Cattlemen to Re-record Brands in Fall of 2001



Diabetes Management Seminar



Spearman Lions Club Annual Broom & Mop Sale



Someone sent me the following story. It was written by Sam Keen. It really made me stop and think about how much I really listen to my children.

Learning To Listen Midnight phone calls stir a mother's heart. We all know what it's like to get that phone call in the middle of the night. This night was no differ-ent. Jerking up to the ringing summons, I focused on the red, illuminated numbers of my clock. Midnight. Panicky thoughts filled my sleep-dazed

mind as I grabbed the receiver. "Hello?" My heart pounded, I gripped the phone tighter and eyed my hus-band, who was now turning to face my side of the bed.

"Mama?" The voice answered. I could hardly hear the whisper over the static. But my thoughts immediately went to my daughter.

When the desperate sound of a young crying voice became clear on the line, I grabbed for my husband and squeezed his wrist. "Mama, I know it's late. But don't ... don't say anything until I finish And before you ask, yes I've been drinking. I nearly ran off the road a few miles back and"

I drew in a sharp, shallow breath, released my husband and pressed my hand against my forehead. Sleep still fogged my mind, and I attempted to fight back the panic. Something wasn't right.

"I got so scared. All I could think of was how it would hurt you if a policeman came to your door and said I'd been killed. I want ... to come

policeman came to your door and said I'd been killed. I want ... to come home. I know running away was wrong. I know you've been worried sick. I should have called you days ago but I was afraidafraid" Staying on the line, sobs of deep-felt emotion flowed from the receiver and poured into my heart. Immediately, I pictured my daughter's face in my mind, and my fogged senses seemed to clear, "I think ---" "No! Please let me finish! Please!" she pleaded, not so much in anger, but in desperation. I paused and tried to think what to say. Before I could go on, she continued. "I'm pregnant, Mama. I know I shouldn't be drinking now, especially now, but I'm scared, Mama. So scared!" "The voice broke again, and I bit into my lip, feeling my own eyes fill with moisture. I looked up at my husband, who sat silently mouthing, "Who is it?" I shook my head and when I didn't answer, he jumped up and

"Who is it?" I shook my head and when I didn't answer, he jumped up and left the room, returning seconds later with a portable phone held to his ear. She must have heard the click in the line because she asked, "Are you still

there? Please don't hang up on me! I need you. I feel so alone." I clutched the phone and stared at my husband, seeking guidance. "I'm here, I wouldn't hang up," I said.

"I should have told you, Mama. I know I should have told you. But, when we talk, you just keep telling me what I should do. You read all those pamphlets on how to talk about sex and all, but all you do is talk. You don't listen to me. You never let me tell you how I feel. It is as if my feelings aren't important. Because you're my mother you think you have all the answers. But sometimes I don't need answers. I just want someone to listen.

I swallowed the lump in my throat and stared at the how-to-talk-to-your-kids pamphlets scattered on my night stand. "I'm listening," I whispered.

"You know, back there on the road after I got the car under control, I started thinking about the baby and taking care of it. Then I saw this phone booth and it was as if I could hear you preaching to me about how" people shouldn't drink and drive. So I called a taxi. I want to come home." "That's good, Honey," I said, relief filling my chest. My husband came

closer, sat down beside me and laced his fingers through mine.

"But you know, I think I can drive now."

"No!" I snapped. My muscles stiffened and I tightened the clasp on my husband's hand. "Please, wait for the taxi. Don't hang up on me until the taxi gets there."

"I just want to come home, Mama."

"I know. But do this for your Mama. Wait for the taxi, please."

Learning to listen: I listened to the silence ... fearing. When I didn't hear her answer, I bit into my lip and closed my eyes. Somehow I had to stop her from driving.

"There's the faxi, now." Only when I heard someone in the background asking about a Yellow Cab did I feel my tension easing. "I'm coming home, Mama.

There was a click, and the phone went silent. Moving from the bed, tears forming in my eyes, I walked out into the hall and went to stand in my 16-uear-old daughter's room.


two sons, Mike Skinner and Bill Skinner, both of Spearman. The family requests memorials be made to Hansford Hospital.





Then later I had a request as a genealogy volunteer to do a lookup on Temple Spivey in Hansford County. We have good


Spivey articles in our history books, but it turns out there is not

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
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
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Local Couple Discovers Old and New in Travels

Thousands of years of history surrounded Claude and Jo Nell Sheets as they stepped back in time on their recent visit abroad.

Viewing the ruins of the Roman Coliseum, the Sheets were able to look down upon the maize of alleys and passageways beneath the stage floor that led animals and human victims to the bloody contests held for sport.

An innovative forerunner of the modern elevator that was used to raise animals from the lower regions of the Coliseum onto the stage served as evidence of the ingenuity of the Romans. The device which would raise lions to center stage was operated much like a large crew with men pushing four poles while walking in a circle

Although not as old, the Vatican City in its glory was in great contrast to the stark ruins of the Coliseum. The Sheets marveled at its beauty . "No expense was spared to make it special with huge statuary of gold and marble,"said Jo Nell

The old and new of the city were brought together when the Sheets observed a helicopter bringing Pope John Paul back to the Vatican from his recent meeting with President Bush.

The theme of old and new together would be seen in England also where the couple was able, with their son Ladd, to ride the London Eye, a huge 400-foot tall structure built to celebrate the Millennium. The Eye was described by Jo Nell as a "ferris wheel composed of glass enclo-sures - each holding 25 people who were able to view London in the thirty-minute revolutions of the structure.

From that modern innovation,

recent days, the Sheets have spotted Queen Elizabeth wearing one of the crowns in a television appearance.

Ancient clocks, all keeping accurate time, abound in the European countries. Most notable among them is Big Ben which is housed in the House of Parliament that sits next to the Thames River.

Nestled among the old in the English setting was the Sea Cat, a fast moving ferry carrying both cars and people across the English Channel

The Sheets' travels then took them to France where they discovered that the French Riviera was much different than they had imagined as the entire beach area was covered with rocks with no sand



In Germany, the Sheets were again surprised when they examined the Berlin Wall and found it to be much thinner than they had expected, only 4-5 inches.

Castles, the fascination of many Americans, dotted the countryside in several European countries. The castles, themselves, varied in their stage of ruin or preservation. Many of the stoic structures house hotels, restaurants, or other tourist busi-nesses. The Sheets were able to stay in one such castle in France where Claude especially enjoyed the formal French gardens which are symmetrical in their design. Jo Nell, however, preferred the English gardens which were more informal

From France, the Sheets went on to Venice which could be characterized as a city on water since the city is actually built on islands connected by arched bridges under which boats pass.

In Venice, the Sheets visited Doges Palace. "One large area of the Palace which features artwork and paintings was restored at the expense of United States taxpay-O(tory,"Jo Nell said.

the Sheets found themselves again in the history of the country at Westminster Abbey, where members of the royal family, poets, musicians and other famous people through the ages are buried in tombs stacked against the walls inside the cathedral.

'There is no room left for burials now. The cathedral is so full that one man is even buried standing up,"Jo Nell said.

The influence of ancient Rome is also visible in England. Remains of walls built by the early Romans in 200 A.D. can still be seen.



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
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
