were 9-2. A 12-0 victory over Spearman in Gruver in 1954 may have been the Hounds' first victory over the Lynx, as least since the WWII years. Early scores included Gruver victories of 50-14 in 1958, and 38-16 in 1965

Then the roof caved in, and the Lynx have dominated this series since. Before the series was stopped in 1974, the Lynx had won six straight times - the last five by scores of 15-14, 7-6, 14-12, 22-21, and 14-0. Talk about heart-stoppers, and all Spearman victories! That left the series standing 9-8 in favor of the Hounds.

Then the series was resumed in 1980, with eight games played consecutively through 1987. Again it was to Gruver's disadvantage, as they lost six of the eight, including a couple by scores of 22-18 and 14-12; and the Lynx at that point had won 12 of the last 14 played, and really knew how to win the close encounters with the Hounds. Then the series was again stopped in 1988.

Recently, in 1992, the series was again resumed, with the Lynx winning the first two games, for a 14-2 record versus the Hounds since 1968; before the Hounds finally rebounded last year and bruised the Lynx egos 18-0, for their first victory at Lynx Stadium since 1966. For along with all those close victories over the Hounds, were also scores of 28-0, 47-0, 34-6, and 26-7, all in favor of the Lynx, since 1984. The series now stands 16-12 in favor of the Lynx since 1954.

The Lynx had grown accustomed to beating the Hounds, and is it now the Hounds turn to go back on history of "The Game" - the Hans- a long winning streak versus the

1995 PROPERTY TAX RATES IN HANSFORD HOSPITAL DISTRICT

This notice concerns 1995 property tax rates for HANSFORD HOSPITAL DISTRICT. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxeD in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

Parent/Guardian:

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that our children should get free or reduced-price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size ecreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving ncome information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

Consolidated Farm Service helps collect

plant their winter wheat crop have not requested the insurance payments due them, they should contact their local Consolidated Farm Service Agency office.' Recent changes in the crop insurance program allow producers with prevented-planted wheat areas who had already planted an alternate crop to claim their insurance payment. But, producers must request those payment as soon as possible.

The changes were brought about when the National Grain Sorghum Producers, the Texas Grain Sorghum Association, and the Texas Wheat Producers Association, working in conjunction with the Texas CFSA office, pushed for the rule changes. The groups have been persistent in their claim that producers in the Southwest who were unable to plant their insured winter wheat crop because of adverse weather have been treated unfairly.


If producers who were unable to had been told that they could not participate in farm program options if they collected the crop insurance prevented-planting payment they were entitled to. Most of the producers with unplanted winter wheat were forced to forget the insurance payment and plant another crop, since they could not afford to leave the fields unplanted.

> "We're very pleases that the rule has changed," said Harold Bob Bennett, CFSA acting state executive for Texas. "We were happy to work with the commodity groups to correct the problem. Producers affected by the new rule must contact their local CFSA office to file for their indemnity payment."

> "The crop insurance rules were unfair," said Jack Eberspacher, NGSP executive director, "Since many sorghum growers plant winter wheat and were affected by this, we were very vocal in telling USDA and our legislators about the problem.

C.J. Frantz, Jr.


PERRYTON-C.J. Frantz, Jr., 71, died August 12, 1995 in Perryton following a lengthy illness.

A life-time resident of Ochiltree County, he was born February 6, 1924 to Clifford Jay and Sarah Lewis Frantz. He graduated from Perryton High School in 1941 and attended Panhandle A&M College in Goodwell, OK.





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
