

Weekly Update
Texas, March 19- Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have risen 4.8 cents

per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.72/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has increased 4.3 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.80/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com. Including the change in gas prices in

Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 31.8 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 25.3 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 28.6 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 27.9 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"Average retail gasoline prices will likely rise this week, after a surge in wholesale prices late last week," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "Some analysts believe gasoline prices may have peaked, but I am not at all confident in such words. I still maintain that prices will likely not peak until we get closer to the month of May, as a majority of locales around the United States make eventual switch overs to summer spec gasoline," DeHaan said. GasBuddy operates, TexasGasPrices.com, and over 225 other local gasoline pricetracking websites that follow prices at over 125,000 gasoline stations in the United States and Canada. 

## **Antonio "Tony" Hernandez Dies** in Crash Near Stinnett

A 21-year-old Spearman student died when his Toyota Camry collided with a tractor-trailer near Stinnett late Tuesday morning, the Department of Public Safety said. About 10:45 a.m., Antonio Hernandez was southbound in his 1992 Camry on U.S. Highway 136 three miles south of Stinnett when the vehicle went off the west side of the highway, the DPS said.

Hernandez overcorrected and the Camry went into a slide, then crossed into the loved him, as Tony was loved by all. The driver of the tractor-trailer was not injured, the DPS said.



# Words from Faith & Grace

In the fifth week of the Season of Lent. we learn of a new covenant between God and the believer and what it means to be a "priest forever after the order of Melchizedek"; we study Jeremiah 31 27-34, Psalm 51, Hebrews 5: 5-10, and John 12: 20-36

Jeremiah, known as the 'weeping prophet', delivered a string of judgments to the people; but here he offers a ray of hope. "The days are surely coming, says the Lord when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah." This new covenant will en tail God writing his law upon the hearts of his people Under the old covenant, the people fell away; under this new covenant, the people will 'know' God because God forgives their sins. In geek-speak, God has 'hard-wired' the people to know and appreciate his gift of grace. We celebrate this new covenant in our order of communion (Eucharist), to-wit: "We drink this cup which is the new covenant in his blood." This new covenant is a promise to all peoples who believe.

The Psalmist sings a song of the consequence and remedy for sinfulness (probably a Hebrew 'Country/Western song). Verse 3 shows us that sin causes guilt and remorse. Verse 4 shows us that the sinner is liable to God's judgment. Verse 5 shows that sin pervades our lives. Verse 8 notes that sin deafens the sinner to gladness and causes physical agony. Verse 12 shows that sin chokes off the sinner's willingness to follow God's law. Verse 15 conveys that sin prevents the sinner from offering praises to God while Verse 16 shows that sin prevents the sinner from offering true sacrifice to God. Sin separates us from the steadfast love of God. Without God's grace none of could remain true to our God.

The writer of Hebrews describes Christ's role as intercessor for our sin by showing Christ as our High Priest. The entirety of Chapter 5 discusses the role of this High Priest. Christ did not glorify himself by becoming High Priest, but was appointed by God. The writer quotes God as saying of Christ, "You are a priest forever according to the order of Melchizadek." This is a reference to a meeting with the priest, Melchizadek, by Abraham recorded in Genesis 14. Melchizadek was a priest of God; he was not appointed as priest by earthly authority but the tradition says that Melchizadek would be a priest forever. Christ is not our intercessor with God by earthly authority; he is our intercessor with God because he is God. Think about it.

John tells a story of Jesus being sought after by two Greeks who ask Philip if they can see Jesus. Philip tells Andrew of the request, and the two of them make it known to Jesus. Jesus then predicts his own death saying, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified". Jesus compares himself to a grain of wheat, which must be planted in the earth ('die'), which enables it to bear much fruit. Jesus tells the disciples (were the Greeks there?) "Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also." Perhaps the Christ is speaking to all of us who believe; read this passage carefully.

May the Holy Spirit by God's grace strengthen your faith that you may receive this new covenant.

#### "Productivity Appraisal" May Lower the Property Taxes on your Farm or Ranch Land


Texas law allows farmers and ranchers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on market value. This "productivity value" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops and livestock-not its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

WHEN IS THE APPLICATION DEADLINE? If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to the Hansford County Appraisal District by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2012 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty.

DO YOU NEED TO REAPPLY ANNUALLY? If your land already receives agricultural productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.






