work. Divide your work into "must do", "need to do", and "want to do."



I divide my work into bite-size chunks. I promise myself a little break when I finish a portion. That often helps me stay with a project a little longer.

· Know when you do your best work. I recently visited with a young college student who told me she was taking a 7:30 a.m. summer class because that was when she was most alert.

The early part of the day is also when I perform at the highest level. I take on the most challenging tasks when I'm at my peak. Your day may really get started at noon. It doesn't matter as long as you don't waste your peak time on routine phone calls, paper work or follow-up.



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· Save some time for yourself. I don't care how full of energy you may be, you still need some time to recharge your batteries. How you recharge will vary from person to person. For example, I work with people all day long. When I recharge, I prefer to be alone. I may go for a motorcycle ride, work in my shop or read a book.

A computer programmer who spends all of his or her time in a cubicle writing lines of code may wish to mingle with friends. What you do is up to you, just make time

· Have some fun. You get tochoose whether your work is a vocation or a vacation. Most successful people enjoy most of their work. Look for things to laugh about, share a cartoon or funny story. Fill your office with your favorite things. Bring your own music if it makes you feel better. Keep it soft: You don't want to infringe on the rights of others.

on the Lake. Only a single white pelican has been seen.

Deer may be seen almost any time of the day now. Jim said to bring binoculars if you have them. They help catch some you would otherwise miss. On Sunday behind the office he saw five or six whitetails, and not far from them a mule deer buck with two does.

My skunk story last week turned out to be exaggerated. Cleta Casdorph called to tell me it took two years to catch the eighteen skunks. She caught nine each year. Lucy and Frank Pittman have also been trapping this summer with a total of seven skunks so far. Lucy said leaving cat food out also draws skunks. They learned to use peanut butter in the trap rather than cat food, as they were catching their cats. Mark Washburn said in Gruver the trappers were using cat food, dog food, and sometimes just empty traps. A skunk, he said, is a curious creature and will often just go in a trap to see what is there.

Different ones have asked me if Amy Harris used a zoom lens for her skunk picture. She thinks she did, but she said she was within ten feet of it. She mentioned that the skunk never seemed aware of her, but that she would only move up closer when it would have its head down. I had been curious to know if skunks went about with their tails held up or out level with the ground. Amy said the two she had observed closely kept their tails up.

The December issue of the Texas Parks and Wildlife magazine features a cock pheasant on the cover and an article "Pheasant Holiday in the Panhandle." There is a beautifully illustrated article by Wyman Meinzer entitled "The Resilient Roadrunner" that is special.


